

Donors must be in good health, at least 17 years or older, weigh at least 110 pounds and show a valid photo I.D. LifeSouth supplies blood to more than 17 medical facilities throughout the Tampa Bay region. Their vision is to be a vital and prominent member of our communities, known for meeting the needs of the entire community, incomparable customer service and unwavering employee excellence. LifeSouth needs the help of 266,000 blood donors a year, or 728 donors per day. A single blood donation can save up to 3 lives. Benefits of donating blood include good health and reduced risk of cancer and hemochromatosis. It helps in reducing the risk of damage to liver and pancreas. Donating blood may help in improving cardiovascular health and reducing obesity. Donating blood is good for the health of donors as well as those who need it. You can also

**TYPES OF BLOOD**

There are four main red blood cell types: A, B, AB and O.

- Each blood type can be positive or negative for the Rh factor.
- AB is the universal recipient
- O negative is the universal donor of red blood cells.
- Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.



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

## LifeSouth

LifeSouth is a non-profit community blood bank serving more than 100 hospitals in Alabama, Florida and Georgia. We are committed to meeting the blood supply needs of hospitals and their patients by providing the highest quality blood components and services. With more than 30 donor centers, 45 blood mobiles and 2,000 blood drives a month, our LifeSouth team is dedicated to making sure the blood is there when you or your family member is in need. LifeSouth has had our donor center in Hernando County for almost 30 years. We have been the sole provider to all 3 Hernando County Hospitals during that time. We have expanded our reach to supply Moffitt Hospital as of May 2020. When you give at our donor center on Cortez (near the Culvers) or at one of our red, white, and blue buses, you are saving the lives of Hernando County residents. There are many blood centers that supply different hospitals and for your safety it is important to know who you are giving to. During the pandemic it is important to know that

it is safe to give blood. We are taking all CDC recommended precautions and only allow healthy people to donate and our facilities are thoroughly disinfected often. We are testing every donor for the Covid-19 antibodies and hope that those who have the antibodies will come back and donate convalescent plasma to save the lives of critically ill patients in our local hospitals. The blood supply is at a national low and we need the communities help to maintain a healthy level. Every whole blood donation can save up to 3 lives. gine, basic boat handling, and your on board equipment. Included descriptions of what causes boating mishaps and how to minimize them. This course is a must for family members in case something happens to the boat operator.

St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Still others insist that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was the true namesake of the holiday. He, too, was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her

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**TEN TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL CYCLING**

**1) Ride on the road.**

Adult bicyclists do not belong on the sidewalk. Sidewalk cycling increases conflict for cyclists, motorists and pedestrians. Sidewalk cycling is not only inconvenient and slow, it actually increases your risk of being hit by a car because it aggravates turning and crossing conflicts. The sidewalk also presents many more hazards such as poles, posts and branches.

**2) Know and follow the rules.**

The rules of the road are for everyone. They exist to make us all predictable to one another. Bicyclists who violate the rules are not only far more likely to be hit by a car, they are disruptive and breed animosity among fellow road users. The basic rules:

- First come, first served.
- Always ride the same direction as traffic.
- Yield to traffic before entering a road.
- Yield to overtaking traffic when changing lanes.
- Obey all traffic control devices.

**3) Integrate in the intersections.**

- Always use the lane that serves your destination.
- Turn left from left turn lanes.
- Never ride straight in a right-turn-only lane.
- When approaching an intersection in a wide lane or a bike lane, merge left into the main traffic flow or lane.
- The crosswalk is the WORST place to cross a busy intersection.

**4) Ride Big.**

Most roads have lanes that are not wide enough to be safely shared by cars and bikes operated side-by-side. You are allowed the full use of a lane that is not wide enough to share. Communicate that the lane is not wide enough for a motorist to squeeze past you by riding far enough left that there clearly is not room for the width of a car between you and the lane line.


Riding big makes you visible and encourages motorists to give generous passing clearance. It also gives you someplace to go if a motorist does come too close.

**5) Communicate.**

You are part of the system, you need to be predictable to others. Communication makes you predictable. Signal turns and lane changes. When motorists know what you want to do, most of them will try to help you out!

## 6) Be mindful of your surroundings.

Markings on the roadway are static. Traffic is dynamic. As a result, bike-specific markings sometimes put you in the wrong place. You MUST take your cues from the whole environment. *Never let paint think for you.*

- Make sure you are visible to crossing and turning traffic. This often means leaving a bike lane and moving to the left side of the general use lane.
- Never ride within 5ft of a parked car. This area is called the "door zone." A suddenly-opened car door can be deadly. Some bike lanes are striped entirely within the door zone.
- Passing a queue of stopped traffic on the right can expose you to many crash hazards. Sometimes it's better just to wait in the queue.
- Never, ever pass a large truck on the right!

## 7) Understand how traffic flows.

If you understand traffic flow, you can anticipate and place yourself in a position which makes things easier for yourself and your fellow road users. In the CyclingSavvy course, we teach you in detail about how traffic controls and road features influence traffic flow, and how you can take advantage of this.

## 8) Want respect? Act respectably.

Be considerate of your fellow road users. But also demonstrate respect for yourself. Control your space by default and help motorists pass you when appropriate. Offer a friendly wave when others are respectful of you. When motorists arrive before you at a red light, stop behind them. Don't pull to the front of the queue and make them have to get around you after the intersection.

## 9) Let it go: don't escalate harassment.

You will be passed uneventfully by thousands of considerate citizens for every one jerk who yells or honks. So, when someone does honk or yell at you, let it go. Smile and wave (with all five fingers), or pretend you heard nothing. They will simply move on with their negative self and you can remember the nice person who smiled and waved you through a lane change a few minutes before.

## 10) Keep it fun!

Bicycling offers a higher trip quality than most other forms of transportation. This is true whether you ride on quiet streets or share the road with motor traffic. Interacting with other road users is a

dance you lead. The better you are at communicating and operating predictably, the better your dance partners will be. Those of us who ride mindfully, with a friendly attitude toward our fellow road users, seldom experience close calls or hostility.

Most close passing is a result of the motorist thinking he can squeeze past without changing lanes. Make sure a driver can clearly see that his car won't fit within the same lane.

- Seagrasses are the principal food for endangered marine herbivores such as manatees and green sea turtles, act as natural filters to help purify the water, and provide a suitable environment for a wide variety of marine life.

- Boaters should make all available attempts to avoid running through seagrass beds.

- Navigation charts identify seagrass beds as light green or marked as "grs" on the chart.

- Boaters should make all possible attempts to stay within channels when unfamiliar with a waterway.

- Avoid taking shortcuts through seagrass beds to avoid causing propeller scars.

- It is a violation of Florida law to damage seagrass beds in some areas within state waters.

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
