

BY LAWS OF THE APOSTOLIC FAITH BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- * Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- * Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- * Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- * Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- * Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- * Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- * Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.







When the Lord told us by scripture(Acts 8:26) to take a job in Saudi Arabia in March of 1981, we never dreamed we would be in Kansas at the AFBC in August of this year(1983).

Those 2 years in Saudi Arabia were indeed "our time in the desert". We received the out-pouring of the Holy Spirit while there. Our daughter, Dawn, who is now 12 also received the baptism of the Holy Spirit. We enjoyed

wonderful fellowship with other believers, meeting in homes as there were no church buildings. The Lord wasn't hindered. He moved on hearts anyway. Many were saved and baptized with the Spirit. Several of those went on to be joyfully immersed in baptism in the Red Sea.

After about 18 months the Lord started dealing with us about going to Bible College. We wanted His perfect will so we prayed earnestly, wrote to 7 colleges but received no replies. After further prayer the Lord said we would receive our answer in the mail in a few days. The answer didn't come as we expected. One afternoon at the mailroom we were given a magazine. There was no address on it, no one even knew for whom it was intended. But, God had intended it for us and it found its way into our hands.

We began to read the July 1982 Apostolic Faith Report with curiosity and later amazement. We had never heard of the Apostolic Faith Movement, yet here were all the doctrinal beliefs we held. We quickly sent off a letter to the Bible College and received a prompt reply. After reading the literature about the college we knew this was where the Lord was leading us to be.

We returned to America in May, visited family for the summer and then headed to Baxter Springs for the Aug. 22 registration. We were confident of the Lord's leading yet were were not completely aware of everything the Lord had in store for us.

Mission Trip To Africa

I had the wonderful privilege of visiting Cameroon in Western Africa this past June. I have been on mission trips to several countries in the Americas in the past, but this was my first opportunity to visit the Eastern hemisphere. The very hardest part of the trip was saying good-bye to Glenda, my wonderful wife. The next hardest part of the trip was the long flights. Northwest Arkansas to Chicago, Chicago to Brussels, Belgium and Brussels to Yaounde, the capital of Cameroon. I arrived at the Yaounde Airport after midnight Cameroon time. I was met by Bishop Ndu Cosmas and a large delegation of pastors and other ministers. This was my first indication of the royal treatment that I would receive throughout my stay.

Bishop Cosmas had made arrangements for me to minister almost every day of my visit. But the first day we were there we couldn't travel around the city because there were several African presidents in town for a conference and the streets were shut down during the day for security reasons. This gave me a chance to rest up and for me to get acquainted with my host and his family. Through the day many pastors and GCBC students stopped by to greet me.

The next day we traveled to the town of Sangemelima, south of the capital. Here I got to experience my first African church service. When I started to get out of the car a young man took my Bible from me very reverently. I found out that they never let me carry my Bible. One of the young pastors always carried my Bible from the car to where I would be seated. Then when it was time for me to go to the pulpit one of the ushers would carry it to the pulpit for me. As we started to walk to the church the pastors and leaders were lined up in a reception line. A ladies choir was singing a song of welcome and a young lady presented me with a bouquet of flowers and a welcome speech. I was so humbled to be treated this way that I wept. I received similar greetings at most of the churches we ministered in.

The service that night was a life changing experience for me. The gifts of the Holy Spirit flowed freely. As souls were saved, people were blessed in multiple ways and demons fled at the touch of Spirit filled people and at the name of Jesus.

One of the lessons I was being taught while in Cameroon was "trust". And I learned through being a passenger in a car. During the whole trip I never felt any fear from man or demon, but traveling in the Yaoude traffic made me more than a little nervous. But the truth is that being a passenger makes me nervous in Joplin, MO or Bentonville, AR. What made it worse I never did comprehend the rules of the road, if there were any. My driver and interpreter for the week was Pastor Zachariah, a brother that I grew to love and respect so much. He could tell that I was getting nervous and he would say "Don't worry, God is in control". I told him I'm not nervous because he was a bad driver,



but because I was a bad passenger. In fact before the week was over I came to the conclusion that Pastor Zachariah was the best driver that I had ever ridden with. He could get that SUV through the smallest openings in traffic and around, over the biggest chug holes you ever saw. And he also did a wonderful job of the interpreting of my sermons. And he was a very good preacher himself!

The primary reason for my trip was to be able to attend the Graduation of the Cameroon GCBC.

The Great Commission Bible College has over 3,500 students in over 100 countries around the world. Most of these students have been taking classes online (WWW. GCBCCedu.us). More than 30 on the ground Bible Colleges have been set up in more than 17 countries. I state this because the numbers are changing weekly. On June 29th graduation in Cameroon. we presented 90 diplomas and degrees to 45 different students. Most of these students are already pastors and soon to be ordained. They are becoming grounded in God's Word and prepared to fulfill the Great Commission.

There are 8 geographical regions in Cameroon. Bishop Cosmas will be overseeing the opening of a Great Commission Bible College in each of these regions this fall. Over 100 students are already registered for classes.

Another joy was getting to visit the orphanage that Bishop Cosmas and his people oversee. The children sang and danced a joyful song. We were able to present each child with a gift. The people of Cameroon had built a very nice new building for the orphanage but they did not have electricity, a well and a toilet/bath house that was needed before they could move in. We have been able to raise enough money through many peoples generous giving to meet all these needs. The orphans will be able to move into their new secure home.

I have been asked, "Are these short term mission trips worth it. Or would the money for the trip be better spent, just being sent to those we would go to help?" And I have wondered that in my own mind. First these trips usually change the person that is making the trip for the good. I know it has me. Second, our brothers and sisters around



the world need to know we really care. They are encouraged by the visits. And as we are establishing training ministries, such as these Bible Colleges, our presence legitimizes the work in the eyes of the government, the community and other church leaders.

I want to say "Thank You" to all those who gave and prayed to make my trip possible. A very special "Thank You" to the Apostolic Faith Bible College in Baxter Springs, KS, for the grant from their Missions Fund. The Great Commission Bible Church in Carl Junction, MO, pastored by Mike and Sherrie Fiedler, held a very successful fund raiser for us. And I also appreciate the prayers and giving of my home church, Southside Apostolic Faith Church in Joplin, MO, and Pastors Richard and Renee Morris.


REV. A.W. FERGUSON

Ernest was a member of the Apostolic Faith Church in Snyder and served on the church board many years. In addition to his wife, Evelyn, survivors include his


