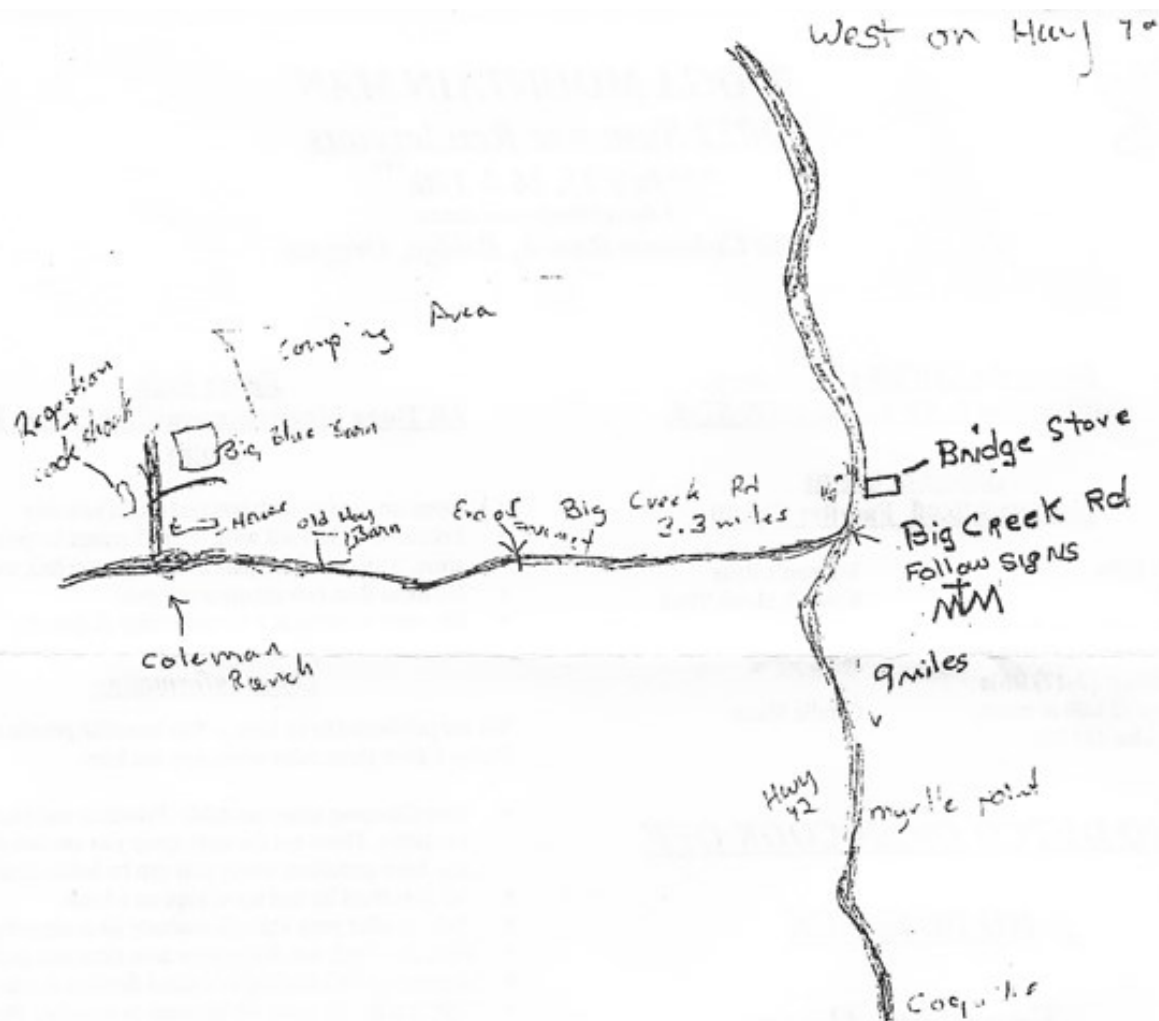
All Tioga Mountainman Club Range Rules

- All pets must be tied up or kept on a leash.

- Map on back

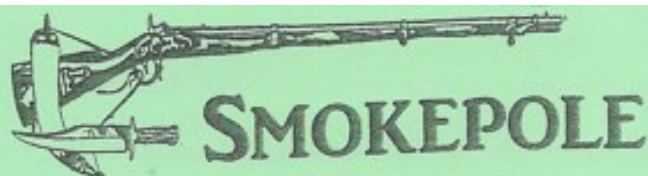

The theme is St. Patrick's Day and the shoots are always more fun if there is a theme so get your green on and come on out. Set-up at 9:30 (some guys come earlier) shoot at 10. Fee is \$5. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Walt Evens:

Greetings! As always I hope this finds everyone in good health and spirits.

The state's mask mandate has been lifted. Many businesses have even removed their "sneeze shields". With that being said there is no reason why we can't have our after-the-match feast. I suggest chili. Everyone can bring whatever they want to go with it.

We could use another member or two at our booth at the Willamette Valley Arms Collectors gun show on the 19th and 20th at the Lane Events Center.

The Pistol Range seems to be working out. Our numbers are going up. We had nine participants last month. We could use a Match Sponsor for April and May.

FEBRUARY SHOOT REPORT by Walt Evens:

The host for our February match was EEGC member John Grimes. We had 9 participants and 3 volunteers.

The first target was the EEGC red Bullseye, 10 shots at 25 yards with regular scoring. Next was the Groundhog with 5 shots at the same distance. I usually score this with 20 points for the eye, 10 for the bull and 5 for the body. John decided to make a few extra circles with scoring at 10, 9, 8 and 5.

The third was the NMLRA Novelty target with instructions for each one. Lastly we shot a potato on a string, one for each person. You had three shots. If you hit it on the first try, 30 points; second, 20; and third, 10. Both of these were set at 15 yards.

I want to thank the following people: John, for a fun and challenging match, Melody Morrell, for scoring targets and providing coffee, Bob Morrell for running targets to his wife and for bringing his knife sharpening kit for anyone needing a new edge, and Jim Eikenberry for taking photographs.

The Novelty target is really something, 20 shots at 10 objects (2 per item). It is something of a challenge for the scorekeeper, too. No problem, I'll score whatever gets thrown at me.

SHOOTERS CORNER: One cheap bore solvent is made from one-quarter Castrol water-soluble oil and three-quarters water with a few drops of liquid detergent.

CORRECTION: To my information about the bakery on Peoria Road north of Harrisburg. The name is Country Bakery and it is open from 7 - 5 Friday and Saturday. From the south, pass the Lake Creek Grange on the corner of Lake Drive, next is the Mennonite School, then is the bakery, all on the right. If you go, notice the elderly lady sitting in the corner of the kitchen by the big window overlooking Muddy Creek. She is the bakery owner's mother and next month she will be 101 years old. She's always had a visitor the times we've been there.

GRANNY'S CRANNY: OK, all this talk about the bakery has you hankering for goodies but not wanting to drive to the bakery? Here is one recipe that is great because it is so doggone easy and versatile. It is basically a sponge cake that you can do plain or add to. I like dried cranberries and would consider blueberries, pineapple or even chocolate chips. I make it in paper cups in a muffin tin but a 9" square cake pan would work too.

BASIC WHITE SPONGE CAKE

1 cup sifted all purpose flour ½ cup hot milk

1 tsp baking powder 2 eggs

¼ tsp salt 1 cup sugar

2 tbsp butter 1 tsp vanilla

Sift dry ingredients. Add butter to milk, keep hot. Beat eggs well, gradually add sugar, beating well. Add dry ingredients to blend, then hot ingredients and vanilla.

Oil a 9" pan or use a muffin tin with paper cups (about two thirds full), bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes.

The first "hankies" were used in Italy and from there their use spread throughout Europe. The earliest ones came in whatever shape was convenient for the maker. Then in 1785 Marie Antoinette, Queen of France, issued a royal decree that a handkerchief *must* be square in shape. And so they have remained ever since, from a lady's small lacy square to a cowboy's huge bandanna.'

My complaint is that the traditional soft and absorbent bandanna we grew up with has been replaced by an article that more resembles paper in feel. I bought one of those from REI thinking a good laundering would fix that.

After 2 runs through the washing machine with no improvement I put the still-stiff item into a pot on the stove and gave it a good boiling. It made no difference. I returned the bandanna to REI and got my money back. Bandannas and neck/head scarves are historically correct for the fur trade era if of appropriate material.

RETURN TO ENUMCLAW

The mood was festive for the Cascade Mountain Men show which was back in Enumclaw after a number of years in Monroe followed by cancellations due to the corona virus. Washington's mask mandate was dropped on Friday so it was good to see familiar faces with smiles! Lorraine Hayden was there with a big sales area and Sara Smith was next to her with her hand-braided rugs. At least 10 of our Frontier Heritage Fair vendors were present. This show occupies two large buildings with tons of stuff to make any muzzleloader shooter or historic re-enactor drool. There was even a colonial fife and drum corps marching about.
