→ From the Pastor →

"Therefore we must pay greater attention to what we have heard, so we do not drift away from it."

Hebrews 2:1

It is officially summer! Time, perhaps, to spend more time outside. For me, it's spending time at my cottage on Silver Lake (between renters). There are many docks that sit right on the lake, rented by cottage owners based on when they added their names to the list of people who wanted a dock. It can take years for your name to reach the top of the list. But, when you are offered a dock, for many people, it's time to get a boat.



There are many different kinds of boats that reside at people's docks. There are motor boats, jet skis, party boats, canoes and the lowly kayak. For some people, tying their boat to their dock isn't a problem. A party boat is hardly going to float away. But canoes and kayaks are another story. They can often be found several dock spaces down from where they started, even if they have been tethered by a (long) rope. It is amazing to see where the current in the lake will take them. They drift on the current, and before their owners realize it, they are many spaces away from where they started.

I think we can find ourselves in the same space as those canoes and kayaks, drifting away from where we started. It's easy. We start firmly grounded in our faith, and sure that we are following God's guidance. Then, we begin to drift. Perhaps we are influenced by commentators on television (some can hardly be called news reporters, as the slants they give their reports can take them far from the facts. Talk about drifting!) We listen, nodding our heads as we find ourselves agreeing with the point of view being espoused by the 'reporter.' Soon, we find ourselves looking at the world around us, and the people who inhabit that world, with that same view. We judge others by that viewpoint. We claim that viewpoint as our own. But, wait, do we really want some commentator to influence us so much that we begin to look at things through his or her lens? What happened to looking at the world through God's eyes? We have drifted without realizing it.

Now, it's time to pay greater attention to what we have heard and read..not heard from the commentators, but heard from the church. Not read in some online blog, but read in the Bible. It's time to recenter ourselves on God, and living according to God's direction. We live in a world created by God. Our neighbors, our friends, even our enemies, are children of God. Jesus distilled all the Ten Commandments down to two: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." (Matthew 22: 37-39).

Let us not drift away.

Sunday, July 2 (8:00 a.m.): Women's breakfast at Brady J's.



● Pipe Organ Tuning

Parsons Pipe Organ Builders has been taking care of our pipe organ for many years. Twice each year they come to tune it; this year Ryett Boni and a fellow co-worker came to make

sure all was well. He was gracious enough to take a few pictures and explain a bit about what they do.



"When we arrive at the church we first inspect all elements of the organ to make sure everything is functioning properly.

If we see pipes are dirty (dust, dirt, cobwebs, etc.) and it's affecting the pipe speech, then we'll pull the pipes and vacuum them to clean them.

Once everything is functioning properly, we then move on to each pipe. Depending on the type of pipe, some have sliders, some have metal wires, and some have metal scrolls. We may





slightly tap a metal slider on a pipe. The ones with scrolls aren't tapped- we just slightly roll or unroll them. This process for each pipe adjusts the pitch of the pipe - aka tuning it!"

Thank you, Parsons Pipe Organ Builders, and Ryett, for the work you do.
