James 2:1-17

Faithful Christians do not show partiality to the rich and powerful of the world, especially at the expense of the poor and weak. Likewise, faith does not pay mere lip service to God's will. Instead, a living Christian faith expresses itself in acts of compassion and mercy for those in need.


R ¹My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? ²For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, ³ and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? ⁵Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? ⁶But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? ⁷Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? ⁸You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ⁹But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. ¹⁰For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. ¹¹For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. ¹²So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. ¹³For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment. ¹⁴What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

GOSPEL VERSE

GOSPEL Mark 7:24-37

In Mark's gospel, encounters with women usually signify turning points in Jesus' ministry. Here, a conversation with a Syrophoenician woman marks the beginning of his mission to the Gentiles.

- P 24 Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, 25 but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. 26 Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. 74 He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." 28 But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." 29 Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." 30 So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. 31 Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. 32 They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. 33 He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. 34 Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." 35 And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. 36 Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. 37 They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

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Burke Lutheran (aka the Pumpkin Hollow Church) Timeline

Names of the founding families: Gulleckson, Olson (2 families), Nilsen, Tellefsen, Nelsen, Torgersen, Christensen, Gundersen, Larsen, and Jacobsen (2 families).

August 26th, 1851: First Worship(First Service was originally going to be held on August 16th 1851 but was cancelled due to bad weather preventing the pastor from traveling), Burke is part of the Norway Grove, Spring Prairie, and Bonnet Prairie Parish. Rev. H. A. Preus presided as the Parish Pastor. He and his wife Linka Preus had just emigrated from Norway in May and arrived in Wisconsin in July. Rev. Preus Presided over his first worship service on August 10th 1851 at Norway Grove Lutheran Church in DeForest, WI. Burke was originally called Sun Prairie Lutheran Church of Burke. Rev. H. A. Preus' original contract with Burke was to perform 12 services a year for \$36.00 with bonuses for baptisms, weddings, and funerals.

1853: Burke is one of the founding congregations of the newly formed Norwegian Synod

November 1869: Church votes to purchase ¾ of an acre of land from Herman Bergeland in order to build the church.

February 6th, 1871: A vote is taken, and construction begins on the original church building with a budget of \$412.00

1876: Rev. C.K. Preus the son of Rev. R.A. Preus is called as an assistant pastor for the Parish churches due to overwhelming church growth between the various congregations.

1877: The first vote is taken proposing that Burke and Bethel (downtown Madison) split off from the parish to form their own parish believing they needed their own pastor.

May 2nd, 1882: Burke and Bethel officially form their own parish and call Rev. Severin Gunderson as their pastor.

September 16th, 1884: the first building is officially dedicated

February 18th 1887: Burke and Bethel vote to leave the Norwegian Synod in response to the "Missouri Interpretation" and join the Anti-Missouri Brotherhood.

June 1890: Burke helps organize and create the United Lutheran Church Synod

December 1890: – Burke and Bethel call Rev. Gerhard Rasmussen

March 1895: Call Rev. Theodore Eggen

February 18th 1899: Congregation votes to build a new building. The last service in the first church building will be held on April 2nd 1899

June 18th 1899: The cornerstone is laid by Olaf Gulseth, and on October 22nd 1899 the new building is dedicated.

1905: Bethel votes to separate from Burke and become an independent congregation. Burke then votes to align with Norway Grove after Rev. Eggen resigns. Burke then inherits Rev. J.A. Aasgaard who was already serving Norway Grove Lutheran Church.

1911: Burke and Norway Grove call Rev. N. A. Stubkjaer.

1917: The United Lutheran Church, The Norwegian Synod, and The Hauge Synod all join together to become the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America

July 1918: Burke and Norway Grove call O.J.H. Preus who is the grandson of H.A. Preus and the son of C.K. Preus, making him the third generation of that family to serve as a pastor at Burke.

1927: Burke and Norway Grove call Rev. J.O. Tweeten

1937: The stained glass is installed in honor of Knute Reindahl a violin maker and a member of one of Burke's oldest families (the giant Oak tree that fell last summer was planted on the Reindahl family plot in 1887).

1941: Pipe Organ is installed

1944: Rev. Axel Anderson is called

February 1st, 1948: We officially change our name to Burke Lutheran Church (Official name until this time was The Sun Prairie Lutheran Church of Burke)

1951: The Norwegian Lutheran Church of America changes its name to the Evangelical Lutheran Church.

1953: Burke and Norway Grove call Rev. Phillip C. Hiller

1954: Burke and Norway Grove vote to separate and become independent church bodies.

1954: Parsonage is built

1955: Burke calls Rev. John H. Johnson

1960: The Evangelical Lutheran Church merges with several other synods to form the American Lutheran Church or ALC

1963: Burke calls Rev. Eugene Skibbe

1964: Burke calls Rev. Hector D. Gunderson

1964: the Parish hall is built and dedicated

1969: the Narthex is expanded.

1973: Burke Calls David S. Magnuson

1979: Burke purchases the "Moses" land which expands our property by 31 acres

1985: Elevator is installed

1986: Burke calls Rev. James T. Bean the 3rd

1988: The American Lutheran Church merges with the Lutheran Church of America and several other smaller church bodies to form the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA)

August 2001: Burke Calls Rev. Russ Leeper

July 2011: Burke Calls Rev. Josh Ehrler

October 2014: Burke Calls Pastor Robert Neubert

July 7, 2019: Ground Breaking and construction begins on new church addition.

March 1, 2020: Final service in old sanctuary location.

July, 2020: Sanctuary moved to new location.
