May We Be the Light This Chanukah and Beyond

As we start our preparations for Chanukah here at Temple and in our homes, I share this story with you, which I have adapted from the author Simone Zelitch.

The Miracle of the Oil

Once, in the age of the Maccabees, there lived an old Jew named Eleazar, who guarded the courtyard of the Holy Temple while a single flask of oil burned for eight days. Because he had stood watch while the miracle took place, there were some who believed he had taken on a little of its glory and a little of its

light. After a while, in spite of his good sense, Eleazar began to believe it himself.

Then, one day, Eleazar had a visitor. A lamp-maker knocked on his door, and said, "I need to make peace with you, Eleazar. When I heard we only had one flask of oil for the rededication, I found a little oil in my shop, and I slipped it past you into the sanctuary and fed the flame. I knew you needed it, so I just added it to the flame"

Eleazar was stunned. The flame that burned was in a holy place in the Temple, and only the High Priest was permitted there. Common Jews were not allowed there. It stood to reason that the lamp maker should have been struck dead. But clearly, he'd meant no harm. So Eleazar said, "The Lord works through plain and honest Jews like you. Go in peace."

So Eleazar made peace with the knowledge that God worked a wonder through an ordinary man. But then, one day, he had another visitor, a woman. Her hair was white, and her expression, haunted. Eleazar greeted her with courtesy, for she was Hannah, the heroine who'd lost her seven sons because they wouldn't bow down to a pagan god. Hannah said, "Something lays on my heart and I must make peace with you, old Eleazar."

Eleazar said, "no one deserves peace more than you." "Then I will speak," said Hannah. "When I heard there was only a single flask of oil for the rededication, I couldn't bear to think that the flame would go out. I had a flask I'd once used to comb through the hair of my seven sons. It was good oil, and now I had no use for it, so I slipped past you, Eleazar, and into the Sanctuary, and fed the flame." Eleazar caught his breath. It was thought in those times, that women weren't allowed in a sacred place. This was not holy! He couldn't control his anger or his confusion, for Hannah was an honorable woman, for whom no tribute was too great. How could he condemn her? So he took a deep breath, centered himself and said, "go in peace."

That night, Eleazar could not sleep. He wrapped himself in his shawl, thinking and praying, he did not hear his next visitor arrive.

It was a young man, with a shaved chin, and clipped curls, who stood half-naked in the cold. Eleazar recoiled from the sight of him. He said, "You're wise to come at night. If pious Jews found you here by daylight, you'd be dead."

With a nervous smile the man said, "I am a Jew." "A Hellenized Jew, a Secular Jew" Eleazar said. "You've come from the gymnasium, where Greeks teach youths to turn their backs on God and worship their bodies. It was your kind who caused the rebellion in the first place!"

The religious Maccabees fought not just against the Assyrian Greeks, but also against the secularized Hellenized Jews who were part of Greek society.

"I am still a Jew," said the young man. "I am also Greek. Is that impossible?" Bitterly, Eleazar said, "Oil and water don't mix."

"Don't they?" The young man cocked his head. "Funny Old Eleazar, that you should bring up oil. We have quite a bit of olive oil at the gymnasium. We oil our bodies to make them beautiful. And rumor came to us that you were short of oil. That should have meant nothing to me, yet somehow it did, something inside of me stirred. So one night, I snuck into the holy Temple, I brought that oil, and fed the flame and kept the fire burning for our Jewish people."

He said to the man, "The Maccabees fought against the likes of you."

"Yet I am a Jew," the young man said again. Eleazar could not speak. He took a long look at the young man's face and saw there pride, anger, remorse, and a deep need to be told he had a share in the Temple, in Judaism. After a moment, with great effort, he took the young man's hand. "Go in peace," he said, "You have a Jewish soul."

He wanted to say more, but before he'd gathered words enough, the young man had gone. Eleazar could not sleep that night, pondering the oil poured by transgressors. Was he right to grant them peace? In the days of the Judges, they would have been condemned. In the days of the Prophets, they would have been chastised. Yet, Eleazar knew, there were no more Judges in Israel, and the age of Prophets had ended long ago. Now, Jews found God in each other, in acts of courage and in acts of kindness. God's arms are open. God forgives. God answers light with light.

Eleazar might have gone to sleep then, but someone else appeared at the door. "Old Eleazar," the voice was thick and the words slurred together. Eleazar did not return the greeting. "Old Eleazar," the visitor said again. "I've come to make my peace with you."

"Take your peace and go." Said Eleazar.

"I've come to tell you something. About the oil ,old Eleazar."

"I know. It was a miracle.," said Eleazar, "Now take your peace, friend, and go."

"You call me friend? But our people are deadly enemies. Do you grant friendship so easily?"

Then Eleazar looked up. In his doorway stood a man with shaggy hair and brilliant eyes. He wore a lion's skin and carried a tall carved staff. Bracing himself, Eleazar said, "You are a Canaanite."

"I am," the man replied. "My people have lived next to your people for thousands of years, Elazar. Our fates are bound together. And together we rededicated the Temple."

"You did not enter God's Temple." Said Eleazar, and he turned away.

The Canaanite said, "I did. We gave you oil, all we had."

Eleazar looked coldly at the man.

"I stand before you, old man, at great peril to my life," the Canaanite said. "Would you rather that there was no flame then, Eleazar? Would you rather see the flame go out than to work together?"

For the first few moments, Eleazar was silent. Then quietly, "Go in peace." (continued on page 22)

Consecration and First Grade Shabbat, Friday, December 1st

On Friday, December 1st at the 6:30 PM Shabbat Service, the Kindergarten, First Grade and all new students in grades 2, 3 and 4 of the Kehillat Torah Sunday School will be helping to lead the Consecration and First Grade Shabbat. The education of a Jewish child is a joint venture shared by both family and the Jewish community. Consecration is a ceremony used in Reform and Conservative congregations to mark the beginning of formal Jewish education. It is a ritual that dedicates the students to Jewish learning for all time. During this group ceremony, students will be given a small replica of a torah to symbolize the start of their study of torah. The students have been

working diligently during their weekly music and Judaic classes preparing art work and learning both English and Hebrew prayers and songs in preparation of this important milestone. .

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Presidential Address



FEDERAL TAX BILL MAY DIMINISH VALUE OF TAX DEDUCTIONS FOR CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS STARTING NEXT YEAR, SO ACT BY DECEMBER 31st!

Our December/January column is intended to benefit our congregation and to leave more money in our Democrat, Republican and third party members (not to mention, independents!) congregants' pockets. How often can you

improve your financial lot as a result of something that you read in The Window?

Page 2 of the 2016 Republican Party platform stated, "Because of the vital role of religious organizations, charities, * * * in fostering generosity and patriotism, * * * donations to them should remain deductible." However, in a November 16, 2016 New York Times article in Philanthropy News Digest, Paul Sullivan reported that if President-elect Trump follows through on his campaign promises, nearly all tax incentives to be philanthropic could be eliminated. Under Mr. Trump's proposed tax plan, deductions for all itemized deductions – including charitable contributions- would be capped at \$200,000 per couple. FoxNews.com stated, "As for personal income tax rates, Trump would create four brackets of rates varying from 12% to 33%. * * * at the same time over 90% of Americans would no longer have to itemize their deductions."

Your TBS co-Presidents believe that despite appeal after appeal more of our members could support our congregation more generously in relation to their means (Prior to 2008 TBS formally required a means-sensitive building fund commitment with a "standard" of \$5000 over 5 to 10 years as a component of congregational membership [This was dropped in anticipation of our 2008 Capital Campaign effort.]).


The Temple's sound financial foundation is of major importance to Rabbis Bar-Lev and Herzog as well as our lay

leadership. We ask you to look in your heart-of hearts as to the Temple's significance to you and your family's quality of life. 

The Kosher Bookworm

The Israeli Military Superpower

Last month, The Kosher Bookworm took the liberty of piggybacking off the TBS Veterans Day Shabbat and featuring books on U.S. and Israeli veterans and the battles they have so courageously fought. (By the way, if you missed the TBS Veterans Day Shabbat, you missed an evening full of honoring veterans, both those alive and those of blessed memory, and patriotic songs sung by the choir and the congregation. It was a very stirring night - ask anyone who was in attendance.) This month the Kosher Bookworm turns to Israeli regional military superi-

ority via advanced technology.

The book is The Weapon Wizards: How Israel Became a High-Tech Military Superpower, by Yaakov Katz and Amir Bohbot,

2017, St. Martin's Press. The book makes the case Israel is surrounded by enemies, even with two Arab nations, Egypt and Jordan, having made peace with Israel. These enemies include non-government organizations, for example, Hezbollah, Hamas and Jihad. Of note is enemy combatants greatly outnumber the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) including the reserve. Also, Israel is a relatively small land mass making a surprise land attack potentially more devastating by the fact it can be overrun before Israeli troops have an opportunity to fully mobilize. Lastly, the former Soviet Union and today's Russia have sided against Israel by suppling weapons, ammunition, knowhow and manpower to Israel's foes.

Israeli military and government has long ago, perhaps even before the Israeli War for Independence, made a strategic decision to overwhelm any enemy aggression, by superior defensive and offensive weaponry. This has come to mean heavy investment in technology by building an Israeli Defense Industry with highly focused research, development and production capabilities. Israel had to become its own independent supplier of superior weapons because it could not count on direct support or sales from even friendly nations, such as the U.S. It has been extremely costly -- but what is this investment when compared to survivability?

In addition to the weapons design and manufacture, two other major points are made in the book: 1) Most Israeli weapon engineers have previous battle experience, due to compulsory military service, giving them a perspective to know what it will take to protect the military, as well as the civilian population, and to take the war to the enemy. That is, lessons learned in battle are transferred directly to design requirements, and 2) Israel has taken it brightest high school graduates and put them through rigorous multi-disciplined training. This is known as the Talpiot where graduates of this program are sent to various military units to study the military capability and to imagine conceptual designs to close the capability gaps.

The Israeli Defense Industry has designed, developed and produced high grade weapon systems. These include fighter aircraft, battle tanks, protective armor plating, both surveillance

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and attack drones, reconnaissance satellites and their launching rockets, missiles, tunnel locators, cyber warfare viruses and more. These weapon systems meet the highest requirements for functionality, reliability, durability and quality. It has been highly rumored, but for security reasons neither admitted nor denied, Israel has a nuclear offensive delivery capability.

The book is well written by journalists. For anyone interested in Israel's survival, it is a must read.

And Perhaps in those moments of silence, Eleazar realized that following the spirit of the law is more important than following the letter of the law – that working together, that standing up for one another, that appreciating differences and celebrating similarities will enable us all to see God in one another, regardless of religion or beliefs.

As we begin the holiday of Chanukah following what has been a challenging year for our country on all sides of the spectrum, the values of Chanukah may speak to us in a new and important way. We must be the light. We must feed the flame. Just as Judah Maccabee and the army he assembled stood up for their beliefs so that Judaism could survive, we must work to light each other's flames when we are seemingly out of oil. We can speak out when we perceive injustice. We can stand up for those who are most needy in our community. We can safeguard the values we hold closest by doing the right thing – by coming together where we are most needed. It is up to us to help make miracles happen in our time, to be God's hands and mouths on earth.

Soon, it will be Chanukah, our celebration of light, of freedom, of miracles. May we, during these days of light, stand together with one another and support each other in our times of need. May we realize that God doesn't make miracles happen alone, that each of us is God's partner, and we must work to make miracles happen in our time. May we fill the oil when no one is looking. May we be the light. Then we will truly be able to say, "Nes Gadol Haya Po," a great miracle happened here.
