I heard these words read and preached at a funeral I attended this week. Rev. Church News & Updates

Red Cross Blood Drive

The First Congregational Church no longer sponsors or hosts Red Cross Blood Drives. Many thanks to all the volunteers and donors who came to help in such a worthwhile cause. We regret not being an official participant in the blood drives but we do encourage those who still wish to volunteer their time, service or blood to continue to do so by working with the Red Cross directly. Thank you all for everything.

Fundraising

Thanks to Nick Glamack and all the volunteers who help sell the BBQ chicken, our two fundraisers this year were a rousing success; both were sold out. And our thanks to the community who continues to support these BBQ sales. They really are a great way to enjoy fellowship and make money to help support the church and its mission. • Roof Repair (Update)

The church's Board of Trustees has been planning for a new church roof for some time now. While the current 30+ year old roof remains in good condition, the trustees have been thinking and planning ahead for its replacement. This includes the replacement of the

shingles on the two peak roofs (the main building housing the sanctuary plus the one over fellowship hall).

In 2021, the trustees applied for and received a \$15,000 grant from the Landmark Conservancy's Sacred Sites Program. This is a matching grant, and must be used by spring, 2023. So far, the generous church members and friends have donated over \$8500. The trustees are deeply grateful for your willingness to help with this project. If you have not had the opportunity to make such a donation, and would like to do that, or would like to make another gift, the trustees will gladly, and, again, gratefully, accept it. What has not been given will come from the undesignated funds in the church's savings account.

The trustees have gotten estimates from three roofers and decided to go with Cameron Roofing from Penfield. They will be beginning the work this fall.

All Saints Day (Observed Sunday, November 6)

This day is to commemorate all Christians. It is held, not only to remember saints, but also to remember all those who have died who were members of the church congregation.

We will celebrate the memories of our loved ones on Sunday, November 6. Please plan to bring in a picture of your departed ones (or a candle if you've no picture) to place on the altar.






• Thursday, October 20 (9:30 a.m.): The church book club meets in Pastor Sue's office; they will discuss the book *The Summer House* by James Patterson.
