Attended the Monthly VSO roundtable with the Hospital Director. As of yesterday (27 Jan) the screening process at the front door has been discontinued. Masks are still required, but there will be no screeners at the door. Flu Shots are available for free for all Veterans. The official name of the Richmond VA has been changed to "The Richmond VA Medical Center." It is no longer the McGuire VA Hospital and was changed due to DOD Policy.

The COMPACT Act of 2020 was fully implemented as of January 17 of this year and allows Veterans in a suicide emergency to go to any VA facility, or any health care facility, to receive free emergency care, including ambulance transportation cost, inpatient care for up to 30 days, or outpatient care for up to 90 days. This care is free for all Veterans, regardless of whether you are signed up for VA care. I will send all the details to Rich to put in the next Scuttlebutt, along with the links to find out more about it.

News from Hunter Holmes McGuire VA Hospital

Change in Screening Process

Effective Friday, January 27, Central Virginia VA Health Care System (CVHCS) has removed the contracted screener company from the entrances at all locations.

Masks are still mandatory for everyone, and the safety of everyone is our highest priority. Mask stands will be placed at the entrances in lieu of screeners, and all Veterans, visitors and employees who enter CVHCS facilities must put on a mask upon entering.

Flu Shots

Flu Shots are still available. Ask your Primary Care Team during your next appointment.

If you've already received your Flu Shot out in the community, we'd like to know.

We just need to know the location and date you received your Flu Shot. You can let your Primary Care Team know during your next visit, or call us at 804-675-5000. Also, you can send your Primary Care Team a secure message through MyHealtheVet.

Name Change – Richmond VA Medical Center

The Department of Veterans Affairs has renamed the Hunter Holmes McGuire VA Medical Center in Richmond, Virginia, to the Richmond VA Medical Center.

The renaming aligns with the Department of Defense's efforts to remove and rename symbols commemorating Confederate figures. The change comes after a letter sent to VA by the late Representative Donald McEachin in 2022, which requested that VA remove the McGuire name from the VAMC.

"After considerable discussion and review of the issue, and with the support of local Veterans, community members, leaders, and VA employees, I have decided to rename the Hunter Holmes McGuire VA Medical Center to the Richmond VA Medical Center," said VA Secretary Denis McDonough. "VA will continue to serve *all* Veterans with dignity and respect, at this facility and every facility."

VA has limited authority to rename its facilities; however, statute 38 U.S.C. § 531 permits the VA Secretary to change the name of a facility for the geographic area in which it is located so long as the previous name was not set forth in public law.

COMPACT Act

Starting January 17, 2023, Veterans in suicidal crisis should go to a VA or community health care facility to receive free emergency health care – including ambulance transportation costs – and be eligible for inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days, and outpatient care for up to 90 days, including social work.

This Month in Marine Corps History

20 February 1962, First American to Orbit the Earth

Glenn entered the Naval Aviation Cadet Program in March 1942. He graduated and was commissioned in the Marine Corps in 1943. After advanced training, he joined Marine Fighter Squadron 155 and spent a year flying F-4U fighters in the Marshall Islands. He flew 59 combat missions during World War II.

After the war, he was a member of Marine Fighter Squadron 218 on the North China patrol and served on Guam. From June 1948 to December 1950 he served as an instructor in advanced flight training at Corpus Christi, Texas. He then attended Amphibious Warfare Training at Quantico, Va.

In Korea he flew 63 missions with Marine Fighter Squadron 311. As an exchange pilot with the Air Force Glenn flew 27 missions in the F-86 Sabre. In the last nine days of fighting in Korea, Glenn shot down three MiGs in combat along the Yalu River.

Glenn attended Test Pilot School at the Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Md. After graduation, he was project officer on a number of aircraft. He was assigned to the Fighter Design Branch of the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics (now Bureau of Naval Weapons) in Washington from November 1956 to April 1959. During that time he also attended the University of Maryland.


In July 1957, while he was project officer of the F-8U Crusader, he set a transcontinental speed record from Los Angeles to New York -- 3 hours and 23 minutes. It was the first transcontinental flight to average supersonic speed.

Glenn accumulated nearly 9,000 hours of flying time, about 3,000 of it in jets.

After his selection as a Mercury astronaut, Glenn was assigned to the NASA Space Task Group at Langley, Va., in April 1959. The Space Task Group was moved to Houston and became part of the NASA Manned Spacecraft Center (now Johnson Space Center in Houston) in 1962. Before his 4-hour, 55-minute flight in the Friendship 7 capsule, Glenn had served as backup pilot for astronauts Alan Shepard, the first American in space who flew on May 5, 1961, and to Virgil "Gus" Grissom, who followed Shepard on a suborbital flight of his own.

When astronauts were assigned to provide pilot input for the design and development of spacecraft, Glenn specialized in cockpit layout and control functioning, including some of the early designs for the Apollo Project.

Glenn was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross on six occasions, and holds the Air Medal with 18 Clusters for his service during World War II and Korea. Glenn also received the Navy Unit Commendation for service in Korea, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, the American Campaign Medal, the World War II Victory Medal, the China Service Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Korean Service Medal, the United Nations Service Medal, the Korean Presidential Unit Citation, the Navy's astronaut Wings, the Marine Corps' Astronaut Medal, the NASA Distinguished Service Medal, and the Congressional Space Medal of Honor.

The Houston-Holicky-Sitter Veterans’ Forum is an informal forum for veterans of all branches of the armed forces. Col. Joseph J. Holicky, Jr. (USMC, ret.) and Congressional Medal of Honor recipient Col. Carl L. Sitter (USMC, ret.) began having lunch together in the mid 1970’s following their retirements. Over the years other veterans and local active duty Marines joined them for lunch. In the early 1980’s Lt. Col. L.W. “Chip” Houston (USMCR, ret.) became part of the leadership team and served as its Master of Ceremonies for over 25 years. Today nearly 100 veterans meet each month to carry on the HHS tradition and to hear prominent guest speakers address military history, national security issues, and other topics of interest to veterans.

HHS is apolitical, and promotion of political interests is prohibited. HHS is a not-for-profit group, but it is neither a 501c3 nor a 501c4 organization.



Peter Behr is senior energy reporter for Politico's E&E News, an online news report that covers energy, environmental and climate news.

At E&E News, Pete has reported on cybersecurity threats to critical energy infrastructure; advanced nuclear reactors including fusion energy; power blackouts and extreme weather challenges to energy delivery, and climate policy and transitions to carbon-free electricity and electric vehicles.

Before joining E&E News, he was a reporter and editor at The Washington Post for 24 years, including five years as assistant managing editor in charge of business and financial coverage. As business editor he oversaw an investigative reporting project on insider stock trading on Wall Street that won a Pulitzer Prize. His articles have also appeared in the online New York Times, Scientific American, CQ Global Researcher, the Environmental Law Journal, and the New Yorker magazine.

He was part of a Washington Post investigative team that wrote a 25,000-word account of the fall of Enron Corp., in 2002, which was selected as one of the "Best Business Crime Stories of the Year" in 2002, and was nominated by The Post for a Pulitzer Prize.

Before joining The Post, he was a Washington correspondent for the Baltimore Sun, a congressional reporter and White House correspondent for the Gannett News Service's Washington Bureau, and a news reporter for The Times-Union newspaper in Rochester, N.Y., the Gannett Co.'s headquarters.

While working for the Rochester paper, he was assigned to write a series of "Hometown Reports" about American servicemen from Rochester and other Gannett newspapers who were serving in Vietnam, spending six weeks there in January-March 1966. He returned for another month of reporting in Vietnam in 1967, and went a third time, in 1973.

He graduated in 1962 from Colgate University, joining the Rochester paper. He enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserves in 1963 and later received a commission as a Second Lieutenant. He was married in 1962 to his high school sweetheart, Marty Nettleton. They have three children and six grandchildren.

He received a Nieman Fellowship in 1975 for an academic year of study at Harvard University, and was a Public Policy Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson Institute in 2004.

He is the co-author of "The Leading Edge," profiles of U.S. business leaders published by McGraw Hill, and wrote an updated version of "Outline of the U.S. Economy" for the State Department.


He has served on the board of the Falls Church Education Foundation, the Society of American Business Editors and Writers, and the Washington Revels performing arts group.
