




## SNAP ENROLLMENT INCREASE

#### CONTINUED SAFETY NET DEPENDENCE VS. WORK

When parents remained in the safety net long-term:

## But parents who found employment:

- Incomes decreased
- Physical health worsened
- Psychological well-being declined

- Financial strain and food insecurity dropped
- Physical, emotional, and psychological health improved
- Better health and behavioral outcomes for their children

Current problems with the safety net and workforce systems:

Difficult to navigate for recipients


Doesn't look at whole person solutions to poverty

Safety net & workforce programs disconnected

Duplication of administration

#### The Utah Solution

- No wrong door:
   Human services are support services to work
- Consolidation & integration
- Saved Utah \$8 million

Before One Door, Utah's employment-topopulation ratio was 4.2% higher than US; today it is 7.3% higher than the rest of the US.

## **Quickest COVID** unemployment recovery

By August 2020, Utah's unemployment rate plummeted to 4.9% (vs. 8.4% nationwide). By December 2020, it was 3.6% (vs. 6.7% nationwide).

# WHY CAN'T STATES REPLICATE UTAH'S SUCCESS?

- Starting in 1998, under both WIA and now WIOA, there is a grandfathering provision that permits states to have a single state local area designation only if they already had one prior to passage of the acts (Utah)
- The Department of Labor cannot waive requirements related to workforce funding allocated to local areas.
- For example, Maine applied for and was denied a waiver for single-state area in 2017.

## STATES CALLING FOR REFORM

### STATE REFORM EFFORTS

#### Texas

- created a taskforce to consolidate workforce development and human services
- also passed a resolution calling on Congress to amend federal law.[6]

#### Louisiana

- Governor issued Executive Order to establish a taskforce
- passed a resolution requiring an audit of coordination between their SNAP, WIOA, TANF, and CCAP programs.

#### North Carolina

• working on legislation directing the Secretary of the Department of Commerce to develop a plan to create a seamless, statewide, comprehensive workforce development program.

## STATE REFORM EFFORTS

Georgia

 passed resolution urging Congress to enact legislation to allow states to provide for the consolidation of federally funded workforce development services with federally funded social safety net services.

Alabama

 passed SB 247 to transform their education and workforce system.

Florida

 passed HB 1507 to better coordinate their workforce systems with their social services and education departments.

## STATE REFORM EFFORTS

Tennessee

 Commissioners wrote a letter asking Congress for flexibility.

Mississippi

 State Workforce Investment Board sent Congress letter asking for flexibility.

#### **CURRENT CONGRESSIONAL ACTION**

- One-Door State Flexibility & Innovation Waivers in the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) was included in the House-passed bipartisan H.R. 6655 and is currently in the Senate draft.
  - House bill: 4 states can receive a waiver. Eligibility = under 6 million population and 60% labor force participation.
  - Senate bill: 4 states can receive a waiver. Eligibility = under 5 million population and 60% labor force participation.
  - Both bills: Pathways to become workforce single-state area designation.



# How Do You Start One Door Integration?

Implementing a One-Door Model in every state will be unique.

- 1. Start with an audit: How many offices, one stop centers, etc. does your state have? What are current program outcomes? Administrative costs?
- 2. Develop a taskforce: Can be done by executive or legislative action.
- 3. Start with the end in mind: What outcomes are you trying to achieve?

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
