Here's what provoked me:

There is incessant rhetorical pounding about racial disparities in our criminal justice system which manifests itself in the epidemic of police shooting black men. In the midst of this controversy, there was a new study published by a Harvard University professor on that exact subject, and the results were quite surprising!
