Class 700: Vegetables

- All produce must be grown by the exhibitor.
- Produce should be uniform in size and shape, crisp, fresh, smooth, rich colour and true to variety; free from cracks, sunburn and disease; nicely trimmed and attractive.
- Place exhibits on appropriate sized plates.

Prize Money: \$8/\$6/\$4 (Items marked with a * replace 1st place prize money)

1. Potatoes – 6, any variety, not scrubbed, clean
2. Tomatoes- Roma variety, stems on to show proof of growing
3. Spanish Onions – 3, any variety, tops trimmed, bulbs clean.
4. Garlic Bulbs – 3, not braided, clean
5. Green Onions – 3, tops trimmed 4-6” above white shank
6. Field Pumpkin – 1, stem trimmed, washed *\$10
7. Spaghetti Squash – 1, stem trimmed, washed
8. Squash, Butternut – 1, stem trimmed, washed
9. Squash, Acorn – 1, stem trimmed, washed
10. Cabbage – 1 head, any variety, edges trimmed and presentation considered
11. Beets – 3, 1” tops, lightly washed, not scrubbed, uniformity considered *\$10
12. Carrots – 3, 1” tops, lightly washed, not scrubbed, uniformity and size considered
13. Tomatoes – 3, red, for slicing, stems on to show proof of growing
14. Cherry Tomatoes – 5, stems on to show proof of growing
15. Hot Peppers – 2, any variety, stem on, lightly cleaned
16. Peppers – 2, any colour, any variety, stem on, lightly cleaned
17. Bell Pepper – 1, stem on, lightly cleaned
18. Beans – 10, any variety, on a plate
19. Kale – 1 head, in suitable container, may include vase with water
20. Garden herbs – collection of 4 stems or more, fresh, different varieties named on tag, 4-8” lengths in container with water

21. Sweet Potatoes – 3, not scrubbed, clean
22. Swiss Chard – any variety, 3 stems in water
23. Leeks – 2
24. Fall Table centerpiece using homegrown vegetables and fruit
25. Garden produce – best collection of at least 6 different kinds of produce, suitable container, quality of produce considered, overall quantity of variety considered, all must be grown by exhibitor, artistic display and uniqueness considered.

- Exhibitor must be 15 years of age or older as of September 1, 2023
- Foliage and blooms should be clean and undamaged
- All flowering plants must have at least one bloom open
- Remove all dead leaves and spent blooms
- Exhibits infected with pests or diseases will be disqualified
- Container must be clean, in proportion to the size of the plant, and not tip over or leak
- In the case of specials, the winner is the exhibitor with the most 1st place ribbons/stickers

Potted Plant (one plant only in the pot, max. 12” wide container)

- Potted plants must be in the exhibitor’s possession for at least 2 months

1. African violet (single crown only)

Cut Flowers

- Must be grown by exhibitor
- Cut flowers to be shown with their own foliage if attached, do not add loose foliage
- a BLOOM is a single flower on a stem with no buds
- Buds showing colour are considered to be open blooms
- a STEM may carry one or more flowers and buds
- a SPIKE or SPRAY is a thick upright stem carrying several flowers and buds

- Uniformity in size, colour, form, stem and foliage is desirable unless a variety is indicated

10. Asters, 3 stems, same or assorted
11. Black-eyed Susan, 1 bloom
12. Butterfly Bush or other flowering shrub, 1 stem
13. Celosia – 1 stem
14. Chrysanthemums, 3 stems, same or assorted
15. Coneflower (Echinacea) – 1 bloom
16. Cosmos, 3 blooms, same or assorted
17. Dahlia bouquet, 3-5 blooms each under 4” across, same or assorted
18. Dahlia, 1 bloom over 4” floating in glass bowl (flower must NOT touch bowl sides)
19. Fern fronds, 3-5 fronds, same or assorted
20. Geranium, 3 stems, same or assorted
21. Gladiola, 1 spike (must not tip over!)
22. Hosta, 1 flower spike and 3 leaves same or assorted
23. Hydrangea, 1 stem, fresh not dried, green colour only *\$7

24. Hydrangea, 1 stem, fresh not dried, any colour other than green *\$7
25. Marigolds, 3 blooms same or assorted
26. Nicotiana (flowering tobacco), 1 stem
27. Ornamental grasses, 5 stems with “seed heads”, same or assorted
28. Petunias, small bouquet of 3 stems, same or assorted
29. Sedum, 3 stems, same or assorted
30. Snapdragons, 1 spike
31. Sunflower, 1 bloom under 6” across
32. Zinnia, 5 blooms each under 3” across, same or assorted
33. Zinnia, 3 blooms each over 3” across, same or assorted

Arrangements:

- no silk flowers or foliage
- no artificially coloured flowers or foliage
- purchased flowers or foliage is allowed
- accessories are allowed
- do not show rubber bands, wire etc. Hide with moss, leaves or other material.
- containers must be clean and in proportion to the size of your arrangement
- given measurements are for the entire arrangement (including container)
- arrangement should be 1-1.5 times the height of the container

*Please note: entries will be available for pick up on Monday, September 18th, BUT W.A.S. highly recommends throwing out and not consuming any foods entered. Entries are handled by multiple people in the judging process and the W.A.S, will not be held liable for any illness that occurs from eating food that has been sitting out for multiple days.

RULES:

- Commercial food vendors are prohibited from exhibiting.
- Entries must be removed from baking pans. Cupcake and muffing papers must be removed.
- Baking to be placed on appropriate sized white disposable plates, aluminum disposable trays or foil covered cardboard.
- Place all items in appropriately sized ziploc bags with the entry tag secured to outside.
- No commercial mixes, fillings or frostings unless otherwise stated.
- Pie /tart shells are to be homemade.
- In case of a tie in the Specials, winner is the Exhibitor with the most 1st place finishes. Note: if you are a junior entering this class, DO NOT put your age on the entry tag.

OASS Butter Tart Competition Information

RULES: (no fruit, no nuts, no raisins, no pecans)

- Entry must be made solely by the person entering competition, including pastry.
- Competition is open to all exhibitors.
- Number of butter tarts to be shown at local Fair/Exhibition to be determined by each individual Fair/Exhibition.
- District/Provincial competition rules must be posted in the prize book of each local Fair/Exhibition.

District Competition

- The entrant must have won the butter tart competition at the local Fair/Exhibition to be eligible to enter the district competition.
- The size of the tarts must be full size tarts.(no mini or bite size tarts)
- A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown.
- Tarts must not contain fruit or nuts (ie: no raisins, no pecans).
- Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the Exhibitor's name and address using the entry tag provided.
- Prize money to be paid by the district.

Provincial Competition

- The entrant must have won the District Competition to be eligible to enter the Ontario Associations of Agricultural Societies Competition at the convention.
- In the case where the District winner is unable to sent an entry to the convention then the 2nd prize district winner will be eligible to enter.
- The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (no mini or bite size tarts).
- A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown.
- Tarts must not contain fruit or nuts (ie: no raisins, no pecans.)
- Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the Exhibitor's name and address using the entry tag provided.
- 1st, 2nd and 3rd place entries will not be returned to exhibitor but will be placed for auction at the convention.

GLUTEN FREE PECAN PIE BARS

Crust:

- 1 cup butter + 2 tbsp.
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp. Salt
- 3 cups "Bob's Red Mill" gluten free 1-1 baking flour

Filling:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tbsp. cream

1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. vanilla
2 cups pecan halves

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
Line 9 X 9 “ pan with parchment paper.

For crust, beat butter, and brown sugar until fluffy. Add salt and flour. Mix well.
Press dough into bottom of prepared pan and chill x 20 minutes. Bake in oven x 20 minutes.
Cool completely.

Reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees.

Combine butter, granulated sugar, brown sugar and cream in saucepan.
Bring mixture to a boil stirring constantly. Boil x 2 minutes, then remove from heat,
Stir in salt, vanilla and pecans and pour over cooled crust.
Bake at 325 degrees x 15-20 minutes until filling is bubbly and sides golden brown.
Cool completely before cutting.

1 cup sugar

3 eggs

1 1/2 tsp vanilla

3/4 cup milk

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Beat butter, sugar, and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating till well mixed. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add 1/2 of the flour mixture into the egg mixture. Then add 1/2 of the milk. Repeat with remaining flour and then remainder of milk. Mix until combined.

Cover 9 X 13" pan with foil. Make little x's in foil with knife and push empty ice cream cones in. Cones should be supported.

Fill cones 1/2 way with batter. Bake x 20 minutes or until cake bounces back. Decorated with icing, sprinkles etc.
