**Endless Summer**

on't be long till summertime is here! For me nothing captures the spirit of summer like the Beach Boys album Endless Summer. Every now and then we hear our song, and we remember the great summers of our youth. How often do we catch ourselves trying to relive those times: the warmth of the sun and fun, fun, fun.

Judaism has its own endless summer, but it is anything but fun - it is an annual

reliving of tragic events. When it comes to the fast of the 17th of Tammuz and the ninth of Av the Mishna tells us that on each date five tragedies befell the Jewish people, the most famous of which is the destruction of both the first and second Temple in Jerusalem on

the ninth of Av. Perhaps less well-known but equally important, on the 17th of Tammuz Moses came down from Mount Sinai and, seeing the golden calf, broke the two tablets on which were written the 10 Commandments.

Then, just over a year later, on the ninth of Av, the Jewish people were panicked by the report of the spies and rejected the land of Israel. It is these two foundational events, the breaking of the tablets on the 17th of Tammuz and the rejection of the land of Israel on the ninth of Av, that established these days as times of tragedy for the Jewish people summer after

summer. Not only do we remember these events every summer but again and again on these days the endless cycle of summer tragedy has repeated itself throughout our history.

That Jewish history repeats itself year after year on a specific date has a positive side as well. After the sin of the golden calf, Moses returns to G-d and successfully pleads for forgiveness of the Jewish people. The symbol of this forgiveness, the second tablets, are

> presented to the Jewish people on the 10th day of Tishri; thus did that day become a day of forgiveness year after year, the holy day of Yom Kippur.

Let's end on a lighter note: as we enjoy the warmth of the sun all summer long, let's catch

a wave, get around, don't worry baby, and be

true to your school shul.

P.S.: Can you name all seven songs from Endless Summer referred to in this article? If not, ask Peggy – *Endless Summer* is one of her favorites!

## THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian Fifty Percent Grey

he number 50 plays a large role in Judaic law, lore and history. For example, every 50 years brings on the Jubilee year (*Yovel* in Hebrew) in which property returns to historical owners, indentured servants are released and returned to their homes, and the *Shofar* is sounded on *Yom Kippur*. In addition, the 50th day after the first day of *Passover* marks the anniversary of the giving of the *Torah* which we celebrate during *Shavuot*. Finally, in a standard marriage contract, or *Ketubah*, a wife is promised 50 shekels in the event she survives her husband or is divorced. I could go on and on.

Fifty also plays a large role in our recent history. To begin, in 1897, Theodore Herzl famously wrote, "At Basel, I founded the Jewish State. If I said this out loud today, I would be answered by universal laughter. Perhaps in five years, certainly in fifty, everyone will know it." Fifty years later, in 1947, Great Britain announced that they were terminating the Palestinian mandate which was a significant step in the formal declaration of the Jewish State in May of 1948. Next, in 1967, the fabric of the entire world shook when a simple three word report in Hebrew proclaimed, "Har Habayit Biyadeinu," "The temple mount is in our hands." Jerusalem, so long divided with the holy temple mount under Arab League rule, was finally liberated and reunified. Just a few short days ago, Jerusalem celebrated the jubilee anniversary of that seminal moment in world events.

It has been an exciting week marked with many acts of historical significance that included the first visit to the Western Wall by a sitting American president. Jerusalem today is the undivided capital of Israel; the state has made it clear that it will ever so remain.

Yes, the number 50 has had a large role this year. But, I think there is, perhaps, a deeper meaning that we can draw on this 50th Anniversary of

The Scroll...4 Yom Yerushalayim, Jerusalem Day.

When I was young, I recall my mother of blessed memory telling me of her life in New York as a young teenager. Mom was 12



when the war ended and a member of the *Hashomer Hadaati* (literally, "The Observant Guards"), a part of the famous *Bnei Akiva* zionist movement. In the years immediately following the war, tensions in Palestine grew between the Arab and Jewish populations. The British has strict immigration quotas on Palestine yet tens of thousands of survivors of the Nazi horror in Europe were clamoring to be allowed a place to live their lives in peace. Left with little choice, the Jews in Palestine smuggled their beleaguered brethren into the mandate as quickly as they could. The British struggled to maintain order as the Arab population grew violent.

The Jewish defense forces desperately needed arms. My mother told me of times when she was asked to deliver a package from one point to another without knowing the contents. Later on, she learned that she was carrying weapons destined for Jewish fighters in Palestine, later Israel.

It was a dark time. Europe was a vast graveyard. Traditional Jewish settlements in Eastern Europe were gone. Poland, once boasting three and a half million Jews was denuded of more than 85% of her Jewish population by the Holocaust. Jews were still hated by the Poles and the country was behind the Iron Curtain. Soviet Russia, under the boot of Stalin, was no place for a Jew either. Jews needed a homeland desperately. They needed to be released from the slavery of Europe and return to their ancient homeland. They needed a Jubilee year.

And so it was. Jews returned by stealth and were armed by stealth. They struggled, confident that G-d would not forsake them and that they would establish and rebuild their ancestral homeland. People from all over the world, my mother included, chipped in in countless ways to assist their brothers and sisters who were trying to overcome. In the 50th year after Herzl's famous quote, their efforts paid off and the British got out.

The Hebrew word for the number 50 is "Chamishim." But Hebrew is written without any vowels. So, the word Chamishim can also be read as "Chamushim" which means "armed." For example, Exodus 13:18 which reads: "So G-d led the people roundabout, by way of the wilderness at the Sea of Reeds. Now the Israelites went up armed (VaChamushim) out of the land of Egypt."

In 1947, Jews around the world came together in a common cause to assist the still unborn state. Young and old donated of their time, their money and their expertise. In some cases, like American Colonel Mickey Marcus, that assistance included lending their military expertise and literally giving their lives in the struggle to create an independent State of Israel where others, like my mother, got involved and did what they could in the same pursuit. G-d rewarded their efforts, both in Israel and out, and the State of Israel was born. In the 50th year, the Jubilee year, the land of Israel reverted to its ancestral owners and the slaves returned home.

In 2017 another jubilee is here and once again the world is challenging our rights to sovereignty over our own land. We must always remember that we are celebrating our *Chamishim*, our jubilee, because we have been *Chamushim*, armed. Not only armed in the traditional, military, sense but armed in that we are one people with a common goal. We are armed with G-d's love and the gift of *Torah* that he has given

us. We are armed with the power of kindness and *mitzvot*.

Israel is a wondrous place of freedom, democracy, innovation, science, technology and, yes, *Torah*. When Jerusalem was first liberated and reunified in 1967, there were few institutions of *Torah* learning in Jerusalem and none, of course, in the old city. Today, *Torah* thrives in our capital once more, as well as throughout the land. *Torah* is our armor and it is in the merit of *Torah* and the *Mitzvot* that G-d protects us.

In all likelihood, I will not see the next jubilee of *Yom Yerushalayim*. Yet, perhaps these scribblings may survive me and remind a future reader of that which I see so clearly today:

Hashem Oz L'Amo Yitain, Hashem Yevareich Es Amo Bashalom.

G-d gives strength to his people. G-d blesses his people with peace. Psalms (29:11).

Chana and I wish all of you a great summer!

#### THE ALEPH BETS OF HEBREW by Bill Bradin

Hebrew is not such a difficult egg to crack. Each month, I plan to try and define Hebrew words and expressions that we commonly use in our daily vernacular.

his month, let's take a look at the word, seedoor (Siddur). Everyone knows what a seedoor is. Many do not pronounce the word correctly and call it **sidda** or **sidder**. There are so many different kinds of **seedoorim** (plural of seedoor). There are Ashkenazi, there are Sephardi, and even Mizrachi **seedoorim**. At Congregation Shaarey Israel, we pray from the Ashkenazi version of the Artscroll edition published by the Rabbinical Council of America. At CSI, we have brown copies of this **seedoor** and black copies as well. The difference is that the brown version does **NOT** have the *Prayer for* the Welfare of the State of Israel, and black edition does. There are so many different **seedoorim**. The different Jewish movements have their own versions of **seedoorim**. There are differences, however, there is so much more in common between them. The word **seedoor** is used because the sequence of the way that we daven follows a specific order and hence the word **seedoor** is used.

When we use the word, **seedoor**, we all know what they are referring to, and if asked the meaning of the word, the response will be "**prayer book**". To be more precise, it is a **seedoor t'filla**. That answer is correct, but...... not so fast.

In Hebrew, the word **seedoor** really means arrangement. The same word is used when one goes about getting various tasks accomplished. That person has **seedoorim** to do. Depending upon the addition of another noun to the word **seedoor** (**smichoot** – read last month's column) the word **seedoor** will take on a different meaning. If we are talking about flowers, we use **seedoor prachim**. When planning an event, we use **seedoor shulchanot** (table arrangements). You get the picture.

The root of the word **seedoor** is **samech-daled-reish**; **seder** (looks familiar). The most commonly

used infinitive of this root is **Li'sa'der**, and means to **arrange**.

The word **seder** which everyone knows is the festive meal



that is conducted on the first two nights of Pesach (in Israel only one). The reason that this word is used because the meal follows a very specific sequence. In the very beginning, the different steps of the **Seder Pesach** is read and hence the word **seder**. Again, depending upon the noun that is attached to the word **seder**, will give it a different meaning. For example the word **seder** is also used for a **Tu B'Shvat** meal and is referred to as a **Seder Tu B'Shvat**.

Another word derived from the **seder** is **seedrah** and means "**series**". This applies to anything that follows a specific order. This form of the word is used in mathematics, batteries, and even television series. My favorite television **seedrah** is "The Walking Dead". What is yours?

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#### "Your People Shall Be My People" - Jewish Grandchildren in the White House Eileen Pollack

nce upon a time, in a not so far away place

Richmond Hills, NY to be exact – there lived a beautiful young girl name Jane –

"Janie" to everyone who knew her. Jane Frances Mac Dwyer was one of 7 children raised in an Irish-Catholic home, surrounded by family, friends, and a love of tradition. After a horrific appendectomy at age 16, the young Jane was visited by her Parrish Priest who had given her Last Rights before the surgery..."Jane, you're a very lucky girl to be alive", he told her. "Great things will be expected of you. I have a hunch your life is going to be very special".

Unbeknownst to this priest at the time, Jane was already expressing doubts and confusion regarding Catholicism. Could he or anyone else have ever imagined that this blond haired, blue-eyed Irish lassie would someday become Devorah Emmet Jaffe? Not likely. But Jane, like so many others before her, would embark upon a journey that would someday take her to Torah, to the land of Israel and to become the wife of Dr. Geoffrey Wigoder, editor in chief of the Encyclopedia Judaica. Janie would become a Jew.

There is a lovely Indian proverb that says, "Tell me a fact and I will learn it. Tell me the truth and I'll believe it. But tell me a story and it will live in my heart forever." Everyone loves a story - bedtime stories, narratives in the classroom, love stories. Long before the amazing Shalom Aleichem, our great grandparents shared stories of family, life experiences and lessons learned. Stories can be very powerful vehicles to impart information. Stories can also be meaningful and inspiring - truly unforgetable.

As a young girl, my favorite Bible story was that of Ruth the Moabite

who became the most famous convert in Jewish History. It didn't have to be Shavuos for me to read and re-read the Megilla. The story was beautiful and the pasuk, "Amech ami, v'elokayich, elokai" – "Your people shall be my people. Your G-d, my G-d," affected me deeply. My favorite book from the Brooklyn Public Library was Hope is My House, the autobiography of Devorah Wigoder (yes, that beautiful Irish lassie from Richmond Hills, NY), Jane Frances Mac Dwyer. I've come to realize that both of these amazing ladies inspired me by their determination to become a part of the Jewish people, and their courage to seek

monumental change in their lives.

We all know that there is no such thing as coincidence; and both Ruth and Devorah were meant to become part of my story as well. I could never have imagined that years later Rabbi Chanofsky would ask me to become a mentor – to prepare adults for conversion to Judaism. Such an honor and a privilege! My students would each come from a different place geographically, academically, intellectually and spiritually. And each would have a desire to learn and to grow, and to embrace Judaism as his/her religion of choice. What a challenge for them, as well as for me.

To teach Torah and mitzvos is not just another job, but a Labor of Love. There are books to read, Jewish activities to participate in and lifestyle changes to be made, to become a Jew. My students don't have Jewish memories to fall back on. They have to create those memories for themselves and future generations. And, as I have thankfully had the pleasure of watching my own biological family grow in the past 25 years, I have also gained so many new spiritual "children and grandchildren" - far too numerous to count. The joy and nachas for me is indescribable... they are all amazing...

So much has occurred in our country this year. Most of all, there are many new faces in Washington. Yet, what is fascinating, but not

surprising, is that special interest in one particular person, whose decision to convert to Judaism a few years ago, adds another dimension to that all that is transpiring in our nation's capitol. Yael bat Avraham – Ivanka Trump Kushner - has taken on approximately 613 new responsibilities – which make her title and job description in the White House pale by comparison. Every decision that she makes, every task that she carries out, is held up to a miscroscope – not only by her father and the American people, but most important, by G-d Himself. Yet her "leap of faith" from Seven Noachide Laws to Taryag Mitzvot will provide her with rewards, far greater than she could have every imagined. Like Ruth and Devorah and all of her spiritual "sisters and brothers" before her, she has made the choice to accept G-d and Torah, and to become one of "us". She has her work cut out for her. There are no short cuts. But Hashem never gives us a test that we will not be able to pass with flying colors. May her faith and belief in Him guide her through the challenges she faces during these times, and all the years of her life.

And as we pay tribute to our parents and loved ones on Mother's Day and Father's Day (and hopefully all the year through), may we each be a source of pride to our own mothers and fathers who raised us, and to our Bubbies and Zaydes, who are seeing us from a better place. And may we be outstanding parents and grandparents - role models to our children. G-d has entrusted us with the gift of future generations. We have all, truly, been "touched from Above."


