

Jeffrey L. Sowder of Toronto, Kansas, is currently serving his 11th year as a member of the Boards of Directors for Shriners International and Shriners Hospitals for Children®. He was elected Imperial Potentate, part of the 12-member body that helps govern the Shriners fraternity, during the Shriners' 2019 Imperial Session – held in Nashville, Tennessee, June 30 – July 4.

Sowder was raised a Master Mason in 1975 at Toronto Woodson Lodge #121. He served as Master of his lodge in 1981, 1983, 1991 and 1992. After many Grand Lodge appointments, including District Deputy Grand Master, Area Deputy Grand Master, and Chairman of the Grand Lodge Membership Committee, and serving as an appointive Grand Officer on three separate occasions, he was elected Grand Junior Warden in 1994, and he served as Grand Master of Kansas in 1997.

Sowder became a member of Midian Shriners in Wichita, Kansas, in 1988 and served as the temple's Potentate in 2004. Sowder has served on many committees at the Imperial level, including the Pilot Implementation Team, Executive Membership Committee,

and the Building and Equipment, East/West Shrine Game[®], Strategic Planning, Donor Relations, TRAC, Ritual and Leadership Training and Education Seminars Committees. He has also been a presenter at the Imperial Membership, Oriental Guide and Assistant Rabban seminars.

Sowder served as the personal representative for the Wichita Scottish Rite Valley in Wichita from 2006 to 2009. He served on the board of the Kansas Masonic Foundation for 25 years and as its President from 2004 to 2011.

Sowder was born and raised on a ranch in Kansas. He operates four separate agricultural-related corporations — a 1,000-head cow/calf operation, a retail feed business serving ranchers throughout the Flint Hills of Kansas, a wholesale cattle mineral business with distribution in four states, and a multifaceted agricultural wholesale/retail business in Wichita.

Sowder and his wife, Cheryl, have been married for 45 years and have two daughters, Stephanie and Lindsay. Stephanie and her husband, Jamie Nelson, live near Toronto, Kansas, with their three children, Corinne, Sutton and Reid. Lindsay is married to John Hill, and they live in Fort Scott, Kansas, with their sons, JJ and Hudson.

Chaplin's Corner

Celebrating the 50th anniversary of the moon landing. "One small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind," stated Astronaut Neil Armstrong, July 20, 1969, as he became the first man to walk on the moon, almost 238,900 miles away from the Earth. The second man on the moon was Colonel Buzz Aldrin.

Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin spent a total of 21 hours and 37 minutes on the moon's surface before re-docking their lunar module (LM) Eagle with the command ship Columbia, which was orbiting 57 miles above the Moon's surface.

Buzz Aldrin asked for radio silence before exiting the LM. Six months prior Madalyn Murray O'Hair brought a lawsuit against NASA. She objected to the previous Apollo 8

crew reading the first chapter of the Book of Genesis in their Christmas radio transmission in 1968.

What happened during the Radio Silence? Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong were members of the Webster Presbyterian Church. The morning before lift-off, they along with their wives and children went to the empty church and observed communion.

They asked the congregation of Webster Presbyterian Church to observe communion at 11:00 as close as possible to the same hour they would be observing communion on the lunar module. The Astronauts were allowed to bring a small personal item on their flight. They choose to bring a small communion chalice, package of bread and wine.

"Houston, this is Eagle. This is the LM Pilot speaking. I would like to request a few moments of silence." During the silence, they partook of communion from the silver chalice on the LM.

Neil Armstrong recounts: "For me this meant taking communion. In the radio blackout I opened the little plastic packages which contained bread and wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup. It was interesting to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the first food eaten there, were communion elements."

They read John 15:5 "I am the vine and you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing."

Then read Psalms 8:3-6 "When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained; What is man that thou are mindful of him? And the son of man that thou visits him? For thou has made him made him a little lower than the angels, and has crowned him with glory and honor."

With this they concluded communion. Neil Armstrong was the first to exit the lunar module and stepped onto the powdery substance of the moon. "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." Buzz Aldrin was the next one to step onto the moon "Beautiful view. Magnificent desolation."





This Is My Moment:

The stories of Cristian and Madelyn

Every year, Shriners Hospitals for Children® selects two National Patient Ambassadors to represent the health care system's patients. The ambassadors spend the year sharing their stories of perseverance in the face of adversity and the ways Shriners Hospitals for Children has made a dramatic difference in their lives. Introducing our two new Ambassadors:

Cristian

Cristian, who is now 18, was born with spina bifida and hydrocephalus. In his first two weeks of life, Cristian had two surgeries and went on to have nearly a dozen more. Cristian faced several of the same challenges of many other patients with spina bifida, including gastro-intestinal system and balance difficulties, as well as complications from various surgeries.



For several years, Cristian's family had difficulty finding doctors who understood how to best help him. That all changed one day in 2012, when Cristian met a Shriner who referred him to Shriners Hospitals for Children. Cristian was 13 when he had the surgery that he says changed his life and gave him hope, at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Los Angeles (now Shriners for Children Medical Center in Pasadena, California).

Devoted to his schoolwork and seminary studies as well as his part-time job and playing the cello, Cristian has also been active in supporting Shriners Hospitals for Children. He even dedicated his Eagle Scout project to the cause, raising funds to present more than 200 Build-A-Bear toys to the Pasadena medical center.

Cristian is looking forward to his responsibilities as a National Patient Ambassador. "I know that I am who I am because of the Shriners," he said. "I have been able to see that I can do whatever I want and I can overcome any obstacle that I face. I want to give back to them because of that – because of the life that they've given me. Through Shriners Hospitals for Children and the national ambassadorship that I've been given, I hope to share a message of positivity and hope to all those who need it."

Madelyn

Madelyn, now 19, was born 10 weeks early. Doctors told her parents that she was beautiful, healthy, tiny – and was born without her left arm.

Madelyn's journey with Shriners Hospitals for Children began with her first visit to our St. Louis location, when she was just 3 months old. Throughout her childhood, Madelyn used prosthetics,



mainly for balance, and to help with various activities. Occupational therapists at the hospital helped Madelyn learn to function and interact in the world. As she grew older, Madelyn began using her prosthetics less often, and by middle school, she opted to stop using them.

In school, Madelyn's busy schedule included not only her classwork but also competitive swimming, first on a team for children with disabilities, then on her high school team. She also participated in competitive, coed water polo. "Nothing is impossible in my mind," she said. "It's just the ability to adapt and work around it."

Madelyn has always devoted herself to advocating and educating. She loves to make YouTube videos showing how to accomplish things using only one arm. At Ability Awareness Week, a program of St. Louis area elementary schools, Madelyn loves to share her story and to explain how Shriners Hospitals for Children changed her life. Drawing from her own experiences of being bullied for having only one arm, Madelyn likes to incorporate antibullying themes into her presentations.

Madelyn is currently a student at Maryville University in St. Louis, where she is very active in student activities, and made the Dean's List her first two semesters.

"I am incredibly excited to see where this year takes me,"
Madelyn said. "I hope to inspire other kids, and be able to
show them that they can do anything they put their mind to
- they might just do it a little bit differently."

The Importance of Positive Communication to Children with Disabilities

The Power of Language

Our word choices have a tremendous impact on those around us. Children, especially, are deeply influenced by the language surrounding them – who they become is based on who they are learning to be. The staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children® understands the importance of building confidence and self-esteem in our patients at an early age. Our staff recognizes that while working with children with disabilities, it is imperative to help them develop a strong positive attitude so they will have the confidence to pursue their dreams. To accomplish this, being mindful of the effect language has on children is critical.

Two essential points in using communication as affirmation are accurate wording and people-first language. Always remember to use language that encourages, rather than discourages, the individual. When referring to those with a disability, please remember to avoid labels with a negative connotation, such as:

- crippled
- handicapped
- lame
- deformed

» The preferred word choice is usually:

- disability
- disabled
- the actual term involved, such as, cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy

People with Disabilities are People First

The second key element of communicating with people with disabilities is the need to use "people-first language," where the person is the important element, rather than the disability.

For example, try using phrases such as "a person with cerebral palsy" or "a person who uses a prosthetic arm," rather than defining them by the disability itself.

It is also important to recognize that people are individuals, and to avoid lumping those with disabilities together into one group, like "the disabled," "the spinal cord injured," or to refer to "all people with X."

- » Another important aspect of using people-first language is to avoid negative descriptive phrases and terms, such as:
 - confined to a wheelchair
 - wheelchair bound
 - victim stricken with
 - suffering

Instead, try saying a person "uses a wheelchair," or "has cerebral palsy."



"We must take language very seriously. The feeling I have is that language is always a reflection of attitude. With the advancement of the disability movement, you see a change in language." – Michael Masutha

Also avoid **value-laden words and phrases**, whether negative or positive, because even seemingly positive labels such as "courageous" and "inspirational" can be burdensome to a child, setting unnecessary high expectations, that may be hard to maintain.

As part of using people-first language, it is also imperative to not define people by their disabilities. This is accomplished by **emphasizing abilities**, **not limitations**.

- » For instance:
 - Say: "Darlene is an excellent writer," rather than, "Despite her disability, Darlene is an excellent writer."
 - Say, "Johnny is a child with a disability," instead of the defining, "Johnny is a *disabled child*."

Being mindful of preferred disability terminology and using people-first language whenever possible will help children with disabilities become more confident and able to become successful, productive adults.
