Pastor's Word

The season of Lent is a time of repentance, reflection, and spiritual renewal of 40 days preceding the celebration of Jesus' resurrection at Easter. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on February 14 – Valentine's Day. This does not happen very often. It occurred in 2018, but the last time it happened before that was 1945.

If we try to combine Valentines Day and Ash Wednesday, this would be a time for flowers, chocolate, and romantic dinners, as well as remembering that we all fail God and one another, and that we will all return to dust.

It is admittedly an awkward combination. The two days don't really seem to work together. And yet there is a sense in which it actually makes sense.

On Ash Wednesday we are marked by ashes. The ashes can be a deep and personal reminder, as much as jewelry or flowers, that we are loved and that our beloved's commitment is constant and true, even when we are not. The ashes are a mark of our fallenness and imperfection and yet God loves us anyway and always.

And then knowing that life is fleeting can actually be helpful. We will only have so many opportunities to show care for those we love, so we need to take hold of those opportunities.

So maybe the two days can go together. Or maybe I'm just trying to make them fit. But either way, Ash Wednesday is coming on February 14. We will have a Soup Supper and study on Wednesday evenings in Lent at 6 pm, beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 14. On that evening, we will have a very brief Ash Wednesday service before our study.






Senior Moments

ABC-USA Calls New General Secretary



Rev. Dr. Gina C. Jacobs-Strain was called as General Secretary of American Baptist Churches USA by the Board of General Ministries. She is the first woman and first person of color to serve in this role. As General Secretary, she will provide overall leadership to our denomination that includes 1.3 million members in 5,000 churches, with 33 regional bodies.

Dr. Jacobs-Strain previously served as Executive Director of American Baptist Women's Ministries (ABWM) for six years. Under her guidance, ABWM introduced the AB GIRLS program, "Building Bridges and Gateways to Girl's Future, empowering girls to recognize God's creative potential within them. ABWM has also broadened its Beloved Community and Domestic Violence ministries and now offers seminars and webinars tailored for young adult women nationwide.

Dr. Jacobs-Strain has held various pastoral roles including Transitional Pastor at First Baptist Church of New Market in Piscataway, N.J., Interim Pastor at St. Paul Baptist Church in Atlantic Highlands, N.J., Associate Regional Pastor for American Baptist Churches of New Jersey, and Associate Minister

of Christian Education at St. Paul Baptist Church in Montclair, N.J.

Rev. Jacobs-Strain has been invited as a guest preacher/lecturer at institutions such as Drew University Theological School, New Brunswick Theological Seminary, ABC-NJ Academy, and the Wellness Lounge Webcast. She contributed to leadership and devotional publications and led workshops and training events on topics including Christian Education and Leadership.

Jacobs-Strain earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology from Rutgers University and a Master of Divinity degree from Drew University Theological School, where she was honored with the Old Testament Scholar Award. In May 2020, she received a Doctor of Ministry degree from Duke University. She is married to Clifton Strain, and together they have three sons. They currently reside in Morristown, N.J.

Center for Creative Justice Celebrates 50 Years!



Back in 1974, a small group including Johnie Hammond, Jenna McCarley, and Rev. Bill Belli from our church were looking at ways to help those who were released from prison be reintegrated into society. After some research, they came up with a plan to try to keep offenders from being incarcerated in the first place, and help them get their lives on track. It was called the Committee on Criminal Justice, or CCJ. From the beginning, CCJ was a community-based organization that provided probation supervision to lower level offenders. It began with a \$15,000 grant from American Baptists. In time CCJ added community-based mediation services and the name became the Center for Creative Justice.

Our church has had close ties to CCJ from the beginning back in February of 1974. Many members have served as volunteers

and board members, and the pastor of our church is an ex-officio board member.

The Story County Legal Aid Society also began in 1974, offering legal services on civil matters to those who could not afford them. CCJ and Legal Aid will be celebrating their 50th Anniversaries together on April 20 in an event held at Christy Hall, 220 H Avenue in Nevada at the Story County Fairgrounds. The event will run from 6-10 pm and there will be food, music, and a program celebrating the history of both CCJ and Legal Aid. From the event promotional:
