<u>Safety</u>

As the weather gets a little colder in the winter, you may want to start preparing your shop for the change. Take a look around and ask what effect freezing weather will have on the different items in the shop. Example, if that bottle of liquid freezes will it bust the bottle? Also think about how the cold weather will affect you. If your fingers numb up from the cold, your body temperature drops, feet are cold, etc., how will this affect your turning ability? Will it slow down your reaction time? Will you be more focused on how cold you are than the task at hand? Any time you lose focus on what you're doing, it's a sure sign of an accident waiting to happen. Of course the best approach would be to have a heated shop. Since that isn't always possible, please be cautious.

Club Demonstration

The demonstration for the night was how to turn a pendant; presented by Barbara Palastak. Barbara started by letting us know that your time is in the set up. The actual turning only takes a few seconds. A handout (which is attached to the newsletter) was given to each member to follow along as she talked about the Joyner Off-Center Jig that she had. (I understand that you can purchase these jigs from Ruth Niles.) Barbara also had a display of some pendants that she made in the past. They showed some of the different patterns that you can make.

Once you get all the hardware attached to the lathe, you will need to attach a waste block (which should be a little smaller than your blank) to the face plate. Then use a good double sided tape to attach your blank to the waste block. While in center hole of the jig, round and shape your blank. Then change the face plate to another hole, usually 6 or 8, and drill a hole. Barb drills a 13/64 hole and then widens it with a 5/16. I'm not going to even try to explain the whole process, but the key is to line everything up at the zero mark that's on the side after you make adjustments. This is your reference point.

There is a lot of trial and error to find the markings that you like, so as you move the plate around you may want to write down what holes you use so you can duplicate it later. Once you have everything set up, turn the lathe on and use a chisel (Barb used a skew chisel) to make your design. You let the off-center jig do the work, you just carefully press the point of the chisel into the wood. Just like Barb said, the time is in the set-up, the actual turning is quick and easy.

Once your design is completed you can lightly sand your pendant, just be careful not to over sand or you will remove your design. At this point you can turn it over, and do the back side in the same manner that you did the front. Then you can sand and finish this side. Then remove and finish the front side by hand. Hint: While finishing, if you get wax in the grooves you can take a toothbrush to clean them out.

On behalf of the club, I would like to thank Barbara for the time and effort she put into this demo for us. Looks like another item that I'll need to add to my list of things to get.

Shop Tour

On 16 November the club had the opportunity to visit Maury Mahan's and John Hough's shops. After some refreshments, the tour began. Actually saw two shop area's at Maury's. The first area was where he did his turning. I think he has enough equipment to build just about anything. He had some nice items on display for us. He also had a lot of good idea's to share with us. One of them I thought was interesting and looked like a simple thing to do, was a tall pin-up board by the lathe with one side painted black, and one side painted white. He used this to pin up a vision of what he was going to make. He used the black or white side depending on what color of wood he was turning. This helps him see the project better. Even though he had many tools, there was one that stood out that I wasn't familiar with called a Fibonacci Gauge. He made this one himself, and he stated that you can go on line and get the plans to build one, or you can buy one.

We went to his other shop area where he had a small lathe for pen turning. He had some samples of some really nice pens that he had turned on display. He also kept a good selection of hand tools in this area. This is also the area where he did his finishing.

Next stop was John Hough's shop. John is not only a wood worker, but a machinist as well. He showed us some equipment that he restored, and there were some parts he couldn't get, so he machined them himself. John had on display some items that he made, and they were all fabulous. Did I mention that he was a wood carver as well. John started out using hand tools which I think is the best way to go. I don't know how many wood planes he owns, but I never knew they made so many different types. John has a lot of equipment, and he knows how to use them. We saw some of the furniture that he made, and Wow. We thank Maury and John for taking the time to show us their shop. This is just another example of the

talent that we have in our club.

Catoctin Area Turners (CAT) club in Leesburg has a General Model 16018 lathe for sale. This is 18" x 38" with electronic variable speed (reversible) and 1 hp motor 220v, with 4 groove pulleys. It comes with 3 tool rests, 12" and 4" from the factory and a 6" aftermarket one. The spindle is 1" x 8 tpi with MT2 on the spindle and the tailstock.

This has been the club demo lathe for a couple of years, but the club has upgraded to a Powermatic lathe.

The lathe is made in North America (Canada), and we are asking \$1,000.
