



Dear Mustangers,





Memories of a Car Guy by Hap Schadler

[Editor's Note: This is Part Fourteen of a serial article by one of our own club members, Hap Schadler, chronicling his love of the automobile and some of the a many interesting cars he has owned. When we left Hap in the June 2024 issue he had his eye on acquiring a Cobra . . .}

Pat a friend of ours had recently purchased a '95 Cobra convertible with the removable hard-top and started to autocross it with some success. We soon wanted to get one as well. This new fox body Cobra was initially hard to get and the '96 proved even more so with the DOHC 4.6 engine that now made 300 Hp. I started to check the newspaper's car advertisements and happened upon one that was for sale on the north side of town. It had recently been purchased by a couple that were nurses and other than a trip out and back to California was practically new. They unfortunately had decided to take jobs overseas in Saudi Arabia for a three year tour and were leaving within the next month. They had decided to sell the car rather than try to store it during this period. The Car was lovely with a black exterior and a tan leather interior. It even had the pace car hoop behind the driver's seats which looked neat, but was not an effective roll bar. Besides the DOHC 4.6 engine the car had a five speed manual transmission, the Cobra suspension, power disk brakes and steering, air conditioning, and a lot of other nice amenities. We were able to negotiate a great price for this car due to the couple's circumstances and added it as Sara's new daily driver and autocross car.



This unfortunately meant we would have to part ways with the '85 GT convertible. It had been a great car and apart from some jetting issues with the carburetor when we first came to Colorado had been dependable and a fun autocross car. In the over 150,000 miles we had driven it we hadn't even had to replace the clutch. It had also been a lucky car for Sara who talked her way out of a couple of tickets while driving it in Colorado. with her ex-husband's last name she was able to plead ignorance of the local speed limits by claiming she had borrowed the car from her boyfriend during a visit from Texas. The car went to a good home as it was purchased by our friend John who worked for my company in Oklahoma City. He had heard from Bruce how well we took care of cars and bought the '85 GT convertible sight unseen, flew up to Denver where Bruce picked him up, and then picked up the car and drove it back to Oklahoma City. He held on to the car and drove it until 2019 when he finally sold it to a Texan for more than he'd paid us for it. It made the drive back to Texas and still hadn't had the clutch replaced.

I had been running around the West in the company Topaz and after the blizzard experience was pretty fearless on where I'd take it. On one trip out to Telluride I decided to take a short cut back to Ouray over Imogene pass. This was in the early fall and the leaves up the first part of the pass made colored tunnels that I passed through. As I got above tree line things became progressively tougher as the road became treacherous where water had washed parts out. I finally approached the old ghost town towards the top of the pass as a Jeep with a V8 conversion came alongside me. Its driver congratulated me for getting that far up the pass in my car and then headed down towards Telluride. I soldiered up the path the road had become until it went down into a little depression and then headed back up towards the top of the pass. The Topaz went down into the depression, but then would not go up the following grade. It just sat there while I reved the engine. I thought maybe I had damaged the transmission and got out and inspected the car. Everything looked fine so I got back in and backed up and tried again with a little more speed. The car still couldn't do the grade. I finally figured between the auto transmission, the cars gearing, and the altitude I wasn't going to be able to make the grade. I tried my last option which was to turn the car around and try to back up the grade figuring I might have a little more gearing that way. Still no luck. So I resigned myself to the fact that Imogene pass had beaten me and headed back down to Telluride and the long drive to Ouray.

Around this time my last company Topaz had finally reached its mileage limit and was purchased by my daughter to replace the LTD2. The LTD2 was left with her father in Michigan and continued its long life until it was well over 200,000 miles. This let me move on to my next company vehicle which was a Black manual transmission 4WD Ford Explorer with the 4.0 V6 engine. This was a great vehicle for use in Colorado for a field Salesman and it took me on many trips through the Dakotas, Wyoming, Montana, Utah, and Western Colorado. It would prove to be a key piece of an anniversary trip Sara and I took to explore Western Colorado. For years I had driven all over Colorado on trips to see my Company's customers and had driven past many spots which I would have liked to have seen, but had never had the time to stop at. Sara made the suggestion that for our 15th anniversary we take a week off and drive to all the neat places I had always had to pass by on my trips. We packed up the Explorer with our bags and several coolers full of wine, sodas, and picnic goodies and headed out south down I-25.


PROTON COMPETITION, FORD PERFORMANCE ON LE MANS PODIUM IN MUSTANG GT3 DEBUT

June 16, 2024 Lemans, France

LE MANS, FRANCE, June 16, 2024 – Sixty years after Ford Mustang's first win in the legendary Tour de France, Mustang GT3 delivered a third-place result as well as having all three cars finish the iconic 24 Hours of Le Mans. In the toughest endurance sports car race in the FIA World Endurance Championship calendar, the Mustang GT3 took on the ultimate challenge and delivered in some of the toughest conditions in recent memory at the famous Circuit de la Sarthe.

All three Mustang GT3's finished the race with the No. 88 of Dennis Olsen, Giorgio Roda, and Mikkel O. Pedersen crossing the finish line third in the LMGT3 category. The No. 44 driven by Christopher Mies, John Hartshorne, and Ben Tuck finished in fourth place.

"Today's podium performance shows that Mustang can come





"It's always great to be on the podium and especially at Le Mans," said Christian Ried, Proton Competition Team Principal. "But also, in the first year of a new car, and in the 60th Anniversary of Mustang, there are just so many things that came together to make today possible. It's unbelievable. We saw that this was a good car at its debut in Daytona, and we've since taken all the steps in order to make this work in its first season. From Daytona, Sebring and Long Beach, to Qatar, Imola and Spa, we felt like we could bring a car here after those six months that could fight for the win. To finish on the podium in third is amazing. I'm proud of everyone.

The No. 88 endured early challenges but showed resiliency throughout the race. Olsen climbed 13 places in the first hour of action to fourth place in a great display of speed and race craft. From there, the team consistently competed within the class's top-10, capitalizing on a pit strategy that helped to propel the Mustang GT3 into the top-five throughout the race. A steady pace around Circuit de la Sarthe's 13.626 km (8.467 mi) circuit eventually delivered a place on the podium.

"I'm over the moon with this result," said Larry Holt, the Executive Vice President of Multimatic Special Vehicle Operations Group. "Le Mans is the biggest sportscar racing challenge in the world. I've had some great results here and I've also had some bad years here and I have to say that this is right up there with the greats.

"It wasn't a win but a third-place podium, followed by a fourth place and total reliability gives us a lot to be happy about. We've engineered this car over the past 18 months and run it since Daytona. We've had ups and downs but when we ran at Le Mans last Sunday, I knew that it was going to be good."

While the No. 77 of Ryan Hardwick, Ben Barker, and Zacharie Robichon experienced early challenges on the track during the race, their Mustang GT3 also shared in the overall team success. Barker recorded the fastest qualifying lap on Thursday, advancing to the Hyperpole. This marked the first Hyperpole by Mustang GT3 after four rounds of WEC racing so far in 2024.


