PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The month of April did not bring many showers! Here it is May and the flowers need some water but be careful. Hernando County is strictly enforcing water restrictions according to our April guest speaker Mr. Frank McCabe. Mr. McCabe is the Hernando County Code Enforcement Supervisor and he's hired two code enforcement officers to enforce water restrictions. You can find the day of the week you can water on the front of your water bill or on the back. Check your day with this guide. Address numbers ending with:

- 0 or 1 may water on MONDAY before 8am or after 6pm
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- 4 or 5 may water on WEDNESDAY before 8am or after 6pm
- 6 or 7 may water on THURSDAY before 8am or after 6pm
- 8 or 9 may water on FRIDAY before 8am or after 6pm

Mr. McCabe's presentation with a Q & A was the perfect forum for our membership questions. He noted that with 200,000 residents in Hernando County, he has a staff of five – one code enforcer per district (the two extras are water restriction enforcers) for a total of seven. If you have a request for code enforcement on something or someone, you must give your name – no anonymous complaints. Your questions regarding derelict vehicles and tractor trailers on Shoal Line Blvd lots, commercial boats parked and operating at/from private residential docks, noise complaint process, RV parking and Air BnB issues kept him on his feet.

April was a busy month for the HBPOA. We hosted the Association's 31st Anniversary with a Tropical Celebration on April first and it was not a

The Board of County Commissioners met on Tuesday, April 11th. Agenda item I., Update regarding Weeki Wachee Preserve for Shoal Line Blvd Recreation Project and Weeki Wachee River Springs Protection Zone. County Administrator Jeff Rogers opened the discussion for the Commissioners with a review of the county plan provided to the Southwest Florida Water Man-

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agement District (SWFWMD) and the response received. The commissioners reviewed and voted to embrace the proposal by SWFWMD and move forward for the county residents on the following: 1. Improve existing amenities and trails within the revised project area, 2. Utilize Shoal Line entrance and build out a boardwalk or bridge over the canal to the Preserve for ingress and egress subject to applicable permitting and mitigation requirements, 3. The expansion of non-motorized boating activities such as a kayak launch.

Regarding the creation of a swimming area, SWFWMD is not interested in the development of this high intensity recreational use of District-owned lands. However, the District will consider the County pursuing a fee acquisition of the revised project area five years after entering a lease or management agreement. (Plain language – the County will have to buy the land to put a swimming area in it). The District tied a couple of other caveats to the creation of the swimming area and those are available in the agenda packet online.

The Commissioners reviewed the Florida Fish

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

and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) presentation on the Weeki Wachee Spring Protection Zone Public Meeting on March 28, 2023.

FWC was very convincing on the underlying causes of shoreline, vegetation, and grass area damage. However, the FWC attempted to find a middle ground to enable full on recreation as if nothing should change but then added 20 exclusion zones to help damaged areas heal. The issues of enforcement, signage and compliance flummoxed the Commissioners. Their comments included: how do we preserve the beauty of the Weeki Wachee when they'd have to add signage requirements. Signage is ugly and could possibly damage what they are trying to protect. Additionally, the enforcement effort would pit the Waterways Sheriff against citizens determined to ground, anchor, moor or beach their vessel. "Not here?" "Move 10 feet and you can do it there." Bottom line, the Commissioners are for the creation of the Weeki Wachee Spring Protection Zone from Rogers Park to the Weeki Wachee park boundary. What does this mean? There will be no anchoring, mooring, beaching, or grounding of vessels. This does not apply to property owners on the Weeki Wachee mooring their vessels to their property. More to come on an implementation date and County coordination with partnering agencies.

Thank you for all you do to help keep Hernando Beach a great place to live.

7:05pm – GUEST SPEAKERS

1. Mr. Frank McCabe was introduced by Joan Puls.

He has been the Code Enforcement Supervisor since February 2016. He enjoys working with Hernando County residents and businesses as well as with other government agencies with the goal of making Hernando County a safer and cleaner place to live. At this time, there are 5 code enforcement officers for 200,000 residents. Hernando County has been warned by SWIFTMUD that the wells are starting to be over

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pumped which could be fined. Therefore, utilities have hired 2 additional enforcement officers focusing solely on watering lawns between 8am - 6pm which is prohibited unless laying new sod.

A state law that has changed is that all calls to code enforcement may no longer be anonymous. You must provide your name and address to register a complaint. To find codes, go to the Hernando County website under County Ordinances. The email is ce@hernandocounty.us. If you have photos, there is a portal on the website for those.

2. JT Realty & Associates with Realtor Sarah Hill is our featured Hernando Beach business. Questions were raised about grants for single story homes to be lifted and flood insurance and a suggestion was made to investigate speakers on the subjects.

7:40pm – BUSINESS MEETING

1. President Comments. Bill Roberts stated that he attended his first Port Authority Meeting with the BOCC. They discussed improvements, airport enhancements, loans, commercial fishing, and funding opportunities. There is also discussion

about a separate “barge canal” for commercial boats.

The opportunity to help our own Shoal Line businesses and work with other organizations on the beach is getting traction. Our members agree Shoal Line Blvd needs some beautification. Code compliance is lax at best among some but other businesses shine. A willingness to get involved and a commitment to work together to help keep Hernando Beach beautiful and our local businesses participating is needed.

Valerie Shelter made a motion for the Shoal Line Blvd Beautification Committee to get started and Bobbi Caccamisi seconded. Vote passed. Bill, Valerie and Carol Crane will be on the committee.

2. Committee Reports:

The WAC acts as an advisory body to the BOCC on all matters pertaining to the waterways, in-land lakes and rivers located within Hernando County. Topics include maintenance, aquatics and eco system restoration. All functions are performed in a public forum, subject the Florida Sunshine Law Legislation. They currently meet six times a year. The Committee currently con-

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sists of four members appointed by the BOCC by consensus and is citizen-volunteer based. The WAC meets at the Hernando Beach Coast Guard Auxiliary Facility and all meetings are publicly noticed. The WAC currently has one vacancy existing. Application can be made through the Hernando County Office of the Administrator.

The WAC does not replace, and is a separate body established to provide citizens input to the Hernando County Port Authority (PA). The PA will continue to enjoy the powers and responsibilities that the Florida Legislature provided in Chapter 65-1618, in 1965. What is different is that the BOCC has assumed those authorities, responsibilities and roles allowed for by the legislation.

For background, by enacting Chapter 65-1618, the Legislature created the Hernando County PA and authorized it to exercise a number of the state's sovereign powers, including but not limited to "...constructing and operating port facilities, airports, radio stations, aquariums, lighting and water systems, streets, sidewalks, and railroads". Additionally, the local act authorized the PA to exercise the power to acquire property by

eminent domain. Notably, the Legislature did not grant the PA any taxing authority.

The PA's inability to finance its own operations, have proven the Chapter 65-1618 delegations of sovereign powers not to be realistic. As a result, the PA operated for the most part as an advisory body to the BOCC since it was created in 1965. The ability to approve dock permits was removed in 2016.

This discrepancy between the PA's apparent and actual powers has long caused confusion amongst the both the PA's membership and the members of the general public. Hence the reassignment to the BOCC, since the BOCC does have the authority to tax and raise funds.

Bilirakis and Levin File Bill to Expand Veterans' Access to Dental Care

Washington, D.C. – Representatives Gus Bilirakis (FL-12) and Mike Levin (CA-49) reintroduced the Veterans Early Treatment for Chronic Ailment Resurgence through Examinations (VET CARE) Act, to require the Veterans Administration (VA) to put in place a four-year pilot program

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providing dental care for Veterans with certain chronic health conditions. Right now, dental care through the VA is limited to those who are 100% disabled or have a direct service-connected injury. Studies have shown that regular dental care helps alleviate certain chronic conditions, reducing overall healthcare costs. Since the VA spends most of its healthcare costs on treating Veterans with chronic ailments, like diabetes and heart conditions, increasing access to preventative dental services would help ensure a healthier Veteran population and bring those costs down.

"Our Veterans have sacrificed so much on behalf of our country; they deserve access to high quality healthcare - and that includes dental care," said **Bilirakis**. "The VET CARE Act will get the ball rolling to expand access to dental care for our nation's heroes, and could result in lower overall health care costs for the VA. Not only is this legislation good for Veterans, it is good for the VA as a whole."

"Our veterans deserve high-quality, comprehensive health care services, and that should include dental care regardless of service connection. This bill empowers VA to meet veterans' dental care needs while driving down overall health care costs in the long run," said **Rep. Levin**. "I'm proud to reintroduce the VET CARE Act with Rep. Bilirakis and look forward to it moving forward in the legislative process. We must continue to strengthen health care delivery for veterans, and this bill adds an element that is usually forgotten about in that process."

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

- One dorsal fin; last ray of dorsal fin extended into

a long filament

- Very large scales
- Mouth large and points upward

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Habitat

Primarily inshore fish; adults spawn offshore. Tarpon are found throughout Florida's coastal environment during the summer months. During the winter months, coastal water temperatures in much of the state drop significantly and cause tarpon to concentrate in South Florida.

Behavior

Slow-growing, matures at 7 to 13 years of age. Spawn between May and September. Females may lay more than 12 million eggs. Develop into a ribbon-like larval stage.

Tolerate a wide range of salinity. Juveniles commonly found in freshwater.

Gulp air at the surface.

Feed on fish and large crustaceans.

- Fossil research shows that tarpon have been swimming in our oceans since prehistoric times.
- Tarpon can reach sizes up to 8 feet and can weigh up to 280 pounds.
- The life span of a tarpon can be in excess of 50 years. The oldest tarpon in captivity lived to be 63 years old.
- Due to its majestic appearance of size and col-

or, the tarpon is nicknamed "silver king."

- Tarpon are primarily found in shallow coastal waters and estuaries, but they are also found in open marine waters, around coral reefs, and in some freshwater lakes and rivers.
- Tarpon range from Virginia to central Brazil in the western Atlantic, along the coast of Africa in the eastern Atlantic, and all through the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean Sea.
- Because of its strength, stamina, and fighting ability, the tarpon is one of Florida's premier game fish.
- Tarpon have a special ability to gulp air at the surface when they are in a habitat that doesn't provide enough oxygen.
- In their larval stage, tarpon are transparent, have a ribbon-like body and prominent fanglike teeth, and are less than an inch long.
- Tarpon can only be fished recreationally in Florida. The majority of recreational anglers practice catch and release since the fish is not considered to be of any food value. However, anglers can possess them for trophy purposes at the cost of \$50.00 per tag, per fish. Without this tag, possession is illegal.
