Kerry's Corner

The book of Acts is a record of the growth of the early church, started by Jesus's disciples and then expanded by the Apostle Paul. It's an exciting ride, from the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, to shipwrecks and imprisonments, to life changing sermons delivered by ex-fishermen. We can learn a lot from this early church. Here are some lessons to take away.

They were devoted to the apostles' teaching

The early church was devoted to the apostles' teaching. This is what we now have as the New Testament! They listened and put into practice what they learned. Are we reading the Bible in the same way? Are we devoted to listening, learning and letting what we read and hear change our lives?

They were devoted to prayer


The early church was devoted to prayer. You see this again and again throughout Acts, as the Christians pray for the apostles, for each other and for the spread of the gospel. They pray a particularly wonderful prayer in Acts 4, asking God for boldness to spread the gospel. Are we devoted to prayer in this same way? Do we bring all our needs, worries and joys before God? And are we praying for this boldness as we live as Christians in this world that desperately needs Jesus?

They had everything in common

Something really remarkable about the early church is how committed they were to serving and supporting one another. Acts 2:45 even says that they sold their belongings in order to care for those who didn't have enough! *This kind of remarkable generosity* should be evident in our churches. But too often we get caught up in loving the thought of having lots of money to ourselves. Could we be more generous to those around us, so no one is in need?

Every day they continued to meet together

The early church met not just on Sundays, or on Friday night, or for a mid-week Bible study. They were committed to meeting together every day, to encourage one another, learn together and worship the Lord. *This doesn't mean we HAVE to go to church every single day. But these believers clearly placed an extremely high priority on fellowship. Do we place the same value on meeting together?*



They praised God

The believers in the early church were so thankful for everything Jesus had done for them, that they praised God fervently. This was even despite the persecution and alienation they faced for following such a radical faith!

The Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved


Every day, the early church grew as more people came to faith in Jesus Christ. This verse indicates that God was behind this rapid growth, but God uses people to carry out his will, and I can bet that those who observed the Christian community saw something really attractive and appealing there.

Wouldn't you want to be a part of a community that were generous, thankful and truly committed? And wouldn't you want to follow a Lord who encouraged this attitude in his followers?

Comparing our churches to the early church in Acts can be a helpful way to check if our priorities are right. Bible, prayer, generosity, fellowship and evangelism should characterize our Christian communities. Do they characterize your church?

The United Methodist Social Principles has been revised. Check it out! The DRAFT revision is at the following website: www.umcjustice.org/sp2020. The revision committee is asking for input over the next few months. The website provides a mechanism for your input.

The first nine pages of the Revised Social Principles reference God's Creation and is titled "The Community of All Creation." The preface is the Biblical passage "In the beginning..." from Genesis1:1-4a, 31. The following are the opening excerpts:


All creation is God's. Creation is an expression of God's grace, and God's creation is very good. All people are members of the community of all creation, and the flourishing depends on the care of all God's creation.

Creation

To be responsible stewards begins with appreciation of God's creation and the covenantal relation between God and everything that God has created. John Wesley proclaimed:

The great lessons which our blessed Lord inculcates is, that God is in all things, and that we are to see the Creator in the glass of every creature; that we should use and look upon nothing as separate from God...

We are committed to acts of care and solidarity as we pursue a more just and sustainable world, so the whole community of creation can flourish...



Unlike the United Methodist <u>Disciplines</u>, the "Social Principles" are not the law of the United Methodist Church. Let's use the Social Principles as reason to have a conversation in the community to share our thoughts and ideas.

Stamp Out Hunger



For more than 20 years, the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC) has conducted an annual nationwide food drive on the second Saturday in May.

This food drive is the largest one-day food drive in the United States. Just place a bag (or bags) of non-perishable food items by your mailbox before your regular mail pickup on Saturday, May 12, and your letter carrier will do the rest. All food remains in the community from which it was collected.

The ladies were made aware of "Justice" tea that is grown, harvested, and sold by workers who receive fair wages and so can earn for themselves a greater measure of economic freedom. 


Linda continued with her program by connecting the trafficked workers of tea to the community of women in Nashville, TN which the Reverend Becca Stevens has made her life's work. These women are survivors of prostitution, trafficking, and addiction right in our own country. She provides them sanctuary, residential community, and employment at Thistle Farms, which sell handmade lotions, oils, and candles. Four years ago she opened the Thistle Stop Café, a local non-profit business that provides meaningful employment to the women and serves as a hub that introduces the women to the community. In preparation for this talk, Linda traveled to Nashville, visited both businesses, and actually met and spoke to Becca Stevens about the upcoming Tea at Burton. Linda was able to see firsthand the wonderful, inspirational work that Reverend Stevens has done for these women survivors, who proudly wear T-shirts that proclaim, "Love Heals Every Body."



DO YOU EVER WONDER WHAT HAPPENED TO JESUS AND THE DISCIPLES AFTER THE RESSURRECTION?

A.D. The Bible Continues (also known as A.D. Kingdom and Empire) is a television miniseries, based on the Bible, and a sequel to the 2013 miniseries, The Bible. The story takes place immediately after the events of The Bible miniseries, beginning with the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, and continues with the first ten chapters of the Acts of the Apostles. During the month of May, the youth will be viewing episodes from this mini-series for our dV8 lesson.

May 6th: (The Tomb is Open) 5:00 to 7:00 pm.

After the public calls for Jesus to be crucified and Peter denies knowing him, Jesus is sent to Pontius Pilate to have the final say. Pilate orders the crucifixion of Jesus in order to maintain the peace and satisfy his people. Overcome with guilt for betraying Jesus, Judas hangs himself in the wastelands. Caiaphas defends his decision to send Jesus to Pilate with his father-in-law Annas. The act will send a message to all who oppose Roman law. Annas suggests a quicker death. Pilate grants two requests: Jesus' expedited death and Joseph of Arimathea's petition to claim the body. Pilate's wife Claudia warns that he will regret crucifying Jesus, who soon dies on the cross. Jerusalem trembles and the temple's holy veil splits. A soldier arrives to ensure Jesus' death, and Joseph offers his tomb as a final resting place. There he, Mother Mary, John, and Mary Magdalene clean the body and pray before closing the tomb. Caiaphas requests that Pilate post soldiers outside the tomb and place a Roman seal across the front, which will carry the death penalty if broken. Pilate agrees. Peter admits to John and Mary Magdalene that he denied Jesus, as the remaining disciples gather at the safe house. They all argue over the next course of action and Mother Mary reminds them of the prophesied return of Jesus. They decide to leave the city if he doesn't return on the third day. Soon, another tremble and the tomb illuminates behind its seal. An angel dressed as a warrior appears on top of the tomb and exposes its sword, a sign to the shocked Roman guards to not interfere. Later, Caiaphas receives news that the Roman seal has been broken, the tomb opened, and Jesus is gone.

May 13th: (No dV8 because of Mother's Day)

May 20th: (No dV8)

May 27th: ("The Body Is Gone") 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Mary Magdalene sneaks to Joseph's tomb and finds it open. Nothing is inside but the shroud that Jesus wore on the cross, left perfectly folded. She returns to the safe house to tell the others. Caiaphas listens to Reuben and the other guards try to explain what happened – a warrior angel broke the seal and moved the massive stone. Caiaphas thinks that some followers of Jesus must have raided the tomb in an attempt to fake a resurrection. Caiaphas gives his men strict orders to say that they fell asleep on duty if asked, and instructs Reuben to find Jesus' body immediately. Caiaphas then lies to Pilate that Jesus is dead in the tomb; however, a tomb guard reports otherwise after Caiaphas leaves. After being left at the empty tomb by Peter and John, Mary Magdalene is visited by Jesus, who is without stain. She returns to the chaotic safe house to report the news. Jesus appears to his disciples and later to a doubting Thomas, before guards storm the safe house and the disciples scatter into the city. Pilate orders the deaths of most of Caiaphas' guards, as Reuben and Caiaphas search the city for the body of Jesus. The disciples make it to the coast of the Sea of Galilee, where Peter finds it difficult catching fish. A man appears and instructs him to cast the net on the right side of the boat. The net quickly becomes filled with fish, and the men confirm their adviser to be Jesus. He suggests that they return to Jerusalem, wait there, then spread the word. Jesus then climbs a hill and disappears in a bright light. Angry over the death of his men, Caiaphas confronts Pilate, who then kills the tomb guards in front of him as a lesson in "civic administration".
