

The season after Pentecost

The peace of Christ be with you!

Whether you are at Good Shepherd in Belmont, or Holy Family in Half Moon Bay, we welcome you and are glad you are with us as we worship this season following the Pentecost, also called "Ordinary Time", which comes from the Latin word "ordinalis," meaning, "in succession or in order." The weeks of this season begin the Sunday following Pentecost and end the last Sunday of the Christian year, the Sunday before Advent (also called "Christ the King"). This is a time of growth, trusting that the Holy Spirit, sent by Christ, is at work within, as yeast is at work within dough. As yeast enriches and expands, the Spirit is at work in us, accomplishing abundantly far more than we can ask or imagine, not for ourselves alone, but for the life of the world.

This bulletin is a roadmap through our order of worship. Additional instructions or changes may be announced, including which hymns we are singing and where they are found. If you need help finding your way through the many books and leaflets we use, please don't hesitate to ask. The Episcopal Church uses a lot of resources for our worship, and it takes time for the "liturgy" (ritual) to become familiar for those not used to more structured worship. It's okay to set aside all the books, not worry about doing things perfectly, and simply let the service carry you along like a gentle stream. All of us were new to this form of worship once, and remember it taking time to become part of our prayer life. If you have any questions about the way we worship, and why, feel free to ask our vicar (priest), the Rev. Michael Arase-Barham. 

Deacon Let us stand and pray together the Nicene Creed.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.




