each describe their experience at
Skylight. We will also be hearing from

services over the coming months.

Janet Bjorndahl: "Fun! Informative! Thought-provoking!"

Those are the first three words I think of when I think of Skylight 2016. Fun because there were several singer/song-writers there, from the lively sounds of Jeffery Straker to the more laid -back vocals of Matt Epp, to the passionate protest songs of Grace Petrie. Great fun to sing along with, and to watch the children who were uninhibited enough to dance. And then there was Beer and Hymns (and saxophone) – need I say more?

Informative and thought-provoking:

Bishop Mark MacDonald, National Indigenous Bishop of the Anglican Church, spoke of mourning and hope, and emphasized the role of the church in both the brokenness and the healing of our relationship with First Nations peoples.

Kairos conducted a Blanket Exercise – a great way to learn and reflect on First Nations history.

Jordan Cantwell, the moderator of the United Church, brought a vision of a church that might be freed to become more prophetic as it finds itself more on the margins of society.

Brian's sessions on the Enneagram challenged us to reflect on the divine within.

Peterson Toscano described a conversation that taught a former enemy how to be sincere in seeking forgiveness.

These were just some of the opportunities to listen, learn, reflect and grow during Skylight 2016.

Eastside at Skylight, continued

Sarah Tkachuk: "I approached Skylight with excitement and uncertainty"

I approached Skylight with excitement, however not knowing what to expect. The weekend was filled with opportunities to connect, share stories, learn and grow. We heard messages from speakers who challenged us to think about our place in the world, and called us to social action:

Christa Hesselink, who talked about her book Life's Great Dare. Christa shared her faith story and her message of risking everything for an abundant life.

Raheel Raza, a Muslim Canadian, spoke of diversity and the need for religions to work together to share a message of peace and love, in a world that is divided by fear and hate.

Peterson Toscano talked about society's views on gender and taught us about non-traditional gender roles in the bible.

Max Kennel talked about violence, and how violence can be rooted in our need to impress our own perspective on others, even in our conversations and our personal interactions.

Jordan Cantwell spoke of the place of the United Church in our community, and rather than lamenting our shrinking numbers, we should celebrate that the church can be nimble because we have shed the burden of our size. We had the opportunity to listen to amazing singer-songwriters from around the world, who inspired us with their messages of love, peace and social action.

Layered on to all of this were opportunities for great conversations, and meeting new and interesting people. Skylight was celebrated on Sunday morning, with a church service in the fair grounds, where we were joined by some members of local congregations.

In a summer filled with negative news stories such as the US presidential election, the Brexit vote, and stories of war and hate, the speakers and musicians at Skylight gave a message of peace, love and faith in the world. I know that I left with an overwhelming sense of hope.

Rachel MacDonald: Refreshing, interesting and nourishing!

Skylight Music Festival was, for me, refreshing, interesting and nourishing! There are so few places where progressive Christianity is explored and celebrated through music, art, prayer, speakers and other activities.

The Festival was small enough that you could get to know people, including some of the musicians. It was great to share the experience with five from our church. Along with five other people who I knew from Regina, and lots of other friendly people, it felt like a small town.

The activities were diverse, from songwriters talking about their creative process, to a prayer seminar with a powerful forgiveness liturgy, to a talk on how our media society is taking away childhood, to inspiration to take God's Great Dare, to concerts of richlyenvisioned songs that distill truths from the singers' lives. When I needed a break there was an outdoor living room where random strangers gathered under the sunny sky, to engage in lighthearted or sometimes deep conversation.

I felt safe there, and felt free enough to take time for myself, or have quiet talks when not taking in meaningful speakers and concerts. The accommodations with four women in one room, were homey and cozy, like a slumber party. I would definitely go another time and encourage others to check it out next year!



Minister's Reflection for Fall

The primary result of mature religion is to help us grow up early so we don't keep going down the same dead ends and making the same mistakes over and over again—

The wise ones recognize that without a certain degree of inner freedom, you cannot and will not love. Spirituality is about finding that freedom. Most of us didn't grow up thinking of religion as a path of freedom. We were taught a set of prescriptions, dos and don'ts, musts, oughts, and shoulds—against which we pushed back, like children always do. Yes, some amount of structure is important, as I tried to say in my book Falling Upward. [1] But that's just first-level growth, and far too much religion stays right there, "milk instead of meat," as Paul puts it (1 Corinthians 3:2).

I have been receiving and reading <u>Richard Rohr's daily meditations</u> and have found them very insightful and helpful. This quote was from one of them in late August. His theme for the last two weeks has been "Letting Go". It can be a difficult thing for us to let go of that which we need to. Whether it is letting go of an issue that has been over-occupying our mind, a belief that no longer serves us, control over the choices of our children (young or adults!) or the movement from one season

to the next. Sometimes we find ourselves moving into change like the season changes. Richard Rohr talks about this in his recent book Falling Upward in which he talks about two halves of life, one of building a container or identity and the second half in which we dismantle the container and find a deeper meaning in life and of God or the Divine. This will be the book study that the Craft/Study group will embark upon this fall. It is also about redefining and understanding what religion is and can be for us, unpacking what it has been, and how institutional, western religion may not have served us the best it could have, as it buys into the dominant culture. So we explore how we can deepen our faith, and what that means for deepening our spirituality and relationship with the Divine.

This is just one opportunity to explore this fall. At several points during worship this fall, we will be hearing the experiences of those who went to Skylight Festival of Arts, Faith and Justice. The children and youth will be creating a video of a story to offer in worship on Children's Sunday November 20. There is an opportunity to explore your faith and what the church believes (youth and adults together) through Faith Exploration. We can explore how we engage with our neighbourhood as a church through the book study, The

New Parish. This is more than a book, it is a movement. There is a 3 week video series that redefines the story of Adam and Eve and the Fall: Exposing the Myth of Sin and Separation by Stan Mitchell of Gracepointe Church, a Progressive Evangelical church near Nashville. We also continue with our Family Dinners, and Film and Faith. This sounds like a lot, and it is. It won't all happen at once and what we do will depend on your responses and interest in some of these programs through our program survey. I hope that you will be able to find something to engage in and find it lifegiving, challenging, and inspiring.

As we move through the seasons of the fall, may you be able to let go of summer, holding on to all the good it held for you and embrace the colours, changes, reflective time that this season can be. May you draw on the support around you to be able to let go of what you need to let go of, so that new life and energy can emerge and blossom.

Exposing the Myth of Sin and Separation



Most of us tend to think of the second half of life as largely about getting old, dealing with health issues, and letting go of life, but the whole thesis of this book is exactly the opposite. What looks like falling down can largely be experienced as "falling upward." In fact, it is not a loss but somehow actually a gain, as we have all seen with elders who have come to their fullness."

Parents with kids, and grandparents with grandchildren are all welcome (bring your kids too if you can!).



Update on Mortgage Fundraiser

The fundraiser to reduce Eastside's mortgage has resulted in a significant improvement to our financial circumstances. To August 31, a total of \$29,550 has been pledged, of which \$21,050 has been received, and the remaining \$8,500 is outstanding.


Eastside's mortgage obligation for 2016 is \$10,000, so this amount will be used to fund current year payments, with the remaining \$19,550 carried forward to future years.

The 2016 mortgage payments have been addressed, however the mortgage

continues until August 31, 2024, and Eastside faces an estimated \$63,619 of payments in future years. After deducting amounts raised to date, the amount of unfunded mortgage payments is only \$44,069, or approximately \$5,800 per year. This is a tremendous improvement from previous years, because prior to 2014, Eastside's mortgage payments were at least \$16,000 per year.

Members of the congregation are encouraged to continue making special payments to chip away at the remaining 4,400,000 cents of our debt!






BRING YOUR PETS TOTHE LSC FOR A SPECIAL BLESSING!

The **Blessing of the Animals** is held each year in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's kindness to all creatures. Saint Francis was a Catholic friar who gave up a life of wealth to live a life of poverty, and was best known for his love of nature and animals. There are many stories about Saint Francis preaching to animals. It is said that one day he was talking to a flock of birds when they began to sing together, flew into the sky, and reputedly formed the sign of a cross! Through his writing of The Canticle of the Creatures, St. Francis shared with us his thoughts "about the Lord's creatures, of which we make daily use, without which we cannot live, and with which the human race greatly offends its Creator". October 4th is observed as Saint Francis Feast Day and Blessing of the Animals services are held on a date near to this.

Financial Update: Jan 1 - June 30, 2016

Eastside incurred a deficit of \$1,237 during the first six months of 2016 (see below), however this does <u>not</u> include the full amount that has been raised to date to reduce the mortgage. Only \$5,000 has been be used from the mortgage fundraiser for the quarterly mortgage payments; the remainder has been carried forward to make future mortgage payments.

As shown below, the deficit is a significant improvement from each of the past three years. It should also be noted that the deficit at March 31, 2016 was \$3,480, so Eastside posted a <u>surplus</u> of \$2,243 between April and June!

Looking ahead to the last half of the year, Eastside appears to have a good chance of avoiding a deficit for 2016, particularly now that the mortgage payments for the year have been covered. Operating expenses are anticipated to be slightly lower in the second half of the year, and Eastside will also receive the benefit of some pledges of increased monthly PAR giving that resulted from the mortgage fundraising drive.

Longtime members of the congregation know that Eastside has struggled financially in recent years, however the generous giving to date in 2016 has things moving in a positive direction. Let's keep the momentum for the remainder of the year!
