Pastor's Word: Re-Opening News

A Re-Opening Committee has been formed to lead us in planning for a return to in-person worship services and other gatherings. The committee held its first meeting June 23. Members include Wes Johnson, Mindy Phomvisay, Patricia Izbicki, Elizabeth Stegemöller, Aaron Stegemöller, Joe Parrish, Moderator Jere Maddux, and Pastor Dave Russell. In forming the committee, we took care to include representatives from trustees, deacons, and the worship committee as well as those involved in Christian Education, familiar with safety and sanitation procedures, with technology skills, and with ties to the university.

In preparation for the first meeting, the group read a number of documents including recommendations of health authorities and denominational and ecumenical task forces, as well as the experience of other congregations. At the first meeting, the committee listed the various issues and questions that surround meeting in person again. The list was fairly long; re-opening the building is a lot more difficult than closing it. The committee was in agreement on some key matters:

- When we return to in-person worship, we will want to continue to offer a virtual option. There are many at-risk persons in our church, and we understand that some may not feel safe about returning to the sanctuary until there is a vaccine.
- Given the recent spike in COVID cases in Ames, it seems wise to wait until after school starts to see what affect the return of students has on cases in the community before determining the next step.
- In-person worship will be different when we return, and group singing is especially problematic. This is a matter of concern for us.
- The "road to re-opening" may come in steps. We can foresee having worship outdoors for a time when we return, as this is much safer than gathering indoors. After that, the next step might be a "soft" indoor re-opening.
- All of the plans we make are tentative; as we have seen, conditions can change quickly.
- Loving our neighbors is the guiding principle behind our response to the virus.

Committee members are researching a number of issues, including possibilities for music, technology needs, sanitizing procedures, a congregational survey, the capacity of our sanctuary with necessary distancing, and more. If you have comments or questions, please contact one of the committee members.

Following the Re-Opening Committee meeting, our deacons met and made the decision to continue with Zoom worship through at least the end of August. We hope to be able to meet in person this fall, possibly beginning with outdoor services.

I have to say that after the decision to continue with our current format through the summer, I felt a bit disheartened. "Bummed" is actually the word. I know that this was the right decision; it wasn't even a hard decision. But as the pandemic drags on, being apart does not get any easier. We miss being together. We miss the handshakes and hugs and meals and close fellowship.

Having said that, I want to say how proud I am of this congregation. We have pulled together in an amazing way through a difficult time. Folks are caring for one another and for their neighbors, and our ministry has continued – and even grown in some ways. I know that many of you have contributed to local agencies that provide food, shelter, and other assistance to people in need during this difficult time. We are reaching out with cards and phone calls and grocery runs and technology help. And I received an email from a person living in another state who said that one of the nicest things about the pandemic was being able to worship with our church.

Thank you for all that you do, and I look forward to seeing you this Sunday!

Responding to Racial Injustice

As our nation continues to come to grips with its long legacy of racism, our church will be providing opportunities for study, reflection, and conversation. As Cathy Parrish shared in last month's Spire, our church library has a number of books for all ages, many just added, addressing matters of race and injustice. You can call the church to set up a time to stop by the library, or contact Cathy. We can deliver books to you!

Our **Thursday night devotion** will spend the next three weeks (July 2, 9 and 16) watching and discussing portions of a TED interview with <u>Ibram Kendi</u>. Kendi is a historian, leading scholar of race and discriminatory policy in America, and author of best-selling books including *Stamped from the Beginning* (winner of the National Book Award) and *How to Be an Anti-Racist*. In this interview he talks about how to uproot injustice and inequality and replace them with love. We will look at short (around 15 minute portions) of the interview each week.



Then on Sunday, July 19, we will have a **forum following worship** – as we typically do a few times over the summer. We will watch and discuss a presentation from the Baptist Joint Committee's annual luncheon held June 26, featuring a conversation with <u>Robert P. Jones</u> on "White Supremacy and American Christianity." Jones is the author of the forthcoming book *White Too Long: The Legacy of White Supremacy in American Christianity*, and *The End of White Christian America*, which won the 2019 Grawemeyer Award in Religion.

As is the case for much of what we are doing right now, these virtual gatherings will happen via Zoom. We look forward to opportunities to reflect and consider together how things really are and how we can work to make things better.
