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It has already picked up some prestigious awards, including one on Sunday, and was featured in an Antique Automobile Club of America magazine.

The Zapotoks paid about \$16,000 for the truck.

Car Club Secretary Dave Thomas estimated 6,000 people flocked Sunday to the wooded hilltop to ogle more than 400 muscle, antique and creatively modified cars.

The car show is the club's biggest annual fundraiser, the proceeds of which go to local organizations like the Children's Advocacy Center. the Ronald McDonald House and the Janet Weis Children's Miracle Network.

Thomas estimated the oneday event would pull in between \$10,000 and \$14,000 for their cause, after adding concession sales and individual donations. He applauded the community for its support and said one man simply approached him, shook his hand and passed a \$100 bill before walking away.
