
In 2018, ID is required to vote in Iowa

Acceptable forms of identification include valid



Without ID, in 2018, voters may sign an oath verifying their identity. Beginning 2019, no oath will be allowed. In 2018 and 2019 voter's signature will be required and reviewed as part of the ID process.

Absentee Voting

If you can't go to the polls on election day, request an absentee ballot from your County Auditor's Office.

Download an absentee ballot request form from the county auditor's website or request one in-person.

Voters must provide an ID number from one of these 3 sources on their absentee ballot request

Completed requests can either be mailed or delivered to your Auditor's Office.

In 2019, ID is required to vote in Iowa

Acceptable forms of identification are the same as 2018 (reverse side)

Without ID, in 2019, voters may vote a <u>provisional ballot</u> or have another registered voter vouch for their identification, which allows them to vote a regular ballot.

Persons casting provisional ballots will need to verify identity after election day. Your county Auditor's Office can provide information about accepted documents and deadlines.
