
#### COLLEGE STUDENT INFO NEEDED

## A Brief Look At Some Summer Hill History By Harry Schwenk


With this being the month of October, following are reports of several special October services that were held at St. Paul's throughout its history.

On Sunday, October 13, 1940, a special day of festivities occurred. At 9:00 a.m., Sunday School was held with Paul Dewald, the Sunday School Superintendent, in charge. A service of Holy Communion was held at 10:00 a.m., with The Rev. Steigerwalt being assisted by The Rev. Leonard Nicholas of Pottsville. The Rev. Steigerwalt preached the sermon, "Witness Bearers." At noon, dinner was served in the picnic grove by the women and girls of the church, under the direction of Mrs. Mabel Steigerwalt. New friends were greeted and old acquaintances were renewed. At 2:00 p.m., a Reunion of Catechetical Classes service was held. The Rev. W. L. Gallenkamp, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Frackville and a close friend of The Rev. Steigerwalt, was the guest speaker. His topic was, "Christianity in Action," based on Exodus 5:2. This service was one of the largest and most successful reunions ever experienced on Summer Hill, which had more than 800 people in attendance. The old church, accommodating about 500 people, was filled to capacity, including an additional four dozen chairs. According to one report, there were almost as many people outside the church as there were inside.

On Sunday, October 29, 1944, special services were held at St. Paul's, commemorating its 160<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the congregations being affiliated with their Synods. At this time, the ministers of St. Paul's Union Church were The Rev. Clarence Steigerwalt and The Rev. Edwin Fahringer. The day began with Sunday School at 9:00 a.m. The morning church service was held at 10:00 a.m., with the Rev. Fahringer being in charge. The guest speaker for this service was The Rev. Frederick D. Eyster, pastor of St. John's Evangelical and Reformed Church in Schuylkill Haven. The church choir, under the direction of Mrs. Clark Rauch, sang "The Holy City" and "The Lord's Prayer." In the afternoon, a special anniversary service was held at 2:00 p.m., with The Rev. Steigerwalt being in charge. The Rev. E. A. Acker, pastor of Christ Lutheran Church in Schuylkill Haven was the guest speaker. His subject was "Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow." The Rev. Edwin H. Smoll brought greetings to his former parish.

On Sunday, October 6, 1957, more than 600 people attended two services at St. Paul's Lutheran Church. The services were for the observance of World-Wide Communion, the reunion of catechetical classes, and the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of The Rev. Clarence Steigerwalt being pastor of the three churches in the parish. The day's activities began with Sunday School at 9:00 a.m. The Reunion Service was held at 10:00 a.m. with 268 people attending. All who had been confirmed at St. Paul's were recognized, along with The Rev. Steigerwalt for his 30 years of service. The committee in charge of the reunion consisted of members of the confirmation classes from 1887-1957. The oldest representative of the group confirmed at Summer Hill was Joel M. Phillips. He was confirmed in1887, and a life-long member of St. Paul's. A basket of flowers was presented to him. His wife, Nora (Krammes) Phillips, was confirmed in 1889. They were the grandparents of Regina Phillips, a current member of our congregation. At noon, a turkey dinner was served by the women of the church. The 2:00 p.m. World-Wide Communion service was attended by 344 people. The Rev. Steigerwalt preached, and assisting him in distributing Holy Communion was his son-in-law, The Rev. Craig J. Dorward.


