One more piece of good news: The numbers are in from our Fiesta Hat Show. We made more money from this Hat Show than we ever made before. Who would have ever thought that we would do so well after being totally closed two year ago due to Covid. We should feel very blessed.

It seems somewhat surreal for me to be writing my last president's message for the newsletter. I am completing my two-year term as President of the Woman's Club. I call myself the Covid President. By that, I mean that nothing was normal or the same, and everything was always changing. When I started, the club was closed and there was no staff or members around. The house was dark and empty. The first thing I did was to go to all of the vendors of the club and asked for a discounted price. To my surprise, I got it. I was most pleased to get the elevator service reduced by a thousand dollars a year. Through all of this, I am very proud of my Board of Directors. They signed up and took turns working in the club office 3 hours a day. They dusted the furniture, scrubbed the floors and cleaned the toilets. I forwarded the club phone to my cell phone and I took all of the calls 24/7. Everyone went over and beyond and made the best out of a bad situation.

The city finally allowed groups to start meeting with restrictions. We sanitized door handles, elevator buttons, signed waivers, wore masks, and sat everyone 6' apart. We used our tape measures and measured 6' between the chairs. We used paper goods at our luncheons instead of china and silverware. Our big events in 2020, like the Fall Luncheon and Christmas Faire were canceled. However, Dona Liston and Michael Quintanilla came and did a beautiful job decorating the Mansion for Christmas 2020. Dona brought her big Santa and sat him in front of the Christmas tree. Little by little we were able to work our way back to what was somewhat normal. By Christmas 2021, we were back and Janice McGraw turned the Mansion into a Christmas Wonderland.

Again, I can't say enough about my board. To me, they are the best board ever and certainly the hardest working board. They have made good decisions. At every meeting there were issues they needed to discuss and address. They realized the importance of attending the meetings because they were the ones who would move this club forward.

The homeless were always a big problem for us. I made friends with the people in the coffee shop across the street. They would call me if they saw something irregular happening at the club after hours. I am very proud of the safety enclosure our House Chairman, Susan Gargotta, thought to put up across the back of the house to keep the homeless off of the back porches. They loved making the back porches their home. They left their trash, broke things and their behavior was often times concerning.

I am so happy that we have Tina Zimmerman as our House Supervisor and Chef. The house looks so clean and organized and her meals are delicious. We hope that she loves us enough to continue her services for a long time. She is definitely a golden nugget.

I also want to thank our members for stepping up and loving and supporting their club. We need many helping hands to make our monthly meetings and major events throughout the year a success.

Last but not least, I would like to thank my Vice President, Virginia Van Cleave. We have worked together so well. She has been respectful to me as President and always willing to help. We always carried our cell phones on our hip and felt free to call each other day or night. That's what it took to get this club through the unprecedented last two years.

At the May 2022 General Meeting, the Club was presented with a painting of Laura Sistrunk (1923-2017), Life Member, Patron and benefactor. The portrait was painted by Neka Scarborough-Jenkins. With the presentation, Tawana Timberlake shared stories of both the lady in the painting and the lady who painted the portrait. Following are excerpts from Tawana's presentation:

Laura Sistrunk joined the Woman's Club in 1988, serving tirelessly for 29 years. She was always an enthusiastic participant at any of our events, whether it was as a sexy flapper or sporting an angelic poodle skirt, she always delighted all with her choice of attire. But mostly she was known for her hats, and her classic and elegant style, but with a bit of sass! Though never holding the office of president of the Club, she served on many boards and Round Tables.

Laura loved the Woodward mansion and she loved its history. She believed in the purpose of this Club. Her tireless support wherever, whenever needed is well known. She provided financial support including finishing the elevator purchase, the final check for the completion of the driveway under porte cochere, the work on the back of the house and much more. Her generosity continues to this day. Laura's \$150K endowment collects interest annually which goes to the Restoration Fund for the house, with principal intact, as per her instructions.

On the day Laura's daughter gave the painting to Tawana, her daughter said that since her mother's heart and soul was with the Club for almost 30 years, the Club was the perfect place for the painting to be. She told Tawana that she was so glad Tawana organized the dedication that she wanted her to have the white hat mother is wearing in the painting.

Neka Scarborough-Jenkins, the painter and a skilled photographer, took many photos at club events after joining in 2012. Her mother, Nan Sistrunk, joined the Woman's Club to spend quality time with her daughter at these events. Tawana asked Neka, "What inspired you to paint Laura? Was it the fact that she had the same last name as your mom Nan Russell Sistrunk, or was that just a coincidence?" Neka's written response included:

Of course, I was inspired to paint her. It had already been painted in my mind, where the image of Laura and her inspiration to all remains to this day."



OLD SPANISH TRAIL

The Old Spanish Trail Centennial Celebration Association met in late 2021 to discuss the Centennial with local interested organizations. An invitation was sent to The Woman's Club and vice president Virginia Van Cleave attended. In the early 1900s the Old Spanish Trail (OST) movement was organized to promote a paved automobile highway across the southern United States connecting 6 centers of historical interest.: St. Augustine, San Antonio, El Paso, Tucson and San Diego. In December 1915, in Mobile, Alabama, interested parties met to connect New Orleans to the east coast of Florida. In July, 1919, a conference was held in San Antonio to lead movement across Texas. Harral Ayres was chosen as the Managing Director, and the Gunter Hotel would be the headquarters. June to December 1922, Mr. Ayres was in Washington D.C. gathering signatures of senators and congressman to declare the OST a basic trunk line of the US system assuring that every mile of the OST be included in Federal Aid management. In March 27, 1924 Texas Gov. Pat Neff dedicated a zero-mile marker stone of OST on San Antonio City Hall grounds. Today, the goal of this association is to implement the 1924 reenactment in 2024. They want local organizations to participate in this effort. Local Women's clubs organized the event in 1924 and the stone marker was signed by Mrs. Beretta, the president of the San Antonio Women's Federation, Inc. More information to come.
