Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Augustus will host the Trappe 300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Civic Service on Saturday, November 4, 2017 at 1:00 PM in the Historic Old Trappe Church. The Reverend Dr. Karl Krueger will be our guest preacher. The entire Trappe community is invited to this service.



The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, November 12, 2017 after the 10:30 AM service. The Women of the ELCA will serve lunch in Fellowship Hall and we will then proceed to the meeting. At this meeting, the voting members of the congregation approve the 2018 budget and elect Vestry members. Copies of the 2018 budget proposed to the voting members of Augustus by the Vestry will be available after each service on Sunday, November 5, 2017.

What is the purpose of the Annual Congregational Meetings?

The Annual Congregational Meeting is necessary to authorize the expense budget for the coming year and to elect Vestry members, who serve three (3) year terms. The Annual Congregation Meeting is an opportunity for the Augustus Lutheran Church family to gather and seek to discern God's will for Augustus in the coming year. Augustus has another Congregational Meeting in the early part of 2018 to deal with other topics.

Who can vote at the Congregational Meeting?

**Voting members** are confirmed members. Such confirmed members, during the current or preceding calendar year, shall have communed in this congregation and shall have made a contribution of record to this congregation. Members of this congregation who have satisfied these basic standards shall have the privilege of voice and vote at every regular and special meeting of the congregation.



#### An Outlaw and International Hero Who Commended Himself and the Church of the Reformation to Christ's Mercy

#### IN LATER LIFE, MARTIN LUTHER HAD BECOME

INTERNATIONALLY KNOWN. Despite his return to Wittenberg from hiding at the Wartburg, Luther remained an outlaw due to his condemnation at Worms. However, Saxony was isolated enough that he was safe from the emperor so long as he remained there. Thus, his role became one of providing guidance to others.

Luther adopted a new role as leader of a new church body. He discovered that many of the laity were ignorant of his reforms. After translating the Bible into German, he wanted the laity to be able to engage with it. Therefore, he wrote his Small and Large Catechisms in order to provide good theology that the laity could understand, an entry point into the Scriptures, and right order and behavior.

In this period, Luther also had to address theological problems. In addition to his continued challenges with Rome's response to the Reformation, he also faced other reformers who transformed his ideas to their own ends.

First, Luther clarified the relationship of the church and the state. Due to the Peasants' Revolt, he was faced with a theological question of how "social" his Gospel needed to be. Luther responded by developing his two kingdoms theology. This theology holds that we must distinguish clearly between God's Kingdom of Power and His Kingdom of Grace. Christians should act in society according to their consciences — which are informed by their faith — but Luther did not believe that the church should dictate government policy.

Second, Luther had to address competing views of the Lord's Supper. Luther had successfully refuted the "transubstantiation" view of the Roman church, but the issue was confused by the view that the soul fed on Christ only spiritually, as Calvin later popularized. Others argued that the Sacrament only "represented" Jesus' body. This caused Luther to insist on the real presence, emphasizing that while transubstantiation was in error, it did not mean the solution to that error was to separate the Sacrament from Jesus altogether. Instead, he remained bound to the clear words of Christ, "This is my body."

Third, Luther addressed the problem of good works. Some reformers twisted Luther's doctrine of being justified by grace without works to mean that good works were, in fact, a hindrance to salvation. This caused Luther to argue continually that good works are the proper result of faith. We are justified by faith alone, nevertheless, Christians should lead a sanctified life.

Luther became an internationally important figure. Wittenberg was a destination for young thinkers, and Luther was a hero to many. Students began taking note of everything he said; his publications were spread widely, and princes asked him for advice. Luther was least comfortable with this last political role. He was not a skilled politician and would sometimes be too aggressive in his responses.

Luther's role later in life was to encourage and to instruct. He remained resolved and consistent in his thought, despite feeling pressure from all sides. He was simultaneously heroic in his faith and human in his failings.

# **Money Matters**

## Personal Financial Stewardship

#### **Reducing and Eliminating Credit Card Debt**

Because desires often exceed the ability to pay, many of us have a lot of debt. Certainly, we are in debt when we can't pay off our credit cards at the end of each month, or can't provide for our needs. Our dependence on debt is possibly the most widely abused principle in God's Word regarding money. Scripture does not forbid us from borrowing money, but it does point out its disadvantages. "The rich rule over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7). Despite God's warnings, our dependence on debt continues to grow.

Some debt is unavoidable. In the case of a job loss or health problems, it may not be possible to avoid debt. In addition, some debt is acceptable, such as debt for educational purposes or home mortgages. Debt that is acquired for the purpose of spending money to make money makes economic sense. The most troublesome debt in our society is credit card debt. Credit is a means of renting money when we need it for as long as we need it. Credit allows us to enjoy something now and pay for it later. Unfortunately, for many of us, credit cards are easily accessible, and, in today's society, we are encouraged to take advantage of them. With so much available credit, it is no surprise that bankruptcies and divorces related to financial tension are on the increase. We may enjoy getting into debt, but it is not much fun getting out of it. In spite of all the warnings about debt, we are still willing to buy now and pay later. Credit cards should contain the clause, "This credit card can be hazardous to your financial well-being."



It has been said that there are three types of people. Those who "have," those who "have not," and those who "have not paid for what they have." Many people are paying five to 20 percent or more of their budgets toward credit card debt, which places a great burden on family expenses. The financial burden is caused by the high interest rates that credit card companies charge. For example, if you have a credit card balance of \$2,000 at a 15 percent annual interest rate and you remit only the minimum payment, it will take 17.5 years to repay the \$2,000 balance. The total cost, including interest charges, increases to \$4,517.62. In the time it may take to pay off your credit cards, most things that were purchased will have been lost, stolen, or worn out. We live in a society in which enough is never enough. One of the biggest reasons we get into debt is greed. "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). Jesus was criticizing the notion that the value of life is determined by the number of possessions we have. In order to avoid going deeper and deeper into unnecessary debt, a change in attitude is required. Curbing wants and desires leads to greater success in staying out of debt.

Through trauma-informed approaches children are helped to heal and manage the overwhelming feelings and memories of the bad, sad and scary things that have happened to them. The children's program offers comprehensive services including residential treatment for children ages 6-14, special education for grades K through 8, and community based services.

Silver Springs provides a continuum of care that begins when a child enters care and continues well after a child leaves our programs. Family involvement is essential and encouraged whenever possible. Silver Springs – Martin Luther School fosters hope and faith in each child for a brighter future.

In the words of one staff member, "My biggest reward is watching our children leave us with positive feelings and open hearts."

# Sharing God's Bounty

#### Part of God's Plan

n those days . . . So begins a well-known passage of Scripture. Do you know what comes next? "In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree . . ." (Luke 2:1). Some of us can quote the whole story by heart. Even though we've heard it year after year, some of us for many years, the story is still precious to hear, still warms our souls, still excites our minds, still calms our fears.

Two seemingly inconsequential people of little means obeyed that decree and traveled to the town of Bethlehem to register for the census. The woman, Mary, was about to have a child. She knew that her child was the Son of God, a child to be named Jesus. Joseph, her husband, knew he was not the father of the child, although that was how the world



saw him. These were two of God's faithful. They knew the prophecies regarding the Messiah. They had been visited by the angel and learned that they were to be part of the fulfillment of those prophecies. They didn't know how things would turn out. They didn't know all that God had in store for them. They just "obey[ed their] rulers and submitted to their authority" (Hebrews 13:17) as they trusted God to guide and protect them and his Son each step they took on his path.

Of course, God did just that. God provided a place for the Child to be born (Luke 2:7). God sent angels to announce the birth of the King and moved the shepherds to respond to the joyful news and go to worship the new Baby (Luke 2:8-20). He sent "Magi from the East" who brought "gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh" and then believed the warning God gave them in a dream and avoided the evil King Herod on their return trip (Matthew 2:1-12).

How many of these people involved in this most wondrous story realized the important and memorable parts they played? We cannot say for sure but surmise none could really comprehend the eternal significance of the events as they unfolded.

We, too, are involved in God's plans. Certainly none can equal in importance the birth of Christ, but nothing God does is without purpose. Are we listening for the voice of the Spirit as God speaks to us through God's



Word? Are we, as we go about our daily routines, obeying our rulers, cognizant of being God's feet and hands and voice to carry out his plan? Do we bring our gifts, aware that God may use them according to a purpose we can't even imagine? How exciting it is to think and know that we are God's instruments! What a loss of blessing to us if we refuse to let God use us and another gets the opportunity instead (Esther 4:14)!

As we live out our daily lives as stewards, "let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith . . . so that we will not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:2-3), but instead look forward with eagerness and anticipation toward the unfolding of God's plan in our lives.

#### The Luther Rose

The beautiful stained glass window on the front of the elevator tower contains a cross with the Luther Rose at its center. The Luther Rose, designed by Martin Luther himself, has served as the main emblem of Lutheranism from the very beginning of the Lutheran Reformation.

The BLACK CROSS in the center reminds us that Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins.

The RED HEART reminds us of the love God has for us in sending Jesus to be our Savior. The red of the heart is the color of the blood of Christ, shed for us and for our salvation.

The WHITE ROSE helps us remember the work of the Holy Spirit who makes us pure and holy in God's sight by bringing us to faith in Jesus and by helping us to live our lives for him.

The SKY BLUE BACKGROUND pictures the joy of the new life God gives to all who believe and trust in him.

Finally, the GOLDEN RING outlining the seal reminds us of our eternal inheritance – a home in heaven where we will enjoy complete joy and happiness in our Savior's Presence.

### Luther's Friend and Political Adviser to Elector Frederick the Wise

THE ILLEGITIMATE SON OF A TANNER, GEORG SPALATIN WAS BORN GEORG BURCKHARDT IN THE SMALL TOWN OF SPALT, SOUTHEAST OF NÜRNBERG. The young Burckhardt attended Latin school in Nürnberg, where he became the disciple of humanist Heinrich Grüninger. In 1498, he advanced to the University of Erfurt and studied under the humanist Nikolaus Marschalk.

In 1502, he followed Marschalk to Wittenberg and earned the "Magister artium" degree in 1503 — the same year he took the name "Spalatinus," the Latinized name of his hometown. Spalatin began to study the Bible in the manner of Erasmus, studying both law and theology. He became a notary public in 1507 and was ordained in 1508, the same year he was called by Elector Frederick the Wise to tutor his nephew, Duke John Frederick. Later, Spalatin was given the responsibility of continuing the Saxon Chronicle, and he moved back to Wittenberg in 1511.

The following year, he was put in charge of the newly founded castle library in Wittenberg. It was at this time that he became friends with Martin Luther; their working relationship is preserved in many letters.

Beginning in 1516, Spalatin was both the elector's secretary and ecclesiastical counselor, and he became the court preacher in 1522.

Spalatin acted as an intermediary between Elector Frederick and the Augustinian monk during the critical early years of the Reformation. On more than one occasion, he played a vital role in protecting Luther from the demands from Rome.

In 1527, Spalatin was instrumental at the Diet of Speyer, at which the princes declared that they had the right to their own sovereignty and, therefore, could ignore the orders from the emperor in regard to matters of religion (most specifically with handing Luther over to Rome). It was this idea of Spalatin's that proved most effective in allowing the princes to govern their own regions and set a precedent that was borrowed many times over throughout the Reformation with the general principle "whose realm, his religion" (e.g., the Peace of Augsburg of 1555).

Spalatin is unique among the major figures in the Reformation. He neither led a major popular movement of people (only instituting local reforms), nor did he leave behind many theological writings. Spalatin instead is important as an intermediary who advised and helped shape the actions of others: Frederick, Luther and the princes. His correspondence with Luther sheds much light on the day-to-day workings of the Saxon court in relation to the Reformation. His role as mediator was of utmost importance and allowed Luther and the Reformation to not only survive but flourish.

The Reverend Violet Little of The Welcome Church of Philadelphia <a href="http://www.thewelcomechurch.org">http://www.thewelcomechurch.org</a>, a church without walls serving Philadelphia's homeless community, will be our guest speaker. Please mark your calendars & plan to attend. You won't want to miss this service!! The Reverend Violet Little is a very dynamic and bold woman - someone greatly admired for her ministry.

The Rev. Violet Cucciniello Little of The Welcome Church best describes who (and whose) she is as a Child of God. She was born September 7, 1952 to my Italian Catholic family on New York's Lower East Side. Baptized in St. Patrick's Old Cathedral two weeks after her birth, and confirmed eight years later, she was educated in the Catholic School system through college where she earned her B.A. in English from St. Joseph's University in 1974, the first graduating class of women for that school. In that same year she married Willie D. Little, who, after forty plus years continues to be a source of strength and support for her on her life and faith journey. Willie and her have been blessed with two sons, Jason and Matthew. Jason, Jen, and their grandsons, Gabriel and Nicholas, live in Glenside; Matt lives in Pasadena, California.

Growing up in a poor but loving family made her especially sensitive to the unfair distribution of resources in our society. That, along with the mandate of our

God to show hospitality to the stranger, have shaped the various types of work she has done prior to her ordination in 1992, as well as following her ordination. This work has included working with families at risk, coordinating programs for parents, serving as an ecumenical campus pastor at Philadelphia University, and leading Formation Groups as well as teaching at the Lutheran Seminary of Philadelphia. Her fifteen year pastorate at St. Michael's Lutheran Church increased her love for urban ministry and led her to find The Welcome Center, a place of hospitality and healing for people experiencing homelessness in Philadelphia. After three years of serving as founder of The Welcome Center, the community began to define itself as "church" and in 2010 she was called to be Mission Developer and pastor of The Welcome Church, a church without walls serving Philadelphia's homeless community.

Her experience in urban ministry also pushed her in the direction of a ten year training in the area of psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy. Trained in both child and adult psychotherapy, she opened a two

day a week low fee private practice in 1999. Her practice continues today with an office based at the seminary. In addition to the work she does with The Welcome Church and in her private practice, she is an active anti-racist and serves on the anti-racism training team for the Chicago-based Women of the ELCA. She writes extensively, and has published a number of faith based articles and studies. She has served on the FDA as a consumer advocate, has worked with Women in Church and Society for the Lutheran World Federation in Geneva, and most recently has helped to form a national network in the ELCA for those of us working with people in poverty. In 2013 she received The Purpose Prize, a national award allowing The Welcome Church to gain national recognition. For all these opportunities she has had to give witness to God's amazing grace, she is most truly grateful.



Also on this day, quilts and afghans made by the Hearts and Hands Committee of Augustus' Women of the ELCA under the direction of Mildred Stuffle will adorn the church sanctuary. The quilts will then be sent to Lutheran World Relief to be distributed to countries all over the world to help those people less fortunate. The




afghans will be taken to Laurel House, a shelter for abused women and children, in Norristown.


