

STATES, JUSTICE DEPART-**MENT SEEK CHANGES TO GOOGLE BUSINESS PRACTIC-**ES TO END SEARCH ENGINE **MONOPOLY**

Nov. 21, 2024 (DENVER) -State attorneys general along with the Justice Department have proposed a robust package of remedies to end Google's unlawful monopoly over internet search engines and to restore competition to benefit consumers.

In December of 2020, Colorado Attorney General Phil Weiser led a bipartisan coalition of 38 states in filing a lawsuit alleging that Google illegally maintains its monopoly power over general search engines through anticompetitive contracts and conduct. The multistate law-

suit was a companion to an earlier federal antitrust lawsuit the Justice Department filed in October 2020.

In a landmark decision in

August 2024, a D.C. federal district court judge ruled that Google violated federal antitrust laws by illegally maintaining a monopoly in online search and search text ads. At issue now are the remedies the court will impose to end Google's improper conduct that has stifled competition and harmed consumers, and the steps necessary to restore competition for the benefit of consumers.

"Google's illegal monopolization of search and search advertising has harmed consumers, thwarted innovation, and undermined the competitive marketplace. It's

critical that the judge mandate effective remedies that address the harms to competition and provide consumers with the benefits of an open and fair marketplace. We will continue to press for and oversee the necessary remedies to Google's monopolistic conduct,"

The proposed final judgment, or PFJ, filed with the court seeks to end Google's illegal monopoly and restore competition in several ways. The PFJ ends Google's search distribution contracts and revenue sharing agreements by prohibiting Google from paying to be the initial default search engine on any phone, device, or browser. Google is also required to share its data and information—un-

lawfully obtained through its monopoly power—with rivals to improve the competitive choices available to consumers. This data will be shared in a manner that safeguards personal privacy and security.

Additionally, the PFJ seeks the divestiture of Chrome, the Google browser through which a significant percentage of all Google searches are made. Coupled with that request will be provisions for additional divestitures, including the Android operating system, if Google fails to comply with specific remedies or if the remedies prove ineffective.

Moreover, the PFJ prohibits Google from foreclosing compe-

Mayor Heather Graham Responds to Failed Funding for City Park Bath House

PUEBLO—On Monday, November 25, Pueblo City Council failed to pass the remaining funding for the City Park Tennis Facility at the current site of the City Park Bath House.

The proposed funding sources included reallocating left over American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) monies from completed projects in order to fund the \$1,316,841 shortfall for the new tennis facility. Mayor Graham and City staff proposed to allocate funds without any General Fund accounts as a funding source, primarily through ARPA dollars. Multiple staff presentations and work sessions have taken place since February of this year to explain funding sources to complete this project.

Should We Fear Trump Tariffs?

Frankly, when I started writing this article I was in fear of "Trump tariffs." After all, we did have a trade war with China the last go-around. But, as you'll see below, they may not be earth shattering to our economy. Which is the foundation of our investment markets.

First off, what are tariffs and what are they used for? After a quick review, I learned they are a "tax on imported goods," according to an article by Erica York at the Tax Foundation

(scan the included QR code to read the article). Investopedia.



com says they're used "by governments to raise revenue, protect domestic industries,

or exert political leverage over another country."

It sounds like President-elect Trump wants to use tariffs for all 3 reasons. To raise revenue chiefly from China and maybe Canada and Mexico; to protect and promote domestic producers in multiple industries; and, pretty obviously, for negotiating leverage with China especially.

Two chief concerns for significantly higher tariffs are potential trade wars and economic tightening and also inflation.

TRADE WARS II

The Tax Foundation article continues with saying new tariff wars could drop output by 0.2 to 0.7%. We don't want any drop but that, even on the high end, would not get us to negative GDP numbers.

There's also the chance that positive policies could contribute to extra growth. For now, I'm taking a more positive stance only because the markets are remaining strong. The markets are leading indicators, many times suggesting what might happen in the near future.

INFLATION POSSIBILITIES

With the massive inflation we've had since 2020, of course no one wants anymore. Trying to find quality information I stumbled on an article about the possible inflationary impact. It could be lower than we fear.

In response to the plan to raise China tariff's by 10 percent, Goldman Sach's chief economist, Jan Hatzius said: "Using our rule of thumb that every 1 [percentage point] increase in the effective tariff rate would raise core PCE prices by

0.1%, we estimate that the proposed tariff increases would boost core PCE prices by 0.9% if implemented." So maybe 1% infla-

GDP AND CORPORATE EARNINGS

We've already talked about the possible drop in Gross Domestic Product but what are we looking at for 2025 numbers? "The Livingston Survey was started in 1946 by the late columnist Joseph Livingston. It is the oldest continuous survey of economists' expectations. It summarizes the forecasts of economists from industry, government, banking, and academia," says the PhiladelphiaFed. org website.

This survey states that, for next year, a diverse group of pro economists thinks the economy will grow about 2 percent. Now we can minus out the trade wars and we're still in positive territory. We look to be safe from recession but this could be reason to think about your portfolio expo-

sure to stocks and growth. (Scan the third QR code to read the full survey).



Corporate earnings are the main driver of stock prices and stock fundamentals. Many times the stock market does it's own thing with prices (like bubbles and too severe of downturns) but if earnings are strong the markets tend to be strong. So I look at corporate profits closely.

Earnings should continue their hot streak, estimated to go up by 13.5% in 2025. That's according to well-known economist Ed Yardeni. Mr. Yardeni is also one of those 23 Livingston economists that are surveyed. So we're safe there. No major concerns with earnings. I recommend ignoring the doom and gloom news.

There are other reasons to be "cautiously optimistic": employment is strong and looks to get better; we have lower interest rates that can stimulate the economy; and we have great CD and fixed

investment yields compared to near-zero in the past.

Yet now is still a good time to look at your portfolio. How much do you have in growth? In fixed income/bonds? How much exposure do you have to international markets and small companies? Always stay balanced and producing high portfolio income.



'LIGHT FOR THE JOURNEY'

JAN MCLAUGHLIN Columnist & founder of an international prison ministry



"PRAYER REQUESTS AND ATTITUDE ADJUSTMENTS"

aving founded and served for years as director of an international prison ministry, I have read multiple thousands of prayer requests and letters from prisoners. Most are written to amazing volunteers who pray for incarcerated individuals when they send their specific prayer requests. Some that I read are heartbreaking, some are frustrating, some aggravating and some are laugh-out-loud hilarious. Some of them clearly need an attitude adjustment and some, at times, remind me that at I am the one who needs one.

One letter from a prisoner in Florida made me smile. So different than hundreds of others flooding the mailbox this time of year. Israel wrote, "During the holidays, I don't get depressed thinking about being away from family and friends out there. I enjoy whatever blessings come my way in the holidays and thank God for what I have. I don't fret about what I don't have. The same thing with visits. I only get two or three visits a year but when my visitors leave, I don't stay sad, wishing I could leave with them. I am happy for the visit I had, and the time God gave me with my loved ones. I return to my dorm in peace. I don't take credit for this and think that

I'm strong in myself. It's a supernatural peace that surpasses all understanding and I realize it comes from God. I praise Him for His love and mercy! Jesus is truly our strength in all situations, no matter how dreary they are." Few people, even those outside of prison possess this kind of peace and contentment in the face of trials and tribulation. Often it is a matter of needing a simple attitude adjustment.

Israel is so right. When Christ inhabits a life, the evidence is peace in all circumstances. Israel has chosen gratitude. How many people, even believers are thankful, despite the circumstances and consider how very blessed they are? It is God's will for His children to be thankful, no matter what is going on in life. 1 Thes. 5:16-18 says, "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

Truly there are deeply painful situations that make rejoicing difficult. An example is a young woman in a Colorado prison who wrote, "Please pray for my brother who just turned 21 and received a life sentence in prison." Or the distraught prisoner in Florida who wrote, "Please pray that hope and joy to return to my life. I struggle with not wanting to live." Then there is the father pleading for prayer for his son. "Please! Pray for my son, Christopher. He is in need of a heart transplant..

. and is currently on a waiting list." A heart cry from Steven in Michigan as he requests prayer for "6-year-old Isaiah and his family. Isaiah has a rare bone cancer, and the treatments are not working. Pray for his mom who is very angry with God." Steven asked also, for prayer for himself and his family of three children who will not contact him or accept correspondence from him.

Some prayer requests warm my heart as these precious men and women cry out to God for the salvation of their loved ones. I know, there are "jail-house conversions." However, there are truly transformed men and women who have seen the light and given their lives to Christ. Jesus says, if it were only for one, He would have died for their salvation. Brian writes, "Please pray for my reconciliation with my children and that I could be the man that God has purposed me to be."

Jason who is incarcerated in a Florida prison writes, "I would like prayer for my family. None of them are believers of Jesus Christ and when I try to speak to them about Him, their eyes and minds are all closed. I would like them to have a Saul/Paul transformation!" Christipher's prayer is similar, "Pray for my cousin, Jayden. He is not a believer, and I just want prayer that he will find his way to Christ."

Certainly, some of these prayers must put a smile on the face of our Father. Alex in Michigan writes, "I'm thanking God for always being in my presence in all I go through. I'm thanking God for strengthening me in my weakness while I face trials and tribulations almost every day. I know I serve an all powerful and mighty God. I see His miracles performed every day and I am grateful. Thank you for lifting me in prayer"



tition or self-preferencing through its ownership or control of other products—including Android. Google cannot make Google Search or Google AI mandatory on Android devices, interfere with rival distribution, degrade rival quality, or leverage distributors to preference Google. Google must also give publishers the ability to opt out of having their data collected by Google for training Google's AI models or used in Generative AI answers.

The states alone also propose a public education campaign funded by Google to inform consumers what Google did, why it is illegal, and what choices they actually have in search engines. The campaign may include reasonable, short-term payments from Google to users who try non-Google search engines.

The final order establishes a five-member technical committee to implement, monitor, and enforce the remedies for ten years.

A hearing on the proposed remedies is currently scheduled to begin on April 22, 2025, and conclude by May 2.

"With multiple failed 4-3 votes for the three ordinances on the agenda, there is no more funding allocated toward the project. Four city councilors killed this project along with the stalling of the project due to the Historic Preservation Commission," said Mayor of Pueblo Heather Graham. "With the budget deficit of \$8 million we're facing and was also explained last night outside of the Tennis Building discussion, there are no General Fund dollars or other sources we can choose from to continue this project forward."


Councilors Joe Latino, Roger Gomez, Dennis Flores and Council President Mark Aliff were the four who all voted against the ordinance and funding of the new construction of a City Park Tennis Facility. To date \$136,448 funds have been expended toward the project with contractual agreements, environmental testing and asbestos testing for remediation efforts.

The City had previously secured \$1,782,035 for the tennis complex renovations which included allocations from the General Fund, a \$182,000 grant from the Rawlings Foundation Grant, \$350,000 in Colorado Lottery funds and \$500,000 ARPA funding and public donation. This \$1,782,035 that was allocated by the City was approved by City Council in May.

Unfortunately, at this time the City of Pueblo is against a hard deadline of December 31, 2024, to reallocate and award all ARPA funding to be encumbered in order to meet the federal deadline. Federal guidelines for ARPA then require the allocation to be spent and the project to be completed by December 31, 2026.

Although many individuals came forward and pleaded that the funding source is not dead, with only two more City Council meetings left there is not enough time to pass a new ordinance re-obligating remaining funds.

"If the Council wishes to approve allocations over \$1,000,000 to obligate funds, it requires two public readings of ordinances. Tuesday, November 26 is the deadline to have all ordinances submitted for the draft agenda

for Monday, December 9, therefore making the turnaround time for ordinances with funding sources of over \$1,000,000 impossible to pass by the December 31, 2024, ARPA Treasury rule for allocation of funds deadline.

"City staff and contracted professionals spent countless hours since spring of 2024 to present the architectural design, the site study, engineering information and funding sources," said Mayor Graham. "While there were individuals from the Historic Preservation Committee and citizens who testified that an agreement could be made, the proposal has changed multiple times and now the group is proposing the City Park Bath House could be rehabilitated for \$1.2 million. This however still does not address the additional funding needed for a brand-new tennis facility. Since all of the funding was unapproved by the 4-3 failed vote, there is no longer a funding source for the project to move forward."

The City of Pueblo is committed to the maintenance of the current City Park Bath House; however, the building is currently largely inoperable and requires ADA compliance updates to be made in order to meet requirements. Currently, there is no funding allocated to this maintenance, or any construction costs associated with ADA compliance for the current building.

The City of Pueblo was established in 1842, incorporated in 1870 and is proudly called the "Home of Heroes".





A Royal betrayal. Imagine. Undoubtably, unexplained mysteries

involve splendid treasures, and lost fortunes. Sources initially lead us on with imminent expectations of discovery. All prompting hundreds of amateur sleuths to embark on perilous adventures within the planet, hoping to become wealthy overnight! For instance, the 'gold rush' days in 1874 began in Cripple Creek Colorado. Their burial ground has a wealth of knowledge, identifying many dubious characters from the early days of gold panning. It's worth a visit.

Our story today involves royal wealth beyond anyone's comprehension: albeit a massive fortune, yet powerless to prevent the Russian royals from suffering and ultimate death.

Another character, too problematic and complicated, to include in this narrative, is Rasputin, his influence on the tzarina

was extensive and without question, eventually allowing him to apply his egotistical rule within the palace hierarchy. A latent magician, and well-known con artist, he convinced the tzarina of his ability to stop Alexei's bleeding. Naturally, much to the

dismay of governing representatives, Alexandra revered Rasputin and held him in high esteem. Join me for December's column when I write about this gnarly character.

By 1918 Russia was controlled by a tyrannical communist faction, named the Bolsheviks. Revolutions were more intense. In the city of Yekaterinburg,

resided the wealthy Russian royal family. Tsar Nicholas Romanov, consistently in fear of these changes in his country, lived with his wife, and five of their beloved children. His almost identical English cousin King George the fifth would always offer them sanctuary in Britain: So, he thought. His family would be safe and living in similar luxury with his relatives in the United Kingdom. Their vast wealth a sure investment: protection away from Russian's present forces of evil. Since their marriage the tsarina Alexandra Feodorovna gave birth to four daughters, and lastly a 'special' son Alexei. Named Olga, Tatiana, Maria and Anastasia, the daughters grew up privileged, wanting for nothing. Their son, a delicate and incredibly handsome child, was afflicted with the 'royal disease,' which also plagued their relatives Queen Victoria's family. Hemophilia, a condition in which his blood would not clot, was comparatively rare. Much of his young life was

spent in bed, and his movements watched constantly in case of a fall, or bleeding of any kind. His mother failed to understand rings brooches and medals. In 1927 Alhow such a privileged rich family could endure such massive liability. However, she adored Alexei, and grateful to finally

> have a son and heir. As with all royal families the male child takes precedence over the females.

One fateful evening on July 16th dressed in their normally exquisite attire, they dined in luxury as usual. Later the family were assembled and apparently encouraged to gather into their cellar, as though to pose for photographs. Unexpectedly, without warning a mob of assassins burst into the dark, cold basement, immediately spraying masses of bullets into the trembling family, and when instant death wasn't apparent, without hesitation the thugs plunged in knives: butchering their limp cadavers into bloodstained pieces. One can only imagine the parents' terror seeing their children slaughtered before their eyes. Subsequently, the killers, afraid of successive retribution, spared no one.

The royalists eventually recovered Yekaterinburg. Evidence of the massacre were the bloody cellar walls and stained concrete tile, yet no corpses were salvaged. Instead, a remote location site: a mass grave was used. Prior to internment, many smaller crown jewels were already sewn into the princesses' hems. They were eagerly retrieved by the executioners.

Today many royal jewels are kept in the Kremlin Armory Museum in Moscow. The devastating Russian Civil War lasted until June 16th. 1923. Amassed since the dynasty began in 1613, the impressive, and priceless collection of jewelry included: crowns, scepters diadems, necklaces, exandra's crown sold at Christies auction amongst 124 other pieces. All proceeds

were reclaimed by the Soviet Union Government. Questions remain as to the whereabouts of their remaining precious jewelry.

By willfully denying the imperial family sanctuary into Britain, King George signed his royal cousin's death warrants: one of the vilest betrayals in history.



CHANGES TO ACCESSING SOCIAL SECURITIE'S IN-PERSON SERVICES

IN OUR ONGOING COMMITMENT TO SERVE THE PUBLIC MORE EFFICIENT-

LY, we are expanding appointment-based services at our local Social Security offices. By scheduling appointments, we will aim to reduce wait times, streamline service delivery, and improve the overall customer experience. Nearly 400 field offices have already moved to appointment-based service this year. These offices have seen significant improvements in wait times due to more efficient and helpful visitor experiences and increases in the number of customers able to complete their business online.

We are implementing appointment-based services nationwide in two phases. The first phase is a transition period now through January 5, 2025. The purpose of this transition period is to educate our customers about needing to schedule an appointment for SSA services. As a reminder, many of our services can be provided via phone with an appointment and do not require a customer to walk into an office for service.

Effective January 6, 2025, we will require customers to schedule an appointment for service in our field offices, including requests for Social Security cards. We encourage customers to become accustomed to our:

online services, where many transactions can be completed conveniently and securely,

automated services available on our National

800# at 1-800-772-1213.

Customers who are not able to handle their business online or with the automated options, may call their local Social Security office or our National 800# to schedule an appointment.

We want to make clear that we will not turn people away for service who are unable to make an appointment or do not want to make an appointment. For example, members of vulnerable populations, military personnel, people with terminal illnesses, and individuals with other situations requiring immediate or specialized attention may still walk in for service at our field offices. Some of our offices also have minimal to no wait times, and they will still serve customers who walk in.

To improve customer service and make more efficient use of our staff in our local offices, we are decommissioning the Electronic Social Security Protective Filing (eSPF) Tool, effective November 21, 2024. Your clients can learn about their filing options and express interest in filing for benefits at SSA.gov/apply, calling our National 800 Number, or contacting their local Social Security office.

We will continue to schedule appointments and take claims for individuals who used the eSPF tool before its decommissioning.

As we do twice a year, we are sending over 3000 additional copies of the View to non-subscribers in Pueblo County. We would like you to be a subscriber. Not only are we sending you a free copy so you get an idea of what we are all about, but we have a special price going on for the newspaper.

Instead of \$37.50/year for the print copy of the paper, we are currently charging \$25/year. If you would rather see the E-edition each week, that price has been lowered from \$25/year. to \$10/year. Can't hardly go wrong with that for a weekly newspaper.

In fact, we've been putting out a weekly newspaper for over 15 years. We've never missed an issue. We have run into a snag or two in the last 780+ weeks, but those have been few and far between. If I am remembering right, one time we had a major printing error causing one week's paper to deliver a day after the next week's paper in an area or two. Can you see how embarrassed I am?

Once you are a subscriber, we really do want to know what you like and what you don't.

toward a new, turf athletic practice field designated primarily for soccer. The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$897,500 which will receive additional funding from Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority (PURA), Pueblo Central High School Foundation and Pueblo School District 60.

"We are excited to partner with Pueblo School District 60, Central High School Foundation and

with PURA to build a brand-new, turf soccer field near Central High School," said Mayor of Pueblo Heather Graham. "This is a great use of ARPA funding to serve the youth in our community and to fill a need in an area of town which will greatly utilize a turf athletic field."

The field will be located at the corner of East Grant Avenue and Madison Avenue near Central High School, the property is currently owned by Pueblo School District 60. PURA has agreed to match the City of Pueblo's \$250,000 contribution for the project. The field will primarily be used for Pueblo School District 60 athletic use but will be available for public use upon reservation.

Pueblo School District 60 will be the fiscal agent and will oversee the construction of the new turf field. The Pueblo Central High School Foundation has agreed to contribute \$47,500 toward the project and Pueblo School District 60 has agreed to pay the balance of the project, not to exceed \$350,000.

"We appreciate the City's partnership, along with the Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority and the Pueblo Central High School Foundation. This project will benefit our students, families and our community for years to come," said Superintendent of Pueblo School District 60 Barbara Kimzey, Ed. D.

The City of Pueblo, PURA, Pueblo Central High School Foundation and Pueblo School District 60 have agreed on a memorandum of understanding to fulfill the project needs of the new turf soccer field. Construction is anticipated to begin in Spring of 2025. Once constructed, Pueblo School District 60 will be responsible for all maintenance, upkeep and repair of the practice field.


