

When they had had their fill, he said to his disciples, "Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted." So they collected them, and filled twelve wicker baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves that had been more than they could eat. When the people saw the sign he had done, they said, "This is truly the Prophet, the one who is to come into the world." Since Jesus knew that they were going to come and carry him off to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain alone."

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Family,



17th Sunday Ordinary Time Year B

Today's miracle from Jesus is His feeding of the multitudes! How many? We are told 'about 5,000' (John 6:10). I am struck by Philip's role in the story. Jesus turns to him and asks, "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" (John 6:5). Why this trust in Philip (or as Jn 6:6 says this 'test' of Philip)? I believe Jesus looks to Philip for his market or merchant skills. Jesus must know that Philip knows the business community or watches commerce closely, as is Jesus is saying, "Philip where can we find the best value or volume around here to feed this crowd. Philip shows that he is thinking through the proposal, when he estimates back to Jesus, that this job may be out of reach, saying basically, '200 days wages wouldn't even begin to satisfy the crowd with appetizers'. The 'test' of Philip may be Jesus teaching him to stop relying on his old networks and start relying more on his master-Jesus Himself. We hear that Philip is good at networking (Palestine's Linked In). Philip, was a 'go-to-guy' who set up the introduction of Nathaniel to Jesus back in john 1:44-45 "Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the town of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the law, and also the prophets, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth." I wonder if Philip wasn't employed earlier in life as a CFO or accountant, maybe ran the office of fishing business. He seems to stay active in the commercial world even after joining Jesus' company as much or more than Peter, John & James (maybe not as much as Paul who keep close to the Cloth Trade Union Guilds) For example, Philip will later involve himself ministering to a special convert described as an Ethiopian Official, who happens to be (wait for it....) 'in charge of th entire treasury of the Queen of the Ethiopians, Candace' (Acts 8:27). So, Philip is good with numbers.

Yet we might ask, "Who among the apostles' is the best with numbers?" Often Judas is credited with being the best math mind among the apostles, being referred to as their 'treasurer', or handling the purse (John 12:5-6, 13:29). Keep those receipts! However, we know that Matthew is in their company and he was previously a tax collector (who knows the value of a shekel more than tax collector?) But also, Peter-Andrew, James and John all come from family fishing business operations (boats-nets-hired men) and to stay in business demands a good money accounting sense. So who among the apostles was the best with numbers? If I was a betting person, I would go with Matthew! Why? Because as accountants will tell you, 'it is all in the small details'. For example, it is only Matthew's gospel that we hear Jesus review his math with the disciples after the feeding miracles, as in Matthew 16:9-10, "Do you not yet understand, and do you not remember the five loaves for the five thousand, and how many wicker baskets you took up? Or the seven loaves for the four thousand, and how many baskets you took up?" Doesn't Jesus sound like a math teacher reviewing problems or saying, "Show your Work"? And, in Matt 14:21, Matthew says "Those who ate were about five thousand men, not counting women and children" and in Matthew 15:38, he says "Those who ate were four thousand men, not counting women and children." Leaving aside for the moment the injustice of ever saying certain classes of people 'don't count', it is Matthew alone who includes such a fine detail. Doesn't such a detail sound so much like what we read in the fine print of an 'auditor's footnote' in a financial statement? And with a name like 'Math-thew', he has to be the best with numbers! Yet, I think that Philip receives the attention of Jesus in today's gospel, because Jesus was letting Philip know that the Kingdom of God would be advanced best by cultivating relationships and reaching out inclusively through networks to bring more and more people into relationship to Christ. So, Andrew and his I his newly found friend (the boy with five loaves and two fish) save the day! Welcoming the boy into fellowship with Christ, provides the initial gift of food offered for to enable everyone to eat. The boy provides the 'start-up' investment that Jesus multiplies! So, it is relationships that advance the mission of the Kingdom. Keep in mind that Andrew was also the one who first brought Philip to Jesus back in John 1:43, "The next day he decided to go to Galilee, and he found Philip (and introduced Philip to Jesus)." So, Andrew and Philip's interpersonal gifts at networking (good at bringing people in and keeping them together) and community-building remind us that the Kingdom of God is more about relationships than ever about revenue. The 'number' that is important to Jesus is the 'one' person standing in front of him. Another revelation of just how 'personal' a Savior we have with Jesus! Peace, Fr Brian


Grandparents' Prayer to Saint Anne


