

LATE JANUARY

Fresh, frosty and fragrant in the garden this morning! We finally have a snow that is actually measurable...an inch or two...we so need the moisture. Watching the news of the terrible fires in California in December, I worried about our dry conditions here and decided to check my own back yard which is full of scrub oaks. Boy, was I surprised to find myself ankle deep in leaves and dead branches (a fire waiting to happen).

But what a lovely and natural mulch it was! There was a lot of green growth under it as it had kept the soil warm and moist. This is a good example of why our rose society recommends that you wait on mulching your roses until after Thanksgiving or even New

Years. This gives the soil a chance to freeze. The purpose of mulch is to keep your roses COLD, not warm. It helps protect them from the temperature fluctuations we so often get on our many mild and sunny winter days.

Also, check your rose garden soil every month, as it has likely dried out. I watered for an hour yesterday when it was sunny and warm. Most of the roses are frozen in under their leafy mulch, but around the edges, the grass, shrubs, etc was all thawed and dry.

How to check? When you can (every month!) trowel down 4 inches and give the soil a squeeze. If it balls up and then breaks up easily it is good! If it doesn't ball up then it is dry. If it balls up and doesn't easily break apart, then it is too wet.

When to water? When the soil is not frozen. Water early enough to give the water time to soak in. You don't want it to collect around the base of the canes and freeze...that can damage the canes.

It's tricky, I know, but as sunny and mild as the weather here on the front range can be, you will find many opportunities to not only water but enjoy your garden. Check your mulch, that the wind

hasn't blown it away or a heavy snow flattened it. Sit in the sun and enjoy a rosy book, sketch up a new rose bed or just test your memory by jotting down the location of each rose. Its a good time to sharpen and oil your tools, plan a new color scheme of companion plants or locate a spot for bird and bee houses. And any time your soil is workable...you can dig!

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A Rose with a Story

Mme. Isaac Pereire

Bourbon rose, introduced 1881, 8.4

Sometimes, a rose's name does double duty — especially when the woman it commemorates has a famous husband. Fanny Pereire (1825-1910) was clearly proud of her marriage to Isaac Pereire, one of nineteenth century France's most successful financiers. Rather than asserting her independence the year after he died, she honored him, and herself as well, by paying the nurserymen Jules and Charles Margottin to introduce this rose as "Mme. Isaac Pereire".

Or perhaps Fanny simply wanted to differentiate her maiden and married names. You see, Isaac was the brother of her father, Emile Pereire. Today, such a marriage would raise eyebrows. But in the speculative, super competitive heyday of France's Second Empire, inseparable brothers Emile and Isaac apparently liked to keep it all in the family.

Although the Pereires worked for the Rothshilds early in their careers, animosities developed between the two families after the Pereires built their own railroad, the Paris-Saint-Germain line. Major contributors to the modernization of France, they also developed hotels and other opulent buildings in Paris's seventeenth arrondissement; built the first French steamship company to offer regular service to New York; and

It's said that the Pereire-Rothshild tensions ran so

created a seaside resort at

deep that the stationmaster at Gretz-Armainvilliers, where both families had country estates, booked train times so that the business magnates didn't cross paths.

For all of their high style, the Pereires didn't live in a glamorous bubble. They helped lead the Saint-Simonian movement, which supported the rights of laborers. Isaac, who was awarded the Legion of Honor for his philanthropy, promoted his ideas through his own daily newspaper, La Liberté; he also established a generous prize for writing on social economics.

Isaac Pereire, sumptuously attired in silk, with her silver hair loosely atop her head, appears to be a good-natured grandmotherly sort. Her namesake rose, in contrast, suggests

> her family's audacious nature. Its powerful scent, cherished as one of the most fragrant among Old Roses, comes at you with all the subtlety of, appropriately enough, an oncoming train.

Mister Lincoln

Abraham Lincoln said, "We can complain because rose bushes have thorns, or rejoice because thorny bushes have roses." Mister Lincoln, the hybrid tea rose, gives us a reason to rejoice that thorny bushes have roses.

Mister Lincoln has dark red blooms that have enough fragrance to knock your socks off. One bloom can fill an entire room with its heady aroma. Each large bloom has 35 to 40 petals. The bloom form varies from high-centered exhibition form to a cupped bloom. The leathery foliage is dark green with a matte finish.

Mister Lincoln was bred by Swim & Weeks in 1964 and commercially introduced by Conrad-Pyle (Star Roses) in 1965. It has remained popular to this day.

This vigorous plant likes to grow tall with an upright form. It can be susceptible to black spot, mildew and occasionally rust, but we don't have much of that here in Southern California.

Mister Lincoln is a splendid addition to any rose garden. Giving a Mister Lincoln rosebush to a sweetheart is a perfect way to say I love you . It will keep on giving.

- 1) The roses our local nurseries bring in to sell are roses that will survive the growing conditions here in Colorado Springs, we are zone 4 to 5.
- 2) Roses are already potted up, growing and ready to go into the ground so they take off and the plants are healthy giving us plenty of rose blooms through out summer.
- 3) Most of our local nurseries give you a guarantee on the plants, 30 days or more when planted as instructed.
- 4) Have a person with experience and knowledge of companion plants for roses.



FEBRUARY: WATER AND PLAN YOUR GARDEN

- Check your mulches to be sure the winter winds have not blown them away, and replace as necessary.
- Check your soil at least once a month by digging down a few inches to see what's happening! If it is dry, water by hand or by sprinklers. Water only when the soil is thawed and can allow the water to penetrate before refreezing in evening. Water pooling and freezing around the canes can damage them.
- Winter is a good time to check your soil's pH at the root level. An ideal pH is from 6.0 to 7.5.
- This is great time to plan for Spring! When soil is workable you could start digging a new rose bed or relocating a bush. This will give you a jump on spring duties. Remember that roses need at least 6 hours of sunshine a day.
- Enjoy the gardening catalogs that have been coming in your mail! Pick out some new varieties and order soon while they are still in stock. Bare-root roses can be planted in March when the soil is workable. Wait for the warm days of late May and June to plant potted & leafed roses, to avoid damage from a late spring frost.
