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The Apostolic Faith Report

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BY LAWS OF THE APOSTOLIC FAITH BIBLE COLLEGE, INC. Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another. adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- Creation and Formation
- Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- Washing of feet
- Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- Destruction of the wicked
- Conditional Immortality
- Rapture of the Man Child Class
- * Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if the are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.


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Birth Announcements


RyLee ReNae Buschman

Crosses Homecoming







An Ass in the Crib

Indeed, let us grieve and lament for those who died on Sept. 11, 2001, Remember the families with vacancies now in them and let us be troubled at the thought; the reality

that the United States of America is now in a 'war against terror.' Forces from 'outside' are threatening, not just people, but the 'sense of security' that so many Americans have come to enjoy (and take for granted?) The effects of the attack on 9/11 were both negative and positive. It's refreshing to see such a surge in patriotism; to see an increase in the flying of the US flag; the stirring of the human spirit at the hearing of the National Anthem sang with enthusiasm; to see the acts of kindness between strangers.

Yet I'm much afraid that much of this 'revival' of good deeds and 'God' talk will be short lived. There are many singing 'God Bless America' when He already has (I wonder how close He is to cease shedding His grace on us?) Have we considered the thought that perhaps what has happened in New York and at the Pentagon was a small glimpse of the infallibility of man, the power of God, and of judgment that could be? Do we as a people of a nation that has been privileged to advance in probably every area of life, that dare to think that we can continue to disobey God's commandments and still be secure? What hypocrisy we show! What shame we should feel! If we grieve at anything, let it be for the stupendous arrogance and hypocrisy of those people of the world that say 'pray for the victims of New York and for America,' and yet care not for the 11.2 million babies killed every year (about 4000 a day!); at those among us who remain silent of speaking about Jesus Christ as the only Way, the only Truth, and the only Life because were afraid of offending of someone that has come from another county or holds a different 'religious' view than us; at those accepting the practice of homosexuality in the name of 'tolerance' and 'unity,' and be sorrowed for the hundreds of other ailments that plague this nation.

'Pray for America' (which seems, for some, not all, to be a popular phrase at the moment), but pray for America to what? For several days after the WTC attacks, much focus of the prayers were (understandably) for the safety and the finding of lost people amid the chaos and ruin (and also for those doing the searching.) But as the days passed and it seemed hope was gone that any more would be found, what were the prayers to be for? Maybe we are to pray for America to be strong in its national resolve to remain united as others are trying to tear us apart. Maybe it's for God to keep anyone from bothering our physical safety that we can continue living as we please. Rather, shouldn't we pray for America to have a genuine experience of repentance; to have a very evident show of remorse and revival from her wickedness? Shouldn't we pray that we really could find the lost amid the chaos and rubble?

It is a sobering thought to realize that when God speaks of humbling oneself and a turning from wicked ways, He is speaking to those 'who are called by (his) name;' those who profess to be among those he calls 'my people.' II Chronicles 7:14. Consider these interesting verses in Exodus 19:5,6 "Now therefore, if ye will obey my voice indeed, and keep my covenant, then ye shall be a peculiar treasure unto me above all people: . . . And ye shall be unto me a kingdom of priests, and an holy nation..." Also 1 Peter 2:9 But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light:

However, looking at the condition of things today in our lives and The Church, are we really living like a 'holy nation' showing forth the praises of the Lord God? How far are we from where we need to be? Shortly after the disasters of September 2001, I felt 'drawn to the first chapter of Isaiah. Here is what the Word of God says:

2 Hear, 0 heavens, and give ear, 0 earth: for the LORD hath spoken, I have nourished and brought up children, and they have rebelled against me.

The Lord says He has nourished (which means advanced or promoted) and brought up (meaning to hold up) children. Their response? Rebellion (which is quarreling and apostasy.) Comparing this to 'we, the people,' has

not God advanced; promoted His Body above all the of the world? Deuteronomy 26:19; 28:1. How many of us have not rebelled or quarreled with God? How many have not broken away from the Truth and have been so quickly moved to another Gospel?

3 The ox knoweth his owner, and the ass his masters crib: but Israel doth not know, my people doth not consider.

Consider the ox and the ass. Dumb animals. Yet they are said to be more considerate than the children God was raising in the wilderness (and of those He still is raising today?) They know who provides for them and where they are to be, but His people does not consider. Have there been times(are there now?) that I have not considered that it has been God that has 'nourished me;' that it is God who sets up one and pulls down another (Psalms 75:6,7)? Is it (it is) time to reflect on how I live my life and the importance I put upon things? As a nation, it does indeed seem that we have forgotten to give proper reverence to the One who has advanced and promoted us to such degree.

4 Ah sinful nation, a people laden with iniquity, a seed of evildoers, children that are corrupters: they have forsaken the LORD, they have provoked the Holy One of Israel unto anger, they are gone away backward.

A sinful nation, a people laden (meaning 'heavy or abounding with iniquity), a seed (the posterity) of evildoers -an implication that they are the outcome of past wickedness; descendants of those who have little by little failed to acknowledge the Son of God, Jesus Christ. They are also, in turn, corrupters of them that would come after them. What kind of 'seed' are we as Christians planting today? What do we have to give to the future generation? Irreverence? Pride in ourselves? Are these the things that we want to pass on to our coming children?

He says they have forgotten Him; they have relinquished their privileges of the Deliverer and are now responsible for provoking the Holy One to Anger. Will we also forsake Him; will we give up the graciousness that has held you for so long? We will be a provocation to the Lord when 'we go away backward!'

5 Why should ye be stricken any more? ye will revolt more and more: the whole head is sick, and the whole heart faint.

The question to the people was why should they be stricken (meaning to be beaten or punished) when they didn't have to be? The question today is will we continue to do the things that result in pain to you and grievance to Him? Why do you persist in rebellion? The outcome can only be is sickness (meaning weak or afflicted) of the entirety of the body and faint hearted (meaning troubled or infirmity.)

6 From the sole of the foot even unto the head there is no soundness in it, but wounds, and bruises, and putrifying sores, they have not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment.

From the bottom to the top there is no soundness (or wholesomeness, stability) in the nation heavy with sin. Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a reproach to ANY nation. There are only wounds (split open places), bruises (meaning black and blues marks; from the affect of a blow; from being hit or running into things), and putrifying (fresh, dripping moist) sores. Can we get a picture here of the awfulness caused by sin and rebellion? What has been done toward the 'curing' of these afflictions? Nothing! The split open places haven't been closed, but have been left open; exposed to get infected by the elements of the world. Nor have they been bandaged or mollified (made tender) with ointment. Consider Revelation 3:18.

7 Your country is desolate, your cities are burned with/ire: your land, strangers devour it in your presence, and it is desolate, as overthrown by strangers.

The desolation (wasted, ruined) of the country is the result of the burning of the cities (here the word 'burning' means 'hate!') and the scorning by strangers; those from 'outside' that came in, taking advantage of instead of contributing to. The 'aliens' have used the land and cities for their own indulgence. Consider Proverbs 24:30-32. Have we neglected to take care of what God has given us, physically and spiritually? Is our experience with the Lord something we can be proud of (the right kind of pride)? Is it something that we can show to the rest of the world without being embarrassed? We are to let our good works shine before men. Why? That they may see them and glorify Father God.

8 And the daughter of Zion is left as a cottage in a vineyard, as a lodge in a garden of cucumbers, as a besieged city.

The figurative language of the previous verses is now translated into grim realities, describing the devastation of the land. Jerusalem the city itself that had meant so much to the nation; to the people of Israel, had been dear to God as a daughter (as the apple of his eye, the perfection of beauty! Lamentations 2:15,18) But, even in the context of the situation, this verse may be somewhat positive after all!

The word 'left' here means 'to remain, to excel, leave (a remnant), to preserve.' We may think of 'being left' as the same thing as 'being neglected,' and although the physical city of Jerusalem had been besieged (and would be again), it was far from losing it's 'place' in the hearts of the Jewish people. This verse is saying that ever under the judgment of God, He was not making a 'full end' of the nation of Israel. Jerusalem was 'left,' but nevertheless, Jerusalem still was (and is!) The city still (for the time being) stood, preserved, and left as a remnant. The nation of Israel today may not be what God intended it to be (such as are the effects of sin in anyone's life), but she STILL IS as a memorial to God's keeping power and sovereignty; a guiding pillar to the thousands of 'wandering' people; the redeemed of the Lord! She may have been assaulted; their freedom threatened and taken, but nothing was amiss in the people's love for their 'promised land.' Remember how they hung their harps on the willows when they thought about where they had come from and where they now were; weeping for what they had lost?

I often wonder why we as Christians, that 'live in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, don't stop and weep for not being where we need to be; at not having all of our 'inheritance' now (what God has for us in this life)? Do we not lose much of what God has for us because of our stubbornness? But even when the enemy lays siege to us, our outward man perish and material things are taken away, God help us to know we can still be left'; preserved as a monumental pillar to the fact that if God is for us, who can be against us and prevail? Wouldn't it be great if our faithfulness to God could stand as a shouting declaration against those that would bring us bring us down, 'Look! I am still here. No weapon formed against me shall prosper, but I shall prosper of what God said in Joshua chapter 1!'

These remain concerning Zion's daughter. It was said to be '...as a cottage in the vineyard.' it is true that cottages were only temporary shelters, yet they were there for a purpose: to provide a place for those put in charge of watching the vineyard, tending to it's needs, and harvesting it when the time was right, What lessons could be drawn from this! But as it was only temporary, not meant to last, so Jerusalem seemed to be left amidst the surrounding desolation as a temporary abode, soon to be destroyed.

The second description is '...as a lodge...' (meaning a temporary resting place; to stop over night, to endure.) An exciting thought: Jerusalem, ('shalom' which itself means' to be at peace or make amends) is described as a place or rest, but only for short time. Even though all things about the city were in desolation, like the withered vines of a cucumber garden around the watchman's hut; the city was 'safe,' standing among the ruins caused by the enemy.

"The field of cucumbers is still a feature of oriental landscapes, ... all supplied with a hut, where the watchman keeps guard over the tempting vegetable, none of which would reach its lawful owner but for this precaution. As soon as the last of the cucumbers is gathered, the hut is "left," a reminder of past plenty and prosperity." (The New Unger's Bible Dictionary. 1988.).

"...as a besieged city." Besieged, instead of meaning to attack or come against, here means to guard, protect, maintain. This would again seem to say that although the rest of the country round about was in ruins, yet Jerusalem, the city, resembling a temporary lodge in the garden, was guarded and protected. Psalms 121: 4,7!

People may wonder why the turmoil within the small state of Israel? The bottom line reason isn't any different that it has been for thousands of years the world--people are wanting to have the land they feel belongs to them and will defend what they already have against those that would try to take it away. Isn't this the cause for the Christian's 'wrestling?' to gain ground which rightfully belongs to us in Christ, and to defend what we already have (the truth of the Gospel?)

God, help me to be like the ass in the crib, knowing whom my Master is and where I am supposed to be! I might feel 'left' sometimes, 0 Lord, but help me to remember I'm not forgotten.
