2020 Assessments Due in January

The assessment amount for 2020 is \$630 (same as last year) which can be paid anytime between now and January 31. Payments received after January 31 will incur a 10% late fee of \$63. We urge everyone to use the new homeowner portal to make payments...it's quick and easy.

Your billing statement directs you to the *Document Library* page on our website. The website was just revamped and this page has moved. Click on *Financial Info* to see the different ways to pay, including the old online payment system and the new portal.

Activate Your Homeowner Portal

The new homeowner portal allows you to make online payments, view your balance, make maintenance requests and more. If you have any problems, please contact admin2@lakewoodforestfund.com.

Steps to Activate:

- 1. Go to https://lakewoodforestfund.appfolio.com/connect
- 2. Enter your email address.
- 3. Click Sign up.
- 4. Check your email for the activation email. You will need to confirm your email address and set a password for your portal.
- 5.Once you log in to your portal, click **Account Profile**. In the **Contact Preferences** block, click **Enable Online Documents**. Next, click **"I consent to receiving documents electronically,"** then click **Save**.

NOTE: You will see sections requesting information on insurance and vehicles...you do **NOT** need to fill out these sections.

There is also an app (AppFolio Portal) for Apple and Android devices.



Why are "Little Free Libraries" prohibited on residential lots in Lakewood Forest?

The little book boxes that are popping up here and there as a way to share books with others are prohibited on residential lots in Lakewood Forest for the following reasons:

 Create a safety issue as they are a gathering area for children in the street and/or cause sight restrictions for vehicles Use the Harris County Precinct Four Constable office's *Vacation Watch Request* form to have a patrol drive by your home and keep an eye on things.

Bookmark it so you have it when you need it.

New Year's Eve Fireworks

Since we are in unincorporated areas of Harris County where fireworks are allowed by law (except in cases of burn bans), law enforcement has limited authority to stop fireworks use (and our CCRs are subordinate to Harris County law) but they are willing to speak with residents who continue the use of fireworks into the early morning hours. Please be respectful of your neighbors and limit fireworks usage to the night of December 31.

- Can be a potential obstruction to a fire hydrant
- In violation of respective CCRs in regards to improvements forward of the front building line
- In violation of respective CCR's in regards to signage allowed in Lakewood Forest
- Would set a precedence for the association in that the HOA would be required to approve all future improvements which are similar in manner to avoid selective enforcement (e.g., other individuals creating structures for swapping other items, not necessarily books). If the HOA set this precedence and had to approve every submission which is similar in nature, the original overall aesthetics, congruity, appearance and safety of the neighborhood would be affected

The Board does encourage residents to consider placing "little free libraries" within local community areas (such as a local park, YMCA, or Faulkey Gully Hike and Bike Trail). If anyone has an interest in doing so, please contact the Fund Office so that the Community Events Outreach Chair and Fund Staff may assist you with contacting the appropriate individuals to obtain approval to do so.

Garden Hints

January to-do list

- Add new mulch to protect plant roots during freezing temperatures, conserve soil moisture and discourage weeds.
- Prune crape myrtle trees,
- removing only limbs necessary to thin out trees and provide a stately structure. This provides additional energy for profuse blooming all summer. Topping is not necessary. To avoid topping, plant a variety that will grow only to the height proper for the growing area. Ask your nursery for available colors and growth patterns. When pruning, use sharp tools and cut at 45 degree angles, leaving no stubs. This promotes proper healing. Cuts at right angles produce deadwood.
- Prune woody trees, shrubs, and fruit trees.
- Cut back ornamental grasses to ensure that the new growth will be able to emerge unhindered by old foliage. You will get a nice flush of growth in the spring.
- Winter-flowering plants need a feeding with a balanced fertilizer to keep blooming in these cold months.

- Prune back plants with freeze-damaged vegetation late in the month of January.
- Tree leaves can remain in flower beds for temporary insulation of plants.
- In the Lawn
- Grass mowing is usually not necessary this month. A light covering of leaves can protect grass from cold weather, but do not allow to collect heavily and kill the grass below.
- Aeration of the lawn improves air circulation, helps break down any buildup of thatch and other organic material, improves moisture distribution and helps sunlight reach plant roots.
- In the Garden
- Continue seeding lettuce, carrots, beets, cabbage, broccoli, peas, onion & radish.
- Keep garden fed with MicroLife Ultimate.
- Cover crops if we are going to have icy weather.
- Make sure to water if we are going to freeze to insulate root systems.
- Start planning for potatoes in February.
