
Richmond Council Navy League is excited to announce the Guest Speaker at our Admiral Gravely Spring Luncheon, Navy League member, CAPT John Paul Jones, USN (Ret.).

John Paul Jones retired in 2014 from the University of Richmond, where for more than thirty years he taught administrative, constitutional, maritime, and military law.

After graduating from Marquette University in 1969, he earned his wings as a Naval Flight Officer and then, from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk, flew 150 combat missions over Vietnam before coming ashore to teach fighter pilots to fly the Tomcat at Naval Air Station Miramar. He is twice a graduate of TOPGUN and was designated a Tactical Action Officer.

When he left active duty in 1976, he went back to school for a pair of law degrees and then served as a chambers clerk in the United States Court of Claims. He joined the law faculty at the University of Richmond in 1982.

CAPTAIN JOHN PAUL JONES, USN (Ret.)

While teaching at U of R, he moonlighted as a visiting scholar at the CIA, edited the book, Dr. Mudd and the Lincoln Assassination, and wrote extensively for law journals and legal encyclopedias. For five years, he edited the Journal of Maritime Law and Commerce. After the fall of the Iron Curtain. he was recruited by the American Bar Association and USAID (U.S. Agency for International Developers) to assist several East European states with constitutional reforms.

Meanwhile, in the Naval Reserve, he served in Mid-Atlantic Navy and NATO intelligence commands and led the Naval Investigative Service Reserve Unit in Norfolk before retiring in 1989 with the rank of Captain.

THE NAVY BEHIND THE NAVY



With the Super Bowl set for Sunday, February 11th, I'll ask you to tolerate a football analogy. The star players – Mahomes, Purdy, Kelce, McCaffrey, etc. – will be the focus of cameras and commentary; the offensive linemen will go relatively unnoticed. Yet, the stars wouldn't be stars without them.

The Military Sealift Command (MSC) was established on July 9, 1949 and was originally the Military Sea Transportation Service. In 1970, it was renamed the Military Sealift Command. This year, 2024, is MSC's 75th anniversary.

The MSC is the Navy's offensive line. They refuel ships at sea, move necessary cargo to strategic positions, perform special operations and research to support Naval missions. They recover wreckage of planes and watercraft, tow vessels great distances, and even provide medical care in foreign countries.

When the USS GRAVELY shoots down two enemy missiles, that makes headlines. When the USS CARTER HALL recovered the Chinese spy balloon, that was on the national TV news. When the USNS SEAY (T-AKR-302, delivered operationally necessary cargo to Saudi Arabia in 2022 to support Exercise Native Fury, we never knew it. There is a Navy behind our combatant Navy that we should honor, especially this year.

On February 11th, pay attention to the offensive linemen and then think about the anonymous 125 MSC ships that allow our superstars to be just that – **SUPERSTARS**.

POEMS ON DECK!

Once upon a midnight dreary
Standing watch with eyes quite bleary
Now upon us is a new year,
As I hear ring out cheer after cheer.
The Michael Murphy stands proudly moored
Starboard side Bravo 18, duty personnel aboard.
Presently stationed in Hawaii's paradise
The sacrifices at Pearl Harbor we recognize.*

Recently, our Navy's history department, the Naval History and Heritage Command (NHHC) revived a quaint ship-board tradition that flourished in the darkest hours of the Second World War. NHHC now invites ships to compete with original poems marking in their deck logs the arrival of the new year.

Ordinarily, a ship's deck log is no page turner. It is instead the official diary of a watch, that is, one of the standard segments in which a ship's day is divided, at sea or in port. It is kept by the Quartermaster of the Watch, a junior non-commissioned officer, and certified by the Officer of the Deck, the watch team's leader (often, but not always, a commissioned officer). Specific entries in a deck log are required by a Navy regulation promulgated by the Chief of Naval Operations. The first entry of each watch period records where the ship is, what she is doing, and what larger group, like a flotilla or a convoy, she is part of, if any.

If the ship is underway, the log also records changes in her course and speed and the conditions of sea and sky through which she steams. The log's language is hardly English. A typical entry is rife with abbreviations, acronyms, and maritime jargon. Naturally, there is a standard form dictated Navy-wide. Today, a deck log may be generated manually, electronically, or even by voice recording, a la Star Trek's "Captain's Log. Star Date 4513.3." Bundled by the month, logs are shipped off to NHHC for preservation. The ship must save a local copy for a year. Eventually, all deck logs come to rest in the National Archives.

As important as deck logs are to naval operations, they are rarely page turners. Most entries are no more riveting than those in one's check register. Here is a sample:

... 8:00 p.m. to Midnight:- Steaming as before following in column astern of *QUEEN ELIZABETH* on course 246 (pgc) standard speed 12 kts. At 9:14 sighted Copensay Light 2 pts on stbd. Bow. At 9:22 increased standard speed to 14 kts. On signal. At 9:30 increased standard speed to 16 kts. At 9:47 Copensay Light broad on stbd. Bow bearing 291 (pgc). At 10:47 c.c. to 268 (pgc) and headed for skerries. At 11:40 opened to double distance. At 11:50 entered Pentland Skerries.10 Av. St. 252. Av. Revs. 88.25.**

But, once a year, every ship's company has an invitation to wax poetic. Since 2021, NHHC has held a contest to attract log entries that depart from the standard form in celebration of a new year with verse portraying the experience of shipboard life. First, Second, and Third Place entries are recognized and published by NHHC at its website. The First-Place winner is awarded a suitably engraved piece of copper plate from the hull of the frigate USS Constitution, the Navy's oldest vessel still in service. This year, one of the entries is from our own Carter Hall:

Continued the watch streaming into 2024, Entered the Med excited for what's in store. We've done it all, seen it all. We are the pirates of the goo. Watch out dhow's we're coming for you! Just left 5th Fleet, not as much sunshine NR1 and NR4 SSDG's, Starboard Steering Gear Are Running.

> We shot down the Houthi drones, Houthi rednecks aren't that cunning. Finally reunited with the Mesa Verde, Our Sister,

Showing us around the Aegean,
Oh how we missed her.
Ocean steaming, Bataan is still the Queen B,
We are out here with the Greeks and the Sullivans DDG.

Modified Zebra is set throughout the ship, LT Halliday is the OOD of this mighty warship. CO is in his crib,

Let's wake him up to start the new year!
Hoist the Jolly Roger,
Our captain should ye fear
He fiercely led us 329.3 nautical miles yesterday,
And 46753.8 nautical miles throughout 2023.
We are the bad ass Carter Hall,
Sailors and pirates ... we really be all.***

USS NORMANDY was operating in the East Mediterranean Sea, as a part of Carrier Strike Group TWELVE with USS GERALD R. FORD (CVN-78), USS DELBERT D. BLACK (DDG-119), USS THOMAS HUDNER (DDG-116), USS BULKELEY (DDG-84), USS MCFAUL (DDG-74), USS THE SULLIVANS (DDG-68) and briefly the Greek Frigate HS Psara (F-454). NORMANDY's mission continues to be to promote stability and regional security through its presence.

The GERALD R. FORD CARRIER STRIKE GROUP executed three Air Defense Exercises to maintain and improve combat interoperability. As daily operations continue, Sailors operate in a heightened state of readiness, while using frequent Morale, Welfare, and Recreation events onboard to decompress when time allows. Sailors were able to conclude December with numerous themed events to include multiple MWR activities for two visits to Piraeus, Greece, "Secret Santa"/White Elephant gift exchanges, and dropping NORMANDY's very own Ball on New Year's Eve.

NORMANDY welcomed its new Executive Officer, CDR Adam Samson, a native from Woodbine, Georgia whose career spans across multiple deployments to both 6th fleet and 5th fleet. His impressive history of numerous joint and combined operations is supplemented by training upcoming officers at both Basic Division Officer's Course (BDOC) and Surface Warfare Officer's Course (SWOS), serving as Deputy Executive Assistant to Commander Task Force 80, and serving as a Flag Aide to the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations.

Numerous sailors, including LTJG Holloman, FCC Hanson, and RP2 Caton, have been awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal for their efforts thus far on deployment with MMC Squires earning the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal. With their continued efforts, NORMANDY continues to, professionally and smartly, execute the Nation's tasking.

On January 30, **USS GRAVELY** shot down an anti-ship cruise missile fired by Houthi rebels. **GRAVELY** shot down the missile using its Close-In Weapon System (CIWS) after it came within a mile of the destroyer. The incident appears to be the closest a Houthi weapon has come to a U.S. warship since the Navy began intercepting the military group's drones and missiles on October 19.




