Evolution of the Automobile - Part 3

In my last article, I stated that the power and competitiveness of the '60s and '70s muscle cars had been overshadowed by many 21st-century offerings. This was really driven home by a statement in one of my newest enthusiast magazines, in which the writer referred to a 300-horsepower crate engine as "anemic." You may be tempted to say that doesn't affect you, but is it really so? We have already seen that folks tend to associate with the cars of their era. The muscle cars of the '60s and early '70s were more recently given a pass by ever more-intrusive regulation imposed by the government. Vehicles from the mid-'70s until well into the '90s struggled to equal the power of even average earlier muscle, which created a situation in which many flocked to the earlier cars for several decades. These earlier cars were simpler to repair or to alter, leading to huge growth of aftermarket suppliers with both restoration and modification parts. The impact was significant enough that even the manufacturers joined in, supplying everything from body parts to complete engines and transmissions. The net effect was to keep aging vehicles alive much longer and in much greater numbers than would probably have happened otherwise. Even if muscle is not your interest, it has been the popularity of these cars that has driven market forces to keep older cars alive.

Time marches ever onward, though, and these oft-revered cars are now approaching 50 years old, or even more. I have seen many 'normal' replacement parts being discontinued from the shelves of my local stores as the population of cars using these parts has declined. Furthermore, many of the cars that have survived lead a storied life these days, with a consequent much lower demand for replacement carburetors, distributors, water pumps and exhaust systems. It is becoming economically unfeasible for the Pep Boys and NAPAs of the world to continue to stock this stuff. Another factor is that there has been a tremendous explosion in the sheer numbers of vehicle brands and models, creating a need for parts shelf space for them. During an extended period, the manufacturers were constantly dealing with new, stricter regulations related to fuel mileage and emissions. This all occurred during several economic downturns, leading to drastically reduced sales of new vehicles for many years. Because of this, existing engines and transmissions were modified year after year to meet the new rules. Currently, there is still plenty of economic turmoil, but the regulations keep getting stricter. Suddenly, we are seeing that the old engines that served faithfully for so many years have been replaced by totally new designs. This also applies to automatic transmissions, while standard transmissions in cars have virtually become a thing of the past. The down side is that support for the older drivetrains will decline even more rapidly. The positive side is that the new designs are responsible for massive increases in performance from today's vehicles. There is, in reality, no comparison between the two. Probably the most significant engine changes are from computer controls, fuel injection, innovative camshaft designs, especially variable valve timing, and turbocharging.

Let's look at a couple of other factors. First, Cash for Clunkers removed many '80s and '90s vehicles from the road. Of course, earlier models were also crushed, but the program increased the void between the up-to-about 1974 and current offerings. The effect of this was to further uphold the popularity of the older cars, despite the fact that a large part of the group that was crushed didn't enjoy much favor anyway. Second, it takes a lot of money to buy, insure, and support any vehicle, and this is especially true for any performance-oriented model, new or used. There seems to have been a meteoric rise in costs, though we must also consider the general decline in the value of the dollar over the past 50 or 60 years.

So here we are at the crossroads of popularity, availability, and cost. There are many considerations that we will need to review, then draw our own conclusions. And we will see there are striking pluses and minuses on both sides. Of course, our goal is to try to determine where the market and the hobby will go.

Let's start with a look at the aforementioned age groups. There is one train of thought that says the car hobby consists almost completely of aging, graying old folks, and that the younger crowd does not and will not display the same affection for cars that so many of us have felt. Looking around at many car events, you can certainly support this argument. Others take a more optimistic approach. We will look at both of these, starting with current owners of 'collector' cars.

Let's assume an average age of twenty years for a person to become interested in automobiles and their associated activities. This can include just owning and driving a vehicle, or it can extend into restoring, showing, racing, or just collecting cars and trucks. Let's also assume that many become interested in vehicles that are current when they reach this age. These are the new cars and trucks that are cruising the streets when our mythical person turns twenty years old. If we start with the early 1940s, the pre-World War II period, our 20-year old would now be at least 95 years old. In my opinion, this is the reason so many pre-war vehicles that have survived are listed for sale. Look through many magazines that advertise auctions, and you will find a list of estate sales of vehicles and parts for the dearly-departed owner, or at best, the person who has become too old or too infirm to continue in the hobby. Move to 1960 and you still see that

lovers of tri-five Chevys and two-seater Thunderbirds are getting close to 75, if their love affair with these cars started when they were 20 years old. Even at a cut-off date of 1975, our guy who associates with new cars of that era is still approaching 60 years old. This is why we see so many old folks in the car hobby. They have been involved for a long time!

Does this mean everyone who loves a '53 Studebaker or a '57 Chrysler 300 or a '69 Chevelle Super Sport is broken down with old age? Not at all, but the whole concept of guys and gals loving what was new when they became interested certainly supports this argument.

Let's look briefly at an opposing view. I have attended several huge car-related gatherings this year, including a couple of days of the Hot Rod Magazine Power Tour, Chryslers at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, and the National Street Rod Association Nationals in Louisville, Kentucky. The Power Tour claimed to have had about 5,800 participants and 100,000 spectators in its 7-city week-long event. Chryslers at Carlisle is their largest show of the summer, and sported nearly 4,000 vehicles over a Thursday - Saturday July weekend. And in Louisville, there were 10,257 registered cars for their 4-day weekend. Were all the participants broken down with old age? Of course not! There was something for everyone at each of these, and this is just a sampling of the thousands of car shows and cruise-ins that were held across the United States this summer.

Let's take a more-detailed look at some of the opportunities and challenges facing a would-be car enthusiast in the next installment.




OLD Meets NEW at AIAS '16 A FUN-FILLED Week at the Atlanta Auto Show
