All new residents and tenants must show proof of age. See Cheryl at the office Tuesday and Thursday morning.

Trash Talk: For the most part residents have been following the guidelines and rules. We thank you. There are still a few trash habits that need to be changed. **Do not put garden waste** (branches, grass clippings, etc.) or carpet, in the dumpster. The dumpster is emptied three times per week (Monday, Wednesday, Friday). If the dumpster is full take your trash home until it is emptied. The dumpster is for Palm Tree Drive and Orange Drive residents only. These residents are charged for dumpster use.

TRASH PROCEDURES

(reprinted in each newsletter as a reminder, and for new people)

HOUSEHOLD TRASH

EAST SIDE DUMPSTER: -For residents of Orange Drive and Palm Tree Drive ONLY, who are being charged a fee by the City for this service:



All garbage placed inside the dumpster must be in sealed or tied garbage bags of any size. Nothing is to be placed outside the bin; the City will not pick up anything outside the bin. Pick up days are MONDAY and FRIDAY throughout the year.

There will be a third pick up added on WEDNESDAY during January, February, and March. The Citv has provided the following rules regarding <u>what is **NOT ALLOWED** in the bin:</u>

WEST SIDE PICKUP: Thursdays – The trash must be placed in the brown Waste Management Bags which can be purchased by calling 800-383-0519 and paying online or arranging to leave a check (telephone number found on the first page of your directory). The bags will be delivered to your home. **West Side households do NOT use the dumpster.**

COMMON AREA TRASH and SWIMMING POOL COVERING DUTY

These duties are provided by resident volunteers. The signup sheet is in the Rec. Hall, as is a copy of these instructions. If you are able and have not already done so, please consider taking a week.

Each week starts on a Thursday and includes putting out the trash. By 5:30 PM Thursday evening, the trash should be emptied from the hall, including both bathrooms, the barn, and the Pool Room; and along with the trash from the bins behind the office building, placed on the right side of the curb in front of the office building. Only six bags of trash can be placed out at one time. Clean 45-gallon garbage bags need to be put into the emptied garbage cans in the bin. Bags are kept in the narrow cupboard by the kitchen trashcan. None of this trash is to be placed in the dumpster.

During your week you are also responsible for uncovering and covering the pool. Remember two people must do this and if the outside temperature is below 70, the pool is NOT to be uncovered.

There are no set times to uncover the pool, so if you wish to use it, you are welcome to take the cover off if it has not been done, provided the temperature is 70 or above and there are two of you.

REMINDERS: - To all who use suntan lotion while on the lounge chairs – please cover the chair with a towel or pad as the oils and lotions deteriorate the vinyl. Be sure to shower before using the pool, and please do not use soap or shampoo in the shower; as the shower drain is not going to a septic tank.

The use of the pool is restricted to owners, their tenants, their overnight guests, or contract purchasers who reside on the property. - no exceptions, please. (as per Article II, Section 2.2, Covenants and Bylaws)


SVV MEN'S & LADIES' GOLF

Who – pairs or singles of all abilities and gender;




Where – Stuart Place Golf Course, followed by an awards ceremony at SVV Rec. Hall with cash bar, beverages, snacks;



RECIPES

As indicated last month, this is a new addition to our newsletter. When we have a standout recipe that everyone has enjoyed at a dinner or an event, we will try to publish the recipe.

The following recipes were favourites 2 years in a row at the Hawaiian Potluck Dinner. Hawaiian Fried Rice comes from Shirley Downey, and the Buffalo Chicken Dip comes from Linda Guyer.

If you have a request for a recipe to be published, let Pam Buhr or Diane Coulter know. Shirley's Hawaiian Fried Rice

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 cup cooked ham, cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1/2 small white onion, diced
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded and diced
- 3 cloves garlic
- 2 teaspoon freshly grated ginger
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup pineapple chunks, drained
- 3 cups cooked rice
- 1 tablespoons sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons thinly sliced green onion



Heat a large skillet (or wok) over medium-high heat. Add the vegetable oil to the skillet. Add ham, onion, and bell pepper to the skillet. Cook for3-4 minutes or until the onions are soft and the meat is browned. Add garlic and ginger, cook for 1 minute stirring constantly to prevent burning. Push the ham and veggies to one side. Add the eggs to the skillet. Stir to quickly scramble the eggs. Cook for 3 minutes or until the eggs are almost done. Stir everything together.

Add the pineapple and cooked rice to the skillet, stir until evenly combined. Pour the sesame oil and soy sauce over the rice mixture. Stir to combine. Add 2/3 of the green onions and stir until combined. Transfer the fried rice to a serving bowl and top with more green onions.

Linda's Buffalo Chicken Dip

- 4 chicken breasts boiled
- 2-8oz blocks of cream cheese
- 1 jar of Marie's Blue Cheese Dressing from the refrigerated section
- 1/2 bottle of Buffalo Hot Wings Sauce (I use mild)
- 2 c shredded cheddar cheese (I use mild)

Shred chicken in a 9 x 13 dish. In a double boiler melt cream cheese and salad dressing until smooth. Add hot wing sauce and blend. Mix with the chicken. Top with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until the cheese is nicely melted.
