PAGE 2 A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ROBERT.....

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Being a student of history I often reflect back on the major events that have shaped us. Recently I have been reflecting upon the Civil War and the many broad themes that shaped that bloody period in American history, and while slavery, states rights, racism, and power were all involved in the reasons why war broke out I believe they were all secondary to the real reason behind it all, fear. In the north they feared that succession was a threat to the government's power, and in the south they feared the change that freeing the slaves would bring to their economy. This fear would manifest its self in anger, frustration, hate, and bitterness resulting in the deaths of nearly 650,000 people between the years 1861-1865. Since then there have been several more movements that have brought fundamental change to our society including the Industrial Revolution, Woman's Suffrage, Civil Rights movement, and currently the Black Lives Matter and Me Too movements are continuing to change the way we think and act as I write this. Every movement throughout history has affected the world in both positive and negative ways pushing us forward in often unexpected directions. Black Lives Matter and Me Too continue to grow and affect our society in various ways, what the end results of those movements are we have yet to know, but things are changing, and that can be scary.

The church in general is changing and this has caused its place in society to begin shifting. Once upon a time Churches were the center of local communities yet due to a variety of reasons we have seen local churches sidelined in many areas. Some of these reasons are beyond the control of local churches as the culture around them continues to change. Unfortunately, some of the reasons why this is happening is the fault of the churches themselves as they may have abused their power, were not welcoming to newcomers, or failed to progress in order to meet the needs of the communities around them. One of the main reasons is that we live in an increasingly more diverse population where people's beliefs are more and more varied. This can cause a lot of fear and anxiety amongst those who are living through these changes because not only does it affect the church but it also affects the local community as they grow or shrink depending upon what area one lives in.

As the world changes all around us, it is important to remember that God is with us in the midst of the change. Even though there may be some rather large bumps in the road God's presence continues to surround us. Even though there are many loud people out there spreading anger and division regarding the changes in our society, many more are out there calling for peace and reconciliation. A sign of hope that I see throughout our national church body, the ELCA, is that while in many churches the numbers may be shrinking, the level of faith is rising. This has resulted in many young people in this nation who may have drifted away from churches coming back, inspired by the level of faith they see turned into action. Since it is no longer socially dictated that individuals should go to church, those who do go are there of their own choosing and therefore share a much deeper faith in Christ's word than people did twenty years ago. There are many things in this world to be afraid of but remember God is in the midst of the change, all we have to do is listen to where God is leading us.




PEACE & GRACE

Friends,

Where do you find grace and peace in your life? As I start my time with you as Assistant to the Bishop for Generosity, the question of how we extend grace and peace to ourselves and those around

us is urgent. We as a country, state, congregations, and families are overwrought with anger and dissension over many



things; we are living with delayed grief we are still processing. Thinking about God's generosity and how it applies to us it can feel more like a to-do item rather than a gift, particularly when we are worried about keeping the lights on, water running, and staff bills paid.

However, in the middle of this, God provides grace and peace. When we rest in that peace and trust in the generosity of a God who provides for us, our world can be changed; we begin to see abundance where before we only noted scarcity.

One time this shift happened in my life was at the first congregation I was serving. My spouse had given up his job for us to move and I was earning less than I had previously in business and technology. I was worried about how we were going to get by. When I entered the church office that first week and found two lawn chairs rather than a reasonable space for parishioners to visit and no budget for improvements, my scarcity mindset kicked in. I was afraid and I was angry. I won-dered why God had abandoned me in this wilderness for which I had so longed. A few weeks later a parishioner came in. We sat and talked, him in a lawn chair and me at my desk. Shortly before he left, he slipped a check across my desk, and said, "Pastor, here's money for furniture for the office. No one should have to meet like this." In that moment, my heart melted as I was reminded the situation was in God's hands.

Over the next few years, we used that check – not only to buy comfortable and appropriate furniture for the office, but also to revolutionize the culture of generosity. By the end of my tenure, the congregation had moved from thinking they would not be able to qualify for a loan to do essential building repairs, to having raised almost the entire amount of money from a congregation with about 100 active members.

God changes things.

As we continue our work together in a time of liminality, remember God provides; even more importantly than money, God provides peace, kindness, and generosity. When we are open to that peace, it moves our eyes from the scarcity of this world to the abundance and generosity God provides.
