- 6. What are the three biggest mistakes I've made since last Rosh Hashanah?

ALWAYS GOOD TO KNOW AND REMEMBER!

The first theatre to be used solely for the showing of motion pictures was built by a Jew (Adolf Zukor).

The first full-length sound picture, The Jazz Singer was produced by the Jewish Samuel L. Goldwyn & Louis B. Mayer (MGM).

A Jew (Dr. Abraham Waksman) coined the term antibiotics.

A Polish Jew (Casimir Funk) who pioneered a new field of medical research gave us a word now common in our language - vitamins.

The first successful operation for appendicitis was performed by a Jewish surgeon (Dr. Simon Baruch)

The doctor (Dr. Abraham Jacobi) hailed as America's father of pediatrics was a Jew.

Until a Jewish doctor (Dr. Siccary) showed differently, Americans believed the tomato was poisonous.

Jewish Levi "Levi's" Strauss (inventor of jeans) is the largest clothing retailer in the world.

In 1909, four Jews were among the 60 multi-cultural signers of the Call to the National Action, which resulted in the creation of the NAACP.

A Jew (Emile Berliner) is the man who developed the modern-day phonograph. While Thomas Edison was working out a type of phonograph that used a cylinder as a record, Berliner invented a machine that would play a disc. The machine he patented was called the gramophone, and the famous RCA trademark is a picture of a dog listening to "his master's voice" on Berliner's device. The gramaphone was superior to Edison's machine. In short, Emile Berliner made possible the modern record industry. His company was eventually absorbed by the Victor Talking

Machine Company, now known as RCA.

Jewish Louis B. Mayer (MGM) created the idea for the Oscar.

European Jews are the founding fathers of all the Hollywood Studios.

Jews comprise a mere 1/4 of 1% (13 million) of the population (6 billion).

99% of the world is non Jewish.

Three of greatest & most influential thinkers dominating the 20th century were Jewish - Einstein, Freud, Marx.

The most popular selling Christmas song ("White Christmas") was written by a Jew (Irving Berlin)

Of the 660 Nobel prizes from 1901-1990, 160 have been won by Jews. In the end, Jews win more Nobel prizes than any other ethnicity. They win 40 times more than should be expected of them, based upon their small population numbers.

A Jew (Dr. Jonas Salk) is the creator of the first Polio Vaccine.

Jews also created the first department stores of the 19th century: The Altmans, Gimbels, Kaufmanns, Lazaruses, Magnins, Mays, Strausses became leaders of major department stores. Julius Rosenwald revolutionized the way Americans purchased goods by improving Sears Roebuck's mail order merchandising.

Hart, Schaffner, Marx, Kuppenheimer and Levi Strauss became household names in mens' clothing. (Let's not forget EJ Korvets -Eight Jewish Korean (war) Veterans.)

Jewish Marc Chagall (born Segal, Russia) is one of the great 20th century painters.

English-Jewish financiers such as Isaac Goldsmid, Nathan Rothschild, David Salomons, and Moses Montefiore, whose for-

A GREAT GERMAN WORD

I am not a great fan of German achievement. I believe, horrors! horrors!, that a Lexus or a Cadillac is better than a BMW or Mercedes. But I do acknowledge that Germans have a way with words. They created words that other languages simply do not have.

Schadenfreude is such a word. In case you are not familiar with it, it takes 7 English words to define it: "malicious satisfaction in the misfortunes of others". The dictionary also explains it with a quote from the New York Times about historian Peter Gay, who felt Schadenfreude as a Jewish child in Nazi-era Berlin, watching the Germans lose coveted gold medals in the 1936 Olympics. He said that it "can be one of the great joys of life."

All this is a prelude to inform you that I feltand greatly enjoyed Schadenfreude recently.

A friend had recently come back from a trip to Russia. He told us that he saw beautiful flowers at an expensive flower shop in Moscow and asked where these out-of-season flowers had come from. "Holland," he was told. "Most of our flowers come from Holland but the Dutch buy a lot of them from Israel and resell them throughout Europe. We are lucky to get them. They are so beautiful"

Another friend spent a week in the French countryside where he enjoyed a wonderful tasty fruit, apparently some kind of a cross of a peach and a plum. He asked what it was and was told that it was imported from Israel, the only place where it was cultivated.

I am sure that at least some of the flowers, fruit and vegetables that are used to cater to European sophisticates came from the more than 3000 Gaza greenhouses. They were all built on barren empty land by the Jews whountil a few years ago, employed over 12,000 Palestinians there. Since the start of the last intifada and several terror attacks by the more

demented employees, the number of Arabs working the greenhouses was drastically reduced and Thais, Africans and Filipinos replaced them.

During the months of preparation for the Israeli withdrawal there were many questions on what should be done with the greenhouses. They were state-of-art agricultural marvels with their own sophisticated temperature and humidity control systems, they turned out millions of dollars worth of produce yearly and they were a source of employment for thousands of people in an area where close to 40% were unemployed. Should these marvelous structures be destroyed? Moved? Abandoned?

And then a wonderful and heartwarming solution was found. A small group of wealthy American Jews decided to buy the greenhouses from Israel and donate them to the Palestinian Authority. One of the donors was former World Bank president James Wolfensohn who put up \$500,000 of his own money. All in all, \$14 million was collected, the deal was done and appreciative Palestinian spokesmen announced that the greenhouses would become the cornerstone of the future Palestinian economy.

So where is the Schadenfreude, you say? Happy ending for all, right? Palestinians get the greenhouses, Israelis get \$14 million and the small group of admirable Jews in America get the warm feeling of having made the world a more tolerant and loving place where Arabs appreciate Jewish kindness and are less eager to murder Jews, right?

Well, no, not really. Have you heard the old story about a scorpion that asked a fox to carry him across a river? The fox refused: "You are a scorpion and you might sting me," he said. The scorpion scoffed. "Don't be ridiculous. Why would I sting you? We would both drown if I do," he said. The fox thought this made sense and told him to climb on his back. Halfway across the river the scorpion stung the fox. "Why? Why did you do this? We'll both drown," cried the drown-

1 medium cauliflower, cooked and drained

1 can cream of celery soup (or cream of mushroom soup)

1/2 cup milk 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1/4 cup buttered bread crumbs

Separate cauliflower and arrange in buttered baking dish. Blend soup and milk with half the chhese and pour over cauliflower. Top with remaining cheese and crumbs. Bake at 350° for about 30 minutes.

ZUCCHINI AND SOUASH CASSEROLE

3 zucchini 3 yellow squash

1 cup bread crumbs 1 medium onion, sauteed

1 egg 1 cup milk

1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese salt and pepper to taste

paprika

Boil zucchini and squash until tender. Drain and chop into small pieces and drain again. Pour into a baking dish. Saute onion and add to zucchini/squash mixture. Thoroughly mix bread crumbs, egg, 1 cup of cheese and salt and pepper. Sprinkle remaining cheese on top and sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350° for about 15 minutes or until bubbly.

ing fox. " I know, my friend, but this is the Middle East," said the scorpion before dying. It's in my nature.

Just an hour or so after the Jews left Gaza thousands of Palestinians swarmed into the empty settlements. The Palestinian police watched the mob demolish the abandoned synagogues and set them on fire. They also watched with interest as part of the crowd turned on the greenhouses breaking windows, taking plates of glass, wiring, computer and electronic parts and irrigation pipes and timers. It didn't take long-after a few hours or so the greenhouses that it had taken years to build were just so much junk.

And so I have Schadenfreude. The Palestinians will not export flowers to Holland or fruit to France. The greenhouses will not be rebuilt. The Palestinian economy, such as

it is, will continue to be mired in corruption, hatred and violence. They will suffer - Schadenfreude -but still they'll never admit that it was their own fault.

And I have Schadenfreude towards the naive rich Jews who thought that the Arab reaction to their gift would be based on logic and not on inbred hatred. You silly people, didn't you learn yet that this is the Middle East where scorpions sting even if this means their own destruction? You lost \$14 million and, you know, I am glad you did. I only hope that Israel cashed the \$14 million check before it was too late.

I would like to talk about a subject that has been bothering me for some time. The holiest day - I want to talk to you about speed and the Sabbath, not just today but for all Sabbaths.

Cast your mind back to our parents or our grandparent's time. A time before MTV, before remote controls, before books on tape and streaming Internet media, a family would sit down together at a certain time and listen to their favorite program on the radio.

Today things have changed - technology has improved and our lives have gotten faster. Speed.

- Fax machines and Fedex and proliferating e-mail.
- Amazon, Ebay, Itunes, Pod Casts and Pop-Ups
- Instant coffee. Instant replay. Instant gratification and instant messaging
- Gigahertz ,Gigabytes, GigaRam and Fast Cpu's
- In today's culture, calling a person "slow" is an insult, implying that he or she is handicapped.
- Web Cams, Cell phones and high speed Wireless Internet.
 - Speed-dialing, Picture-in-Picture
 - 24 hour T.V , 120 Channels., and Tivo
- Pre-aged blue jeans, because we don't have time to wait months, for those jeans to get faded and soft.
- 5 x Minute rice, one-minute bedtime stories and the one-minute manager.
- Frozen waffles, Pop Tarts, granola bars, energy bars and something called Breakfast Mates, "for today's busy families"
 - Drive through!
- Today, speed is everything.. We want it and we want it now.
- We drum our fingers restlessly while we're on hold:

- We grind our teeth while we're waiting for a website to come into view;
- We honk the horn in frustration while we're sitting in traffic.
- At Publix checkout We count the number of items for the fast-lane.

And the pulse-pounding tempo is getting faster all the time. There is too much information coming at us, too fast. Too much to do, too many choices, and not enough time.

Speed is seductive. Speed means convenience and Speed is progress.

Speed is progress - But that's not entirely true. Take tonight, for instance - all over the world at this time. Jews are gathered tonight for a special purpose that seems to go deliberately against the grain. Yom Kippur is nothing if not slow. It's long; it's repetitive and it's tonight

We listen to Kol Nidre three times our Cantor; Cantor Mark Halpern singing the beautiful melody of Kol Nidre - we absorb the haunting melody of Kol Nidre - we take it in.

So, what is the solution - how do we slow down? The times we live in have spawned an entire industry based on "living simply," on slowing down and caring for the soul. Ironically, here too is a proliferation of products --books, CD's, websites, courses, personal coaches -- all promising to show us how to manage our time and develop a life that is balanced rather than breathless.

Tonight, on the holiest night of the year, I want to talk to you about a solution - Shabbat.

Shabbat - the seventh day - comes from a Hebrew verb that means "to cease; to stop."

God says to Moses on Mt. Sinai, after all the laws and regulations have been given. "Ve-shamru v'nei Yisrael et ha-shabbat - the Israelite people shall keep Shabbat, to make Shabbat throughout their generations."

Shabbat is something that God creates but

Thank You

I would like To express my sincere thanks to all for your prayers, cards, phone calls, and well wishes for my recovery from my recent illness. I am doing well and am happy to be amongst my friends for the Holidays.

L'shanah Tovah, Joel Pollack that people 'make'; it is a gift from God, but one that we ourselves must fashion; it stands at the very intersection of the divine and the human.

Shabbat is an everlasting covenant; it speaks of eternity and links the generations of Jews together. But Shabbat is made again and again -- in every age, in every Jewish family, in every Jewish home -- and its meaning evolves over time.

Now, I live in the real world, along with all of you. I know the pressures that push us to make Shabbat the same as any other day - a day for shopping, for errands , for soccer games , for chores, for catching up on our work, and running around to do whatever we don't have time to do during the week.

I don't want to give you a list of do's and don'ts for how to spend your Shabbat. Every one of us has to make a choice. There are 3 x steps to making a shabbath:

A decision. A design. An act of devotion.

The first one may be the hardest. Shabbat begins with a decision to clear away some space, to open up some time. It takes an act of will to say no to the profusion of choices spread out before us. We cannot do everything. We have to make a choice and decide what is important.

Shabbat begins with a decision to clear some space, to make room for the soul to grow. Shabbat takes shape through conscious design. Once we have cleared away the space -- once we have said no to certain activities -- a more important step awaits us. What will we choose to fill the space we have created in our week? Our Sages taught that the building blocks of this day should be 1. menucha -- rest and peace; 2. oneg -- joy and pleasure; 3. kedusha -- holiness and sanctity. As we say no on Shabbat to what is fast and frenetic and draining, we say yes to what is quiet and deep and true.

We're addicted to speed in 2005; it's our

drug of choice and we're not likely to kick the habit anytime soon. Let's face it -- we enjoy our gadgets and we thrive on our busy and stimulating lives. Our tradition doesn't ask us to run away to the woods or return to a simpler age. But for 3000 years Judaism has held workaholism in check by caring for the body and soul in the deepest possible way. Here in the real world, week in and week out, Jews found a way to make Shabbat.

How will we open a space for the seventh day? Let me suggest that we begin with one small step: let's start calling Saturday - Shabbat. That, in itself, will begin to change how we think. Don't worry about making it last for 24 hours; start with one hour on Friday nights or carve out a little time on Shabbat afternoon. Decide what activities you want to clear out. Doing the bills, or going to Publix, or answering e-mail; maybe even find a way to stop doing your job. Whatever evokes, for you, the clamor and crush of commerce, the effort and strain of work.

When the fixed anchor of our week is the Sabbath meal with the ones we love, we make a statement about our highest priority. When we celebrate Shabbat at the synagogue we form a bond with our Jewish community.

We are blessed to be part of a congregation . Each week we have those who come to worship and to sing, to study and to celebrate..

Shabbat is meant for refreshment and renewal. Focus on something that speaks to you. Relax and make it holy. Recreate - Recreation.

There are 4 x Words - Candles, Wine , Challah and Blessings. The doors to replenishing the soul are within our grasp. We can open them with just two words:

Shabbat shalom.

Wind blew, water surged, the KJCC building survived, mostly unharmed, but there was a tremendous amount of cleanup necessary on the grounds, many repairs to be made, and parts to replace. The most amazing item was our canvas awning, which blew from our entrance porch, over the building, and landed in the large flame tree in the front yard. It took a crane to remove it!

Our front sign blew apart - Wilma picked up the sign from the frame and moved it north about 20 yards. This sign consists of 6 sheets of 1/2" plywood joined together. It does have weight. It will be replaced.

We have a great crew working for us, and Jim Boruszak kept in touch with all of them to insure a cleanup in time for Stellar's bat mitzvah.

One final note - this issue of Chai-Lights will reach you later than usual because our printer lost power for over a week.

It was an impressive act of compassion and humanity that took Judge Nason to the home of adoptive parents in the Bronx recently. The parents, who reared their adopted child for more than 7 years, were unable to travel to Judge Nason's court



because the father was too ill. Judge Nason offered to hold the final adoptive hearing in the petitioner's home instead of in court without the father.

"It was quite obvious to me that the man had been part of the child raising family and I didn't feel that it would be appropriate for him to miss the proceedings," Judge Nason said. "I could have decided not to go, but it wouldn't have been right."

How's that for versatile justice?

So, during a heavy rainstorm, six people piled into two cars for the drive to the home in the south Bronx. The contingent included the judge, his law assistant, the adoption clerk, a court reporter and court assistant. Judge Nason then convened his impromptu court in the parents' living room.

Without a doubt, Judge Nason's warmth, concern and generosity will be remembered by all those who were present.

Judge Nason was counsel to the ombudsman of the Housing Development Administration, an arbitrator in the Small Claims Division of the Civil Court and a judge in the Civil Court. But it's doubtful that anything in the past, or possibly the future, can match the day when Judge Nason took his courtroom on the road.
