I consider District 30 a team where each of us works together to support all children. This collaboration helps us exchange ideas and attain goals that serve to improve the outcomes for all children. Principals, coaches, and teachers in schools across the district have been visiting each other's schools and classrooms sharing practices. Our Field Support Center and the



Department of English Language Learners works closely with my office to provide the best professional learning for teachers and administrators. We are continuing to work together to help all of our students achieve even more.

Our students and schools have made major strides in progress on the NYS ELA and mathematics assessments. For progress, District 30 ranked 4th in ELA and 8th in mathematics. Student proficiency levels increased from 47.6% to 55.4% and from 44.9% to 50.9% respectively, placing District 30 as the 8th highest performing District in NYC for both ELA and math. This would not have been possible without the collaboration and efforts of all.

During this season of Thanksgiving, I want to take this opportunity to extend my sincere gratitude and appreciation for the on-going support provided by parents, school staff and school leaders to improve outcomes for our children. Although each of us may see ourselves as ordinary, when we work collectively, as a team, we are extraordinary. In the year ahead, we will continue to work together to increase the number of students meeting or exceeding the standards and growing academically, socially, and emotionally. It is imperative that we all continue to work together so that all children in District 30 possess the skills and knowledge for 21st century success. We want to continue to light the way for a brighter future for ALL children.

NYC Opened College Savings Accounts for Some 5-Year-Olds. Here's How the Program is Doing.





"Last fall, the Bill de Blasio Administration offered to open an account for every child attending kindergarten in School District 30 in Queens."

"The research shows that a child who has a college savings program, anywhere between a dollar and \$500, is three times more likely to go to college than a child that doesn't have a college savings program," one expert said. "And once they're in college, they're four times as likely to graduate."

"Numbers NY1 obtained show that 94 percent of the eligible families accepted the offer of \$100, creating 3,120 accounts."

"Each of the families can receive another \$200 by meeting certain benchmarks, such as







contributing small amounts of their own money."

"A Wall Street executive's foundation gave \$10 million to launch the program." "Of course, the hope is to go universal and to have this program citywide, and there is really tremendous enthusiasm on behalf of the city to do that."




