LOVE WITHOUT RESERVE

(Ex. 22:20-26; Ps. 18:2-4, 47, 51; 1Thess. 1:5c-10; Matt. 22:34-40)

Laws have a reason to exist only insofar as they are explanations and adaptations of the great Law of the love of God and the love of neighbor! In the Law of Moses, the Scribes and Pharisees counted 613 precepts in the Torah, and there were various interpretations on priority. They made the Law of God a burden too hard for the people to bear. God's laws that were meant to bring relief to the people had in turn brought despair. The Scribes and the Pharisees had become so entrenched with the letters of the law that they deliberately ignored the spirit of the law! Thus, Jesus, in more ways than one, reacted angrily to the repressive and frosty attitude of the Scribes and Pharisees in interpreting the law when He retorted: "Woe...to you lawyers! For you load people with burdens hard to bear..." (Luke 11:46). Here, Jesus was reacting against legalism, and thus, put all laws in their proper perspective. Today's gospel affirms that every law is based on the commandments of the love of God and neighbor.

The entire scripture revolves around the love of God and love of neighbor. St. John in one of his epistles says: "If you say, 'I love God,' while you hate your brother or sister, you are a liar. How can you love God Whom you do not see, if you do not love your brother (or sister) whom you see?" (1John 4:20). To further illustrate this point, St. Paul says: "If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal" (1Cor. 13:1). To practice the kind of love Christ demands we must go beyond mere sensual feelings of love that usually bring couples together, but cannot sustain a relationship. Christian love is the attitude we have towards God and our fellow human beings - an attitude of care and concern that continues to exist even in the midst of anger, misunderstanding and dislike. Indeed, Christian love is a choice, a decision to put God above all else, and to treat others, as we would have them treat us. Thus, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength" (Deut. 6:5); and in addition, "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Lev. 19:18).

Loving your neighbor as oneself does not mean that love of others cannot exist without healthy love of self, but that one must always place oneself in the situation of the neighbor. Thus, in today's first reading we are exhorted: "You shall not molest or oppress an alien...You shall not wrong any widow or orphan..." You should not extort money from your debtors. Return to the owner what you borrowed. We must bear in mind that it is the profound human love for another that offers an image of love of God. Love of God and neighbor should not be abstract, emotional, vague, and lacking in precision. Aestheticism and vague statements or philosophical and theological recitations on love do not do much good for the poor, the abandoned, the stranger, the needy, the widow, the sick, the aged and the orphan. Without the love of neighbor, the love of God remains a sterile figment of the mind - a barren emotion. Equally, without the love of God, love of neighbor is but a refined form of self-love and can often be reduced to a qualified act of charity that may not withstand the test of time whenever one is faced with difficulties and disappointments. Our love for God must manifest in love for others! You and I must love God with all our hearts, soul and mind. We must love Him and desire Him above all things, including our possessions and our time. You and I should bear in mind that to be truly religious is to love God and to love those whom God made in His own image.

you do need literature on how to pray the Rosary or you need a Rosary, please feel free to call our Religious Education Office for help at (914) 476-6676.


Registration for **Religious Education Classes** for public school children is open. Classes are available for children in Pre-K through High School, including those with Special

SAINT SIMON & SAINT JUDE APOSTLES OCTOBER 28



Jude is so named by Luke in the Acts. Matthew and Mark call him Thaddeus. He is not mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels, except, of course, where all the apostles are referred to. Scholars hold that he is not the author of the Letter of Jude. Actually, Jude had the same name as Judas Iscariot. Evidently because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to "Jude" in English.

Simon is mentioned on all four lists of the apostles. On two of them he is called "the Zealot." The Zealots were a Jewish sect that represented an extreme of Jewish nationalism. For them, the messianic promise of the Old Testament meant that the Jews were to be a free and independent nation. God alone was their king, and any payment of taxes to the Romans - the very domination of the Romans - was a blasphemy against God. No doubt some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence. But many were the counterparts of modern terrorists. They raided and killed, attacking both foreigners and "collaborating" Jews. They were chiefly responsible for the rebellion against Rome which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70.

COMMENT: As in the case of all the apostles except for Peter, James and John, we are faced with men who are really unknown, and we are struck by the fact that their holiness is simply taken to be a gift of Christ. He chose some unlikely people: a former Zealot, a former (crooked) tax collector, an impetuous fisherman, two "sons of thunder" and a man named Judas Iscariot.

It is a reminder that we cannot receive too often. Holiness does not depend on human merit, culture, personality, effort or achievement. It is entirely God's creation and gift.

God needs no Zealots to bring about the kingdom by force. Jude, like all the saints, is the saint of the impossible: only God can create his divine life in human beings. And, God wills to do so, for all of us.

QUOTE: "Just as Christ was sent by the Father, so also He sent the apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit. This He did so that, by preaching the gospel to every creature (cf. Mark 16:15), they might proclaim that the Son of God, by His death and resurrection, had freed us from the power of Satan (cf. Acts 26:18) and from death, and brought us into the kingdom of His Father" (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, 6).
