Palm Sunday Year C Lk 19:28-40



"Jesus proceeded on his journey up to Jerusalem. As he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples. He said, "Go into the village opposite you, and as you enter it you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. And if anyone should ask you, 'Why are you untying it?' you will answer, 'The Master has need of it.'" So those who had been sent went off and found everything just as he had told them. And as they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying this colt?" They answered, "The Master has need of it." So they brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks over the colt, and helped Jesus to mount. As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road; and now as he was approaching the slope of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen. They proclaimed: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord. Peace in heaven and glory in the highest." Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." He said in reply, "I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!"

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

2 Palm Sunday Gospels Lk 19:28-40 & Passion Lk 22:14-23:56

Happy Holy Week! Take a deep breath, because we are swimming in scripture this coming week! But we trust the Holy Spirit (The breath of God) who composed the scriptures to begin with, to keep us in-spired as we 'roll in the deep' or 'flow'-t through the rush of Christ's last words and events leading to the cross!

Where does a person start? We will be reviewing so much scripture this week as we hear first of the Passion of our Lord (His Supper, Suffering, Arrest, Betrayal and Crucifixion!), but also as we review a lot of Old Testament prophetic writings that foretold of God saving His people through such an awaited Servant-Messiah as Jesus. To catch a glimpse of how much reading we will do, note that today we have two (2) different gospels, one at the beginning of mass with the Palm procession and then the usual one within the Liturgy of the Word. Now, two gospel readings means that I can give two homilies, right? I recall a visitor once in our parish telling me that her pastor usually delivers three homilies each Sunday 1) One at beginning of Mass, 2) another in the regular place following the gospel, and then a third 3) after communion. But, if anything, my tendency is to say less when we have so much scripture, because again, where does one begin? I encourage everyone to dedicate some time this week to read and study some set of the many selections from this coming week. Start small if you need to: Just select one reading, and ask yourself what it has to reveal about Jesus' last week on earth before the crucifixion—What does the reading say about the type of Savior Jesus is, or what do the trials He accepted on our behalf show us about His way of holiness and our way to heaven? If a particular word, phrase or passage strikes you, accept that as a sign that God is inviting you to stay with it a while. Pray over it and personally seek its meaning for you and how you can apply those verses into your life. Again, even if it is only a verse or two, that is great, because God's word, a lot or a little, will be effective for completing His Plan in you. What is most important is that we understand what we read and that we see its relevance and application in our lives. In the Thomas Merton book we are reading in the Saturday morning discussion group, Merton addresses the importance of comprehending the Word whether we read a lot or a little. He uses a great quote from the monk Cassian, when he writes, "the spiritual fathers do not delight in the number of verses they recite but in the spiritual understanding with which they recite them. It is more important to recite ten verses in an intelligent and orderly fashion then to rush through a whole psalm with confusion of mind." (Bread in Wilderness p. 23). So, if I only read a paragraph, but draw from the small paragraph, my strength and motivation for the day I face, then God willed it and Glory Be to Him! Forcing myself to read the whole chapter, is only wasting time I could be using to further glorify God by acting on His Word, letting it move and animate my service to others in His Name. A method to try out yourselves when reading scripture is called 'Lectio Divina' or Sacred Reading. Its steps are 1)Read 2)Reflect, 3)Respond & 4)Rest. When we read over scripture, we are listening God to speak to us (It is His Word!). But what we have to listen closely for, is what exactly God is telling us through those words and how to apply or enact them in our lives. So, please, read on, this week!

We are blessed with a great Passion/Palm Sunday reading from the gospel of Luke this year in the calendar. Each gospel is a blessing in its own way, as each author has unique details and emphases. Luke highlights the 'forgiving Savoir' we have, because repeatedly he notes 'compassionate encounters of forgiveness' by Jesus along his way to the cross. Luke spotlights the 'reconciling work of Jesus'. For example, only in Luke do we hear about Jesus 'healing' the high priest servant who had come to arrest Him. This servant had his ear cut off in the scuffle and Jesus took time to stop and forgive, touching the man & healing him (Luke 22:50-51). Or how about learning in Luke 23:12, that by mutually interacting with Jesus, Pilate and Herod were brought to make peace with one another (though they had formerly been enemies-not that that was good for Jesus staying alive but it is another sign of Jesus' forgiveness/peace-making). Or also in Luke 23:27-29, Jesus takes a moment on his Way to the Cross to comfort and bring peace, praying with the weeping women accompanying him. Or also, that it is only in Luke that we hear of the 'Good Thief' being forgiven even in his final hour on the cross (Luke 23:39-43). Or greatest of all, is Jesus' intercessory prayer of forgiveness for us all, as He is about to die, when he prays, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). Thanks be to God, we have such a peacemaking and forgiving Savior!




