

New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

What Cross Do I Bear During this Lent?



Rainbows consist of light waves of differing wavelengths reflecting and refracting off water droplets in the air, then dispersing at slightly different angles. Without the rain droplets, there would be not rainbow. The same rain that flooded the earth formed the rainbow that symbolized the promise that no such flood would ever occur again. The sun, which had been blotted out during the forty days of devastating rain, now shone brightly on the droplets of rain to produce the benign bow.

The covenant that God made with Noah and his family is unlike any other covenant or agreement ever made. In other cases, one party can break the contract and it will become null and void. Not so with God's covenant. It survived the tower at Babel to be renewed with Abraham. It continued despite the Israelites' grumbling and disobedience and was renewed with Moses. God renewed it with David and his descendants and fulfilled it in Jesus. Through all these generations, faithful or not, the covenant has kept God's people tethered to God.

Immediately after the Spirit descends upon Jesus when He is bap-

tized this same Spirit drives Him into the desert to be tempted by Satan. Jesus withstands temptation, strengthening Him for His ministry, which He begins by proclaiming, "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:15). We may have heard the same words just a few days ago when we were signed with the ashes that were traced on our foreheads in the shape of that cross that Jesus accepted and asks us all to do as well. May we be strengthened over these



forty days so that we might carry our crosses.

Lenten Almsgiving Religious Ed Project

Imagine your child at the age of 10 being orphaned because of 20 years of war in your country. He is now scavenging through scraps that people throw away to find food and living in the streets. Homelessness among children is a particularly acute problem in South Sudan, with many children living in the streets, cemeteries, markets, etc. They are often subject to violence and exploitation.



Why am I telling you this? For the past 15 or so years, each Lent we Religious sponsor a Lenten almsgiving project $\dot{\text{th}}$ at benefits various missions run by Saucation the Missionary Society of St Paul, commonly known as MSP, which is the order in which the priests of our

parish belong. During Lent the money we save from what we give up is meant to be used to help the poor. This year we plan to help children in war torn South Sudan at an MSP mission.

In a small way, the MSP Fathers try to help these street children at their South Sudan Mission. They presently have rescued 25 young boys between the ages of 10 and 15 from the streets. The 25 boys rescued from the streets will receive an education at the MSP Fathers school program which is considered the best school in the state. They will have food to eat, a shelter where they can lay their heads at night and health care in a country where children die from diseases easily cured. Last year through our Lenten almsgiving we were able to provide the MSP Fathers will donations to care for five children for the year. It presently cost approximately \$450 per year for each child.

I am asking every family in our parish to consider joining us this year by either picking up an almsgiving container in the back of the church on Ash Wednesday or making your own at home from an empty can, plastic container, or zip lock bag. Each day place the change you saved by what you and your family give up for Lent in the container. At the end of Lent, right after Easter, return the container to us. If we each do our small part, collectively we can make the world a better place one child at a time.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS The Unlikely Suspects

Have you ever taken a nature walk? Have you leisurely strolled through a forest or field, with no real destination in mind and your only objective being receptivity to and observation of all God's creation?

Sometimes, Scripture readings can feel like a nature walk. All of salvation history plays out against the backdrop of the natural world, with all elements of God's creation — plants and animals and the dust of the earth itself — turning in a supporting performance. How about Jesus in the hot and dusty desert, tempted, living "among the wild beasts?" Noah departed from his ark with the animals he rescued, observing God's sign in the very clouds of the sky. Even God Himself, offering us salvation from original sin through the waters of baptism.

How often do we remember that God speaks to us through all of His creation, even in the unlikeliest suspects?

Let's go back to the nature walk. It sounds like a lovely way to pass an afternoon, amongst wildflowers and butterflies, but don't forget the beating hot sun, mosquitos, and threat of rain on the horizon. Remember, we're not in heaven yet. Here on earth, God may be present in His creation, but that doesn't mean it's always easy to endure.

Lent is, essentially, a time to listen for the voice of God in places we may not expect: the mild irritations you experience when you're craving the chocolate you gave up, or the dull pangs of hunger during the Ash Wednesday fast. It's a golden opportunity to see the divine hand in all of creation, even those unlikely suspects.
