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1 Corinthians: Our Summer Sermon Focus

In Christ.

At the recent Church of the Brethren Minister's Association annual continuing education event, I had the opportunity to hear and learn more about 1 Corinthians, one of Paul's letters that has always been a very special letter for me. As I sat and listened, I was inspired to take some time this summer for us to dive a bit deeper into this letter, and so we will be spending much of July and August with this important letter of Paul as the basis for our worship services.

Now, a few notes about why this is a letter that has been a favorite of mine for a good long time. There are, of course, several passages that are ones that are formative for many of us in our faith journeys. One of these, 1 Corinthians 13, which touches on the idea of what love is all about, is a passage that we often hear in wedding ceremonies (and, in fact, is one of the passages that Tasha and I chose for our own wedding). A chapter earlier, in chapter 12, we hear the familiar story of the church as the body of Christ, including the reminder that every one of us is an important part of the body of Christ. These, among others, are scriptures that speak to us even today.

Another thing that has long drawn me to this particular letter (and also to 2 Corinthians, Paul's other letter to the Corinthian church), has been the setting that Paul addresses. Paul is writing to an early church that is fractious, has many ongoing difficulties, and just generally needs additional guidance. A situation that continues to speak to many ongoing issues in our world today. Paul's correspondence with the Corinthians continues to speak to us, even across the thousands of years dividing us from this particular early congregation.

In preparation for this sermon series, I would like to invite everyone to take the time to read through both 1 and 2 Corinthians (while we are going to focus on 1 Corinthians, it is helpful to remind ourselves of all that goes on between Paul and the Corinthians). Then, as we worship together this summer, we'll explore what we can learn from this important letter of Paul.



July - Growing Grounds

Growing Grounds started at the Wabash Church of the Brethren approximately 13 years ago by a group of women who had a desire to help women while they were incarcerated, and afterwards to reintegrate back to society. The goal has always been to help them become more stable so that they do not find themselves incarcerated again. This led to several of them volunteering time inside the jail to help with educational aspirations, making connections with landlords to find safe, stable housing, identifying childcare resources, mentoring and being a listening ear, finding employment and reliable transportation, and giving small no-interest loans when needed. We have been able to grow that network to include so many other organizations who are also able to provide support which has lead to a more complete "walk with them" experience.

August - Deacon's Helping Hands

This month, our giving goes to Deacon's Helping Hands. We use this funds to help members of our own church family, when they are going through rough patches. This can include anything from housing, to medical, to food.

Larry is pressing to get it all done, but I don't expect it to be done for another week or more. The A/C is also not functioning properly, so again, Quality Electric to the rescue! Brant Beachler will finish all the interior work. We are ready to paint the exterior and install new solar lighting on the front and rear of the building. Once we get past the interior, we will get the outside painted and backyard cleaned out.

A Letter from Beth

This morning while visiting my mother we heard a strange bawl. A small search led to the discovery of a neighbor's black Angus calf expressing his lostness down by the calf pens all holding brown Jerseys. My sister, with minimal help from me, got him through the barnyard, sorted from the cows and into his own private calf pen pending pick up by his owners. She just texted that he does not belong to the farm she expected him to belong to and has had no luck finding his owner. She is out making a circle to see who else around might be missing an Angus calf.

Made me wonder how many people in this world feel lost without any obvious characteristics to label them lost. Earlier this morning I learned a neighbor's son was arrested and imprisoned on another drug charge last night. I am well aware that many children in our town are hungry these days when school is not in session and free lunches not so easily available. Our food pantry is a busy place. Sometimes lost is obvious and sometimes it is more difficult to recognize.

Jesus had words to say about looking for the lost and lonely, the downtrodden and needy. They are to be searched for. They are to be cared for; fed, visited, clothed, healed. And they are to be prayed for. I know the congregations of our district have a heart for those who need a helping hand. Across our district there are food pantries, day care programs, free clothing closets, prison ministries, diaper giveaways, and community meals. Bless you! For the ways you reach out to neighbors in need. I give thanks for the commitment I see across our congregations to care for neighbors in need of care and prayer.

The challenge is to see those in need and do the caring, to actively look for those who are lost and to pray that each might learn to know the welcoming grace of Jesus Christ in their lives. Blessings upon all who share in the task of finding the lost and welcoming the stranger.

Camp Mack - Creation Speaks: Exploring the Summer Camp Theme

Genesis 1 is the biblical narrative of God's creative power and love. In it, we understand that God brings the world into being by speaking. Over six days, God takes what is formless through the processes of being, separating, shaping, placing, filling, growing, and forming. At the end of each day, God proclaims it good.



God speaks in Creation, and if we listen, Creation speaks of God. This is the basis of the theme for summer camp. Each daily focus challenges our campers to look more closely at the incredible world around them. Campers discover they are Invited by Light and Refreshed by Water. They learn about how God, the potter (Jeremiah 18), forms us as we are Shaped Like Earth. The rhythm of life and the process of growth are developed as campers explore Moving through Seasons. Trekking Toward God's Adventurous Future

A quarterly pastoral letter from Paul Mundey, Moderator of the Church of the Brethren

GREETINGS IN THE STRONG NAME OF JESUS!



Will Willmon tells of an Episcopal friend committed to eradicating apartheid in South Africa. After months of intense effort, including weeks of lobbying in Washington, D.C., a breakthrough felt distant and dim. Commiserating with colleagues at the Episcopal Church Center in New York City, Willimon's friend was discouraged along with her compatriots; all seemed for naught. But then, unexpectedly, the door to their meeting room flung open, and in walked famed anti-apartheid leader Bishop Desmond Tutu. Tutu sensed the anguish in the room but didn't drop his customary exuberant countenance; instead, he accentuated it. "Well, chappies," Tutu exclaimed, "Why the cast-down faces? Why are you looking so sad? Come on; we've got the resurrection. Let's get busy!"

During my two years as Moderator, I've encountered any number of cast-down faces. It's been a difficult season, marked by an onslaught of pandemic, schism, racism, and violence. But I'm with Tutu: the heart of the Gospel is a Jesus who rises above despair. Such a response doesn't minimize strain and sorrow but keeps it in perspective; lament does not cancel resurrection. As Glenn Packiam notes:

"Lament is not our final prayer. It is a prayer in the meantime. Most of the lament psalms end with a 'vow to praise'... Because Jesus Christ is risen from the dead, we know that sorrow is not how the story ends. The song may be in a minor motif now, but one day it will resolve in a major chord." 1

I challenge us to sound God's major chord, even as we muddle through a minor motif. The Anabaptists, key influencers of our faith tradition, spoke of "walking in the resurrection." Though there's a future element to resurrection, our forerunners believed there's also a present-tense reality—now. The Apostle Paul concurs.

"It stands to reason, doesn't it, that if the alive-and-present God who raised Jesus from the dead moves into your life, he'll do the same thing in you that he did in Jesus, bringing you alive to himself? When God lives and breathes in you (and he does, as surely as he did in Jesus), you are delivered from that dead life. With his Spirit living in you, your body will be as alive as Christ's!" (Romans 8:11 MSG, emphasis added)

Our current season of life and faith is arduous, taxing us in compound ways. But Paul is on to something: God is breathing into us, nevertheless. Can you sense God's breath moving...animating? The classic evidence is God's encounter with the prophet Ezekiel.

"The hand of the Lord was on me...and placed me in the midst of the valley, and it was full of bones... He said to me, 'Son of man, can these bones live?' I said to him, 'Sovereign Lord, you know.' Then he said to me, 'Prophesy over these bones.'... So I prophesied...I heard a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to bone. As I watched, I saw tendons on them, then muscles appeared, and skin covered over them from above, but there was no breath in them. He said to me, 'Prophesy to the breath'... So I prophesied as I was commanded, and the breath came into them; they lived and stood on their feet." (Ezekiel 37:1-10 NET)

I challenge us to "prophesy to the breath," believing God not only rattles but infuses with the Spirit, empowering us to stand. Jurgen Moltmann is best known for his theology of hope, a belief system

advancing God's resurrection ability today. Among Moltmann's resurrection convictions is a revisualization of the church as a fellowship of friends.

"Friendship [in Christ] is a new relationship, which goes beyond the social roles of those involved... The community of brethren is really the fellowship of friends who live in the friendship of Jesus and spread friendliness....by meeting the forsaken with affection and the despised with respect. Its brothers and sisters cannot choose each other." (emphasis added)2

Continuing, Moltmann concludes: "The church will not overcome its present crisis through reform of...its ministries. It will overcome this crisis through the rebirth...of fellowship and friendship among the rank and file"3 (emphasis added). I call us to a rebirth of friendship in Christ, a resurrection of affection and respect. For as brothers and sisters in Jesus, we don't choose each other; Christ chooses us, calling us to live together, even amid our diversity.

The Human Library is a European movement promoting understanding among diverse persons.4 The concept is bold and innovative but straightforward: "borrow" a person much like you borrow a book. The purpose: to learn from someone you normally wouldn't engage with, especially persons you tend to minimize or normally don't encounter. For example, you might borrow a single parent if you've always lived within a traditional family, or a homeless person if you've always had food and shelter. This approach got me thinking: how might a Human Library be "stocked" in the church; what "books," what categories of people would be eye-opening to have on our "shelves"? Certainly, single parents and the homeless—but I'd love for a progressive believer to be able to borrow a conservative believer; a person puzzled by women in ministry to be able to borrow a woman preacher. You catch my drift. The purpose of "borrowing" and listening is not necessarily to change our convictions but to soften harsh or indifferent hearts, becoming newly awash in understanding—even empathy—for those we don't know or tend to disregard.

And so, I call us to walk in newness of life, in resurrection, calling forth dry bones and hearts to live! For "If all we get out of Christ is a little inspiration for a few short years, we're a pretty sorry lot. But the truth is that Christ has been raised, the first in a long legacy of those who are going to leave the cemeteries" (1 Corinthians 15:19–20 MSG). Where is life deadened for you, cast down, sad? Where is your spirit eroded, thin, and limping? Christ has left the cemetery. Life can be raised. Hope is alive. Let's get busy!

Discussion Starters / Questions

Glenn Packiam notes: "Lament is not our final prayer. It is a prayer in the meantime...Because Jesus is risen from the dead." How do you keep honesty (lament) and hope (resurrection) in proper balance, avoiding being either too naïve or too pessimistic?

Reread Romans 8:11. Have you experienced God bringing you alive to himself through the resurrection power of Jesus? Describe the experience and the difference it made/makes.

Jurgen Moltmann believes we must reimagine the church as a fellowship of friends meeting "the forsaken with affection and the despised with respect." What steps can your congregation take to become a fuller fellowship of friends?
