Take Steps to Protect your Kidneys

March is National Kidney Month, - a good reason to learn more about how to keep your kidneys healthy to prevent deterioration and disease.

Your kidneys, each about the size of a fist, filter the blood. Each kidney contains about a million tiny filters that can process around 40 gallons of fluid daily. When blood passes through the kidney, the filters sift and hold onto the substances your body might need, such as certain nutrients and much of the water. Harmful wastes and extra water and nutri-

ents are routed to the bladder and flushed away as urine. The kidneys also produce hormones that help to control your blood pressure, make red blood cells and activate vitamin D, which keeps the bones in your body strong.

While we all lose some kidney function as we get older, kidney function can also drop because of an underlying kidney disease. Toxins and extra water can build up in your blood. Falling hormone production can also cause other health problems.

According to the National Kidney Foundation, one in three Americans are at risk of chronic kidney disease and most people do not know their kidneys aren't working correctly until their symptoms are so advanced they need dialysis or a kidney transplant.

Chronic kidney disease can strike anyone, especially people with diabetes and high blood pressure, the 2 leading causes of kidney disease. Other risk factors for kidney disease include heart disease and a family history of kidney failure. If you have any of these risk factors, it's important

to be screened. This usually involves simple laboratory tests: a urine test to look for kidney damage, and a blood test to measure how well the kidneys are working.

Fortunately, you can be proactive in taking steps to avoid or delay kidney disease. A healthy lifestyle, including physical activity and a hearthealthy diet, can help to normalize blood pressure and prevent or manage diabetes. Here are just a few ways you can help keep your kidneys functioning at their optimal level:

Drink up. To dilute urine and keep kidneys clear of toxins in the body, drink two liters of fluid a day – about 32 ounces.

Shake the salt habit. Too much salt in your body requires your kidneys work harder to restore a balance of electrolytes and fluids. Consistently high salt levels damage kidneys and impair long-term kidney function. (The recommended daily salt intake is about one teaspoon – per day).

Limit over-the-counter meds. NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs) like Ibuprofen, Aleve, Advil, Celebrex, Motrin IB and

higher-dose aspirin don't pose a serious danger if your kidneys are healthy and if the medication is only used periodically. However, consistent, daily use of NSAIDs can cause kidney damage.

Monitor your blood pressure and sugar levels. High blood pressure and diabetes cause of kidney damage. Experts recommend that if you have diabetes, hypertension, if you are obese or have a family history of kidney disease, your kidney function should be regularly checked.

No smoking. Smoking can damage blood vessels and reduce the flow of blood to the kidneys, which prevents the kidneys from functioning properly. Smoking can also raise blood pressure and increase the risk of kidney cancer.

Exercise regularly. Staying physically fit helps keep your weight low and your blood pressure normal.

Eat a healthy diet. Fill your plate with plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables, lean meats, chicken, fish, nuts and whole grains. A nutritious diet will also keep your blood pressure and sugar levels in check.

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The Fishin' Hole

Spring is about sprung! In fact meteorological spring will have started by the time you are reading this. Meteorological Spring begins the first day of March as March is the month that contains the spring, or vernal equinox which marks the beginning of astronomical spring. This year it will be March 19th. I am only giving you all those details because there is a chance you've never heard of meteorological spring. A small chance, yes, but a chance nonetheless. I had never heard of Paczki Day until this past February 25th and it really weirded me out how everyone

was talking about it and I had never heard of it before. I don't want you reading the Fishin' Hole and feeling like I felt that day!

The fish and boat commission will be out stocking the local fisheries with trout this month. As always we here recommend you check their website for the day they are stocking your favorite spot and go out and volunteer to help the crews spread the fish around.

The daylight hours are growing rapidly here at the end of February and the local streams certainly have the look of waters that might produce fish but alas, the water temperatures for the most part are making the local non-trout bite very slow. As I have often noted here though, the joy of fishing comes from the fishing and not from the catching. The next to last weekend of February was an absolute beauty to be out on the stream even if the fish didn't want to cooperate. That's where friend of the Fishin Hole, Joe Balobeck and his daughter found themselves in late

February. Joe says while the catching wasn't great, he now KNOWS for sure where the fish will be when the water reaches a better fishing tem-

Of course, now is the time to get out and make sure your equipment is

all ready to roll. We soon have less than 50 days until the opening statewide of trout season here in Pennsylvania.

I have been studying the USGS (United States Geological Survey) gauges for fishing the tributaries for steelhead in Erie. While I do feel I am getting a handle on how they work, I am not ready to try and disperse that information to you in any usable way. Suffice to say I would still rely on my keen sense of how long ago was the last decent rain, could there be a big snow melt and run off, and might there be a lot of ice/slush flowing through the stream. Knowing from experience that upon things calming down, one day is all it takes for the streams to become fishable.

I promise I will have the understanding of those gauges on lockdown in my mind soon, and be able to give you parameters that might allow you to get onto the stream sooner than you might using the "it feels right" method that I currently ascribe. If I tried to keep that promise today though, you would feel like I did this morning when everyone and their mother was talking about Paczki Day. As I mentioned earlier, I don't want to give you that feeling. Keep those lines tight, and get ready for "first day". Send your pictures and plans for "first day" to samdhall@comcast.net . 

My Laughter History

I come from a family that laughs a lot. When I was 8 or 9, we got a record player. We had 2 old 78 records which we played over and over. One gave us Irish songs like Who Threw The Overalls in Mrs. Murphy's Chowder? The other was called Gossamer Wump; it gave us contagious laughter. I thought about Gossamer Wump when someone invited me, some years ago, to a Laughter Club in Pittsburgh. Such groups are based on laughing clubs in India, founded by Dr. Madan Kararia, who believed truly that laughter is the best medicine. Indeed, laughter strengthens our immune system, boosts mood, diminishes pain, and protect us from the damaging effects of stress. It also brings people together.

You can now become a certified laughter leader in what is called "laughter therapy." (Check out www.worldlaughtertour.com.) You can learn to laugh voluntarily, usually in a group, by starting with an exercise that triggers a laugh and then enjoy the contagion as the group laughs together.

For me, laughter really has been therapy. I remember exactly where I was when something made me laugh really hard, a few months after the death of my husband Gene. I had been in deep grieving for those months, and the belly laugh caught me off guard. I suddenly felt like rejoining the living.



As a follow up from a story in the November issue about the fire that devastated the church, the Sheraden Methodist congregation gathered together on a cold day in December for a group picture before the church was torn down. Plans are in the making for a new church to be built on the same corner of Chartiers Ave and Citadel Street in Sheraden.

It was about a month after the fire when a member of the congregation said to his mother, "Mom, we should get t-shirts with "SHERADEN STRONG" printed on them." He wanted them for the Sheraden Methodist Dartball Team. His mom said, "Good idea, but let's make sure the congregation each gets one." He then had the idea to sell them to help raise money for the fire fund.

After discussion with the owner of TeamSportswear, Mark Thompson, Mark suggested to make the "T" in STRONG a design as the symbol of the Cross.

Michael Maker, a fourth generation family member of the church is who came up with this entire idea and he even came up with the design himself. His mother, Sandy Maker, took it to Mark to get them printed as orders were being taken.

Michael works at the Crafton Giant Eagle and is a Special Olympic athlete participating in basketball, as well as other sports over the years. Michael has jumped into the cold icy waters for the Polar Plunge along with the Pittsburgh Police, Port Authority Police and other law enforcement officers to raise money for Special Olympics. He also takes place in the Torch Run to kick off the summer games that take place at Penn State, along with law enforcement. They start at PNC Park in Pittsburgh and go to Penn State. Michael is also very involved in church activities and functions. To this day, a total of 300 shirts have been sold throughout the community and beyond.

The church also has a "GOFUNDME" page "SHERADEN UNITED METHODIST CHURCHHELP US RISE UP FROM THE ASHES" and a Fire Fund (Sheraden United Methodist Church-Fire Fund) account at First National Bank to help raise money that the insurance may not cover.

The congregation is standing strong through the process of planning the new church and a place for the outreach programs they serve in the Sheraden community and surrounding areas. They ask for your prayers during this time and stand with them as they are "SHERADEN STRONG."

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
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Chartiers Creek Creative Grand Opening
