Summer Music and Service Opportunities

The God who invented music, and who Himself sings (Zeph. 3:17), has given us gifted hymn writers who've produced a rich treasury of hymns for the church. The following points are adapted and expanded from several blogs in which individuals wrote about why they love these songs.

- 1) Their Doctrinal Depth. In general (and yes, it is a generalization) our hymns with their multiple stanzas have more precise (and broader) doctrinal teaching in them than the choruses and contemporary songs some have come to use almost exclusively. Our hymns are therefore better suited to teach and edify—which our sacred music is to do (Col. 3:16).
- 2) Their Power to Witness. When we sing the fine hymns and gospel songs in our hymn books, it is a way of testifying to what we believe, and what we hold to be important.

Worship

It may well have been the hymn singing of Paul and Silas that prepared the heart of the Philippian jailor to receive Christ as Saviour (Acts 16:20-34).

- **3) Their Rich Poetry.** Again, there are exceptions with both types of church music, traditional and contemporary. But it remains true that our hymns more often contain sublime and soul-refreshing poetry. Even reading them, rather than singing them, gives us an enriching experience.
- 4) Their History. We don't always know about the writers of our hymns, or how particular songs came to be written, but often we do. And the stories can be inspiring. They remind us that these gifted individuals were real people, with real problems. Their songs often grew out of personal experience in their walk with the Lord, giving them the ring of authenticity that strikes a chord in our own hearts.
- **5) Their Timeless Quality.** This association with real life experiences gives our hymns a timeless quality. They can be sung with meaning by succeeding generations because they bring together biblical truth (which is unchanging) and basic human experience, which re-

mains the same in any age.




AT111: Prerequisite Course for All Leadership Track


AA201: Action and Advocacy Track




PDH201: Practical Divinity & Heritage Track



Five stories from the gospels reveal the generosity of God, the transforming power of Jesus' welcome, and offer a model for living and sharing God's hospitality.



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MUSINGS

I just had a birthday, an event not at all unique to myself, but it did cause me to reflect on my life in my mid 80's and what I hope for any future that I may be fortunate enough to enjoy. During the plague I sorted thousands of photos from my coming home from the hospital after I was born to the present. Among them were precious images of grand-and great-grand parents and lots of other relatives and memoires of the events of my life from grammar school to college, work and marriage, the many trips taken to five continents and 33 countries as well as all the states but Hawaii,

I had a very satisfying career and have been blessed with a happy marriage of 52+ years. More so, I and my birth family are very close and though I had no children of my own, my nieces and nephews and their progeny have been a source of love and delight. Equally I have loved and been beloved by some of the best friends anyone could hope for.

But as I age the frailties of a longer life daily remind me I have been around a while and I haven't the stamina of my youth. Also loss of those near and dear to me is more apt to happen. Change challenges my assumptions more and more and I grudgingly accept some and often futilely reject others. I was born on the cusp of WWII and have seen so many technological advancements (well, some I wonder if they are for the better). I well remember my first plane ride in a TWA propeller-driven airship. Now it is possible to ride rockets into space.

I grew up listening to the radio and playing vinyl records. I well remember having to ask the operator to dial a telephone number and waiting if my friend's party line was busy with another call (which we could listen in on!). Our first TV set, black and white, was in the 1950's. Now the world of communications, entertainment, or knowledge is available at the tap of a computer keyboard or a hand-held device. (FYI- if ever your cell phone gets drenched as mine recently was in a freak accident, put it into dry rice for a few days, then recharge it. Mine now seems good as new.)

Just as technology has changed, so have many social mores in my lifetime. White gloves and party manners devolved into such casualness in dress and civil interactions that it is more difficult to express or hold disparate attitudes about our national history, politics, human relations and more. Perhaps it has always been so the tensions between what a majority may assume or impose and the "Other," whomever that may be, whose viewpoint is different. In a recent sermon, Pastor quoted "God loves you for who you are, not what you do". That caused me to ponder: isn't what we do (or not do) a reflection of who we are? And isn't who we are often counter to what God would hope or expect for us to be? Or am I making a judgment here?

We have been fortunate to have a getaway place in Upper Michigan for over forty years where we can unwind and commune with chipmunks. We missed

getting there in 2020 but had a few weeks this summer to reconnect with our "second family" of church and social friends and to enjoy the quietude of the north woods. Pastor Dae Hwa and Young-Hoon and Theodore visited us there in August and we met some new neighbors in adjoining cabins on our lake. We did not turn on the TV, had no Washington Post but heard enough news on NPR to keep us reasonably informed. (We vowed to curtail our total immersion into the media since we found we did not miss it.)

We read a lot of books and enjoyed some local events.

The Trolls (people who live below the Big Mac Bridge over the Mackinac Straits separating upper and lower Michigan) came by the thousands over the summer to the dismay of many Yoopers (natives) and delight for many businesses, Earlier they had had relatively few Covid cases but the numbers were rapidly rising, putting strain on health care facilities. While most did not mask in that red part of the state, that may not last, even though many folks have been vaccinated.

I had much to celebrate this birthday and I hope I can enjoy many more. I shall try to make the most of every day granted to me and hope, despite what I may or may not do, I please God.

I wish the same for all of you.

Hiring New Director of Music

The Music Director will plan, rehearse, and operate the music ministry of the church, with special focus on the chancel (and children) choirs, praise band, and/ or handbell choir. The Music Director shall have the ability to play a pipe organ, keyboard, and piano. Ability to sing and accompany the choral groups is a bonus.

We hope to have the position filled by mid-November 2021.

Initial salary will be \$30,000 including paid combined leave for vacation and sick leave. After completion of a probationary period of three months, the salary will be evaluated.

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Leadership Team Meeting Summary—July 28, 2021

ATTENDING VIA ZOOM: Pastor Park, Chair Christiana Tumaku, Lay Leader Priscilla Michell, Treasurer Sunil Christopher, Trustees Carol Penne, Pat McConnell and Elizabeth Lewis, Evangelism Chair Elizabeth Sawyer, SPRC Chair Nathan Block, Finance Chair Andre Small, Finance Secretary Idowoo Boss-Cole, Philip Palmer Jr., Philip Sr. and Gladys Palmer, Saundra Craig, Ministerial Intern Admire Russell, Food Pantry Coordinator Paulette Brown, Secretary to Council Leilani McConnell

The meeting convened at 7:40 with a prayer from Paulette.

MINUTES – of the May 25 meeting was unanimously approved with one correction: Pastor's doctorate will be DMin not DDiv as stated previously.

REPORTS: Pastor performed a wedding in person on July 23. Over a hundred attended. Another wedding is pending and two more potential members.

On July 18 we welcomed a new member.

It is hoped that in September we can go back to being fully opened. However the Covid virus strains are still dangerous and causing an uptick in infection rates especially among the unvaccinated. Hence Pastor's hope that we might end the ZOOM sessions should, in the view of the majority, be put on hold. While there was some thought that stopping ZOOM would persuade members to attend in person, most felt that would not happen.

The church conference is set for Oct. 20. The Annual Conference is set for Oct.25-27. Reports are due by Oct. 01. An issue to be considered at AC is how to calculate Apportionments, It has been

proposed to refer to churches' spending in years 2017, 2018, and 2019 and divide by three to find average upon which the Apport. would be determined. The group had mixed reactions to this proposal because in '17 and '18 we were paying a full-time pastor which would increase our spending and somewhat skew our current obligation.

Pastor will be on leave Aug 03-15. Rev. Jones will be filling in.

MISSIONS — the Food Pantry will stay closed for a time yet while the Covid rages. However, many bring food donations and these are either given to stoppers-by who request help or passed on to Broad Acres School. Andre added that he has received food gift cards when collecting the Sunday offerings. These also may be doled out or passed on.

Leilani McConnell is Acting Chair and the group met at church recently to assess where we are and to make plans for the Christmas in July outreach which includes school supplies for our two Native American Schools' project. We have a list of desired items and they will be ordered for "drop shipping" on line. We also have initiated a "WE CARE" collection box for personal care items, school supplies, socks, etc that will be distributed to local entities such as Crossways Community or to the Ignace Indian Clinic in Milwaukee or the two Indian Schools. Meanwhile we have been collecting gift cards from Target or Kohls to give to Broad Acres School for parents to purchase clothing for kids back -to-school.

Philip Sr. said Adult Sunday school would also be meeting in the fall if the Covid plague abates and that during summer as many as 8 persons attended the 9AM sessions.

EVANGELISM — Elizabeth Sawyerr suggested two projects: a) an updated Church Directory with photos and b) Adopt-a-Pew for refinishing as they are badly scarred. As to a), Church Office Manager Wendy has been working on up-dating contact information and we agreed to go with that for the interim but we hope to work toward a photo directory in November. A planning committee will work with Elizabeth. There was a request that the Love Notes again include birthdays and anniversaries. It was suggested we consider a Membership Secretary

TRUSTEES – Carol reported that the county will be considering our parking situation, i.e., what limits we may be allowed to impose if any. We still have to seek input from the immediate neighbors to the south.



The problems with the AC has been partially resolved. The lack of cooling in the Office and Library areas continues. Our retainee Ron Shaw is continuing to work on it,

A request from Elizabeth Schneider to use the church for the Youth orchestra was denied for several reasons. The Jackson Bldg. entry doors have been repaired.

TREASURER - Sunil presented current Profit/

Loss and Balance Sheet information. In spite of low in-person attendance, we are in cautiously good shape. We have caught up with Apportionment payments and met mortgage payments. The latter is due for refi in 2028. We still need to consider where we can save money. There is some confusion re: the Verizon vs. Comcast contracts and the use of GS's domain name. There was concern about electronic donations in that those who use credit cards cost the church a fee which lowers the church's benefit. None the less it was suggested we put electronic withdrawal information up on the monitors when we ZOOM to encourage that form of donating. A line item in the Treasurer's report referred

to cemetery plots valued at \$3500. However we are not sure how many plots the church still owns. This is to be researched,

The forgiveness of the PPP loan the church took out in 2020 is being negotiated with Capital One.

SPRC – chair Nathan says they are working with one of our staff to resolves an issue but otherwise no news.

LAY LEADER – Priscilla had no report.

State of Church from Trustees - from Meeting Minute

Trustees in attendance: Dunstan Thomas (chairperson), Julius Campbell, Stuart Coxic-Barrios, Marcie Burroughs, Beresford Dakin-Davis (by phone), Vernice Lee, Pat McConnell, Bintu Murphy (Guest Church Coordinator), Rev. Dae-Hwa Park, Carol Penne (Secretary).

Guests from Comforter's House Chapel in attendance: Pastor Joseph Tsibuah, Pastor Abigail Asante and Kofi Asape Bedihko.

AGENDA:

Conversation with Comforter's House — Pastor Joseph, Assistant Pastor Asante and Head Usher Bedihko joined trustees to discuss matters of common interest and the upcoming renewal of their guest church contract. Comforter's House has been a guest in our building for eight years. Recently trustees have become increasingly concerned about the extra hours this congregation uses our building.

Action: Trustees will consider Comforter's request for additional hours but noted this could result in a significant rent increase.

Trash management – GS continues to experience problems with Waste Management, the company that handles our trash removal. Some weeks, their trucks have not been able to reach the trash bin because neighborhood vehicles are parked in the way. Other times, they haven't shown up. With pick-ups currently scheduled only twice each month, making sure the company comes regularly and can access the dumpster is important.

Action: Dunstan and Marcie will continue to work with the company to ensure pick-ups happen. Stuart will install another CCTV camera so we can monitor when the company is here. Parking concerns - GS received the petition from Montgomery County Traffic Operations Division that will allow the county to implement parking restrictions in the public right-of-way gravel area in front of the church along Mt. Pisgah Road. This petition identifies the addresses of neighbors on Mt. Pisgah and several houses adjacent to our property along New Hampshire Avenue who must give their approval – two thirds of our neighbors must approve the request. A concern about four trucks parking in our lot raised.

Action: Carol will forward the petition to Pat and Stuart who volunteered to talk with neighbors to solicit their approval. Marcie will follow up with the truck issue.

Additional hours for Agape church — Trustees granted Agape's request to extend their hours of worship, adding a two-hour service on Saturday evenings and also on the last Sunday of each month. Their rent was increased from \$1500 to \$2000.

Status of sanctuary air conditioning — Trustees have heard several concerns about the temperature of the sanctuary. Action: Pat will follow up with Seasonair to learn the outcome of their visit. Trustees concluded that the A/C season is nearing its end so no further adjustments will be made this year.

Around the Church

Status of phone system switch from Verizon to Comcast – In July, Beresford facilitated a cost-saving switch from Verizon to Comcast for telecommunication services. However, the church continued to receive large bills from Verizon. Carol followed up with Verizon and learned GS has a total of seven phone lines

Action: Beresford will contact Comcast to complete the system transfer. Comcast notified us they will hook the alarm system up to the internet without a phone line and establish a new fax line a small monthly fee (hopefully using the same telephone number). Other lines were terminated by Verizon. Needed: vice-chair and vice-secretary for 2022 –

Action: Vernice graciously volunteered to be vice-secretary (taking notes and drafting minutes). The search for a vice -chair continues.

Light bulb replacement -

<u>Action</u>: Dunstan thanked Stuart for replacing lightbulbs in the various candelabra in the sanctuary.

Recurring leak in Upper Room ceiling – After this week's heavy rain and storms, the leak has reappeared.

Action: Manuel of the Agape Church will assist trustees with repairs.

Plumbing upgrades – Dunstan and Bintu reported that a mutual acquaintance has been replacing and upgrading plumbing fixtures in several bathrooms in the building at no cost to the church except for parts.

Action: Carol will send a thank you from the trustees when the work is completed.

New tenants in Cottage in October -

The tenants of the cottage owned by Good Shepherd have given notice (job relocation). Silver River began the search for new tenants in early September.

<u>Postscript:</u> One of the current tenants elected to continue the lease.

Status of cell tower inquiry – Dunstan spoke with someone inquiring about the cell tower on the church steeple. The caller was not aware it had been dismantled several years ago.

Adding exterior security cameras — Stuart will add one additional security camera on the Mt. Pisgah side of the church.

Basketball hoop in the parking lot —
Vernice asked about a proposal to install a basketball hoop in our parking lot.

Trustees talked about safety concerns.

Action: Dunstan will relay trustees' concerns to Pastor Park.

The Women's Circles have not met for months and we all miss the close camaraderie just as we miss the weekly Fellowship Time after Sunday worship. We are grateful for technology that has enabled us to "attend" via internet streaming services, but we miss the face-to-face greetings, the hugs, the bustle of conversations and the food! We pray in the new year we may again enjoy them.

Several of us have gone back to church within the constraints imposed by the Covid pandemic and we thank Elizabeth Schneider for her efforts in resuming the Praise Band and Chancel Choir and those who are participating so far. We are also grateful to Pastor Park and the volunteers who facilitate the Sunday gatherings. (The rest of us, me and Patrick in particular, will continue to participate remotely for the time being, hoping for the anticipated anti-vaccine's availability.)

Lots of good works have happened while the church was closed and later when partly re-opened. Lots of "stuff" was cleared out and lots of refurbishing accomplished. Dunstan Thomas, Marcie Burroughs, Carol Penne, Idowoo Boss-Cole, Pat McConnell and a few others did most of this. Marcie in particular spent days happily painting. The Food Pantry, closed for months, was cleaned out and usable food items were given to Broad Acres School who gratefully accepted it.

Our traditional Mission projects, modified due to the pandemic, continued and as Advent approaches, we will support two Broad Acres families via gift cards rather than gifts.

While the women did not meet, I did attend two Church Women United events via streaming service, most recently on Nov. 06, "World Friendship Day". Items will be collected for Central Union Mission in DC and the Crossways Community in Kensington. (See reference after this article.)

We we have been mostly staying at home since March except for grocery or pharmacy runs, and we have stayed in touch with family and friends by telephone and ZOOM, and emails and snail mail.

I walk the neighborhood most days and have met lots of folks and their dogs who live near by. We all are frustrated by being inside so much and many who work are doing so from home. The teenagers we hired to do mowing are schooling at home, too.

I have gotten to know the streets of my community much better and I enjoy the colorful mail boxes and landscaping. Lots of Black Lives Matter signs and political signs (for only one of the candidates) and recently some cleverly carved pumpkins. We finally got some color in the trees before they lost their leaves. In summer I saw our small herd of deer quite often and on occasion red foxes.

Some days it is so quiet, just the odd twittering birds. More often the beltway noise and lately leaf blowers remind me we live in an urban area. I enjoy pondering the wet spots left on the tarmac after rains — they are like a Rorschach tests and my imagination is challenged.

Women's News

I was fascinated the other morning by watching a Disney-like dance of fallen leaves that had been picked up by a vortex of wind.

On one corner I pass frequently was a bed of black-eyed-Susans that bloomed nearly all summer. I regularly walk through the little undeveloped wooded lot down our hill that connects our street with the one to the east. (where I usually saw the deer). One day I was stopped by an elaborate spider web (and its creator) across the path so I had to invent a detour. I wonder how the spider gets the first strands connected from one end to the other, sometimes more than a foot apart. Do they jump? Do they swing? I may ask Wikipedia.

It has been hard not to be anxious or deeply depressed by the Covid and its effects on families and businesses and the stress of the recent election. Reading stories of lives well lived I see in the Washington Post, the outpouring of care and concern so many offer in response to the pandemic. has helped. I try to find something to laugh at or celebrate every day.

I am closer (via ZOOM) to my nieces and nephews and brother — we "see" each other Sunday evenings. We have plenty to eat, a steady retirement income, a house and access to books and picture puzzles and TV movies to amuse us. We have had need of medical help this year and are grateful for being able to access it and to the care and concern we received from those professionals. We lost a sister / sister-in-law and a few friends to eternal life but are grateful for their long lives and our place in them. And we are grateful for having church every Sunday.

I admit to wondering what God is up to with this virus and the animus the country is experiencing, et al, but I appreciate the insights Pastor shares with us every week and I apologize to God for doubting Him.

The world turns in spite of us and the elegant cycle of life goes on. We will soon acknowledge the major holidays. May we find joy in them even though we won't celebrate as usual.

Donations of moneys is also gratefully accepted.



The blue shade of the cross is consisted of the first two Greek letters of Christ, Xp. Through Christ the living water (John 7:38) the gathering of the faithful disci-

ples shall bear fruits that last. (John 15:16; Psalm 1:3; 23:2; Galatians 5:22-23; Revelation 22:1-3). This vision of God's Kingdom comes from Jesus Christ, the starting point of our faith journey. Shepherd crook symbolizes our commitment to Jesus Christ—Good Shepherd! (John 10:14)
