his summer will mark 1948 years since the destruction of the second temple. Each summer on Tisha B'Av we mourn this destruction and the loss of our beloved

Temple and center of the religious life of our people. Destroyed by the Romans in 70 CE, the site of the Temple has been administered exclusively by Jews for only three years since the years of the Bar Kokhba rebellion of 132 to 135 CE.

The ninth of Av has

also become the traditional day of mourning for all tragedies that have befallen our people since the destruction of the Temple. This is reflected in our Kinnot liturgy of Tisha b'Av, through which we not only mourn the destruction and exile caused by the demise of the first Temple and second Temple, but a myriad of tragedies since then as well, including the Crusades, the Chmielnicki massacres and the Holocaust.

In the Tisha B'Av amidah we recognize the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple by inserting a special prayer bemoaning the destroyed and lowly state of the Holy City of Jerusalem, desolate and uninhabited. But this description no longer seems appropriate. With the creation of the State of Israel, the victory of the six-day war and the reestablishment of Jerusalem as the eternal capital of the Jewish people, can we really describe Jerusalem in such sad and devastated terms?

In some religious Zionist circles this additional prayer has been edited to reflect the

more modern realities of our re-occupation and re-development of Jerusalem. After all, who can visit Jerusalem in these times and see it properly described as destroyed?

Of course, as Halachah generally favors conservation of

previous practice most congregations, including ours, still recite the older text. This is in no way intended to denigrate the wonders of modern Jerusalem, and yet we are left to wonder how we might defend our practice.

I would like to suggest that while our beautiful modern city of Jerusalem is among the proudest achievements of our people for thousands of years, and is now blessed as the capital of the sovereign Jewish state, the job is not yet done. While we are blessed with access to the Kotel we cannot in any way say that the Temple precincts have been restored to us. A suitable analogy would be someone who lost their home and their right to travel upon the street on which they used to live, but whose right to travel on the street and walk the sidewalk in front of the house has been restored. 



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Look how lucky we are!" This happens to be my Aunt Frannie's signature phrase and usually it involves us raising a glass of wine at one of Israel's fine wineries, or sipping an Iced Aroma on the beach of Tel Aviv or even when all of the family is gathered together for not just a special occasion but just being together. It may apply to my own joyous times but in thinking deeper this phrase has meaningful application to the Jewish people, the State of Israel and our own beloved Congregation Shaarey Israel.

It has been almost one year now since I took over being President and while not the easiest job I actually at times take comfort in the position as a break from the daily grind of working as an attorney for a Manhattan law firm. The reason is that it is an honor to help one another and particularly members of our Congregation and help to ensure that our shul remains a success in Rockland County and a source of comfort and inspiration to each other.

I say "Look how lucky we are" to live in the United States of America where we have freedom of religion and ability to practice our own beliefs without controversy. We take comfort in knowing that on any given day we have the right and the ability to walk into 18 Montebello Road and pray without fear and worship in the way that we see fit. Being a Jew is not an easy thing but here in America we certainly don't have the same worries that our brethren are experiencing every waking moment in places like Paris where the Jewish community is living with the stress of constant attacks and outward hostility/antisemitism from the local Muslim population which is growing at an alarming rate. I worry too personally about my friends who are really like family in Rome who tell me how nervous they are to be a Jew in Italy and have to think twice about going to shul on a holiday. I won't forget standing outside the Great Synagogue of Rome having attended a family wedding, wearing a kippah only to be The Scroll...4 approached by multiple friends

who "reminded" me to make sure to take off the kippah for my leisurely stroll back to my hotel just a few blocks away in the historic center of Rome. And of course now to hear that German Jews are being told that it is not safe to walk in the streets of Germany wearing a kippah.

I say "Look how lucky we are" to have a State of Israel. I feel this especially today since I am writing this on Yom Yerushalayim and the US is about to open the doors to its embassy in the Capital of Israel. With everything going on in the world and the struggles we face as Jews one thing is for certain and that we have a strong, proud State of Israel which truthfully is life insurance for Jews around the world. Israel has just turned 70 years old and for those of us lucky enough to have visited Israel we know that there is nothing like it in the world. What has been accomplished in the land of Israel since May 14, 1948 is astonishing. Israel's existence has nothing to do with luck but for thousands of years the Jewish people did not have a homeland. Our generations have the good fortune to be able to return to our ancestral home, even if just for a visit.

Finally and most importantly I say "Look how lucky we are" to have such a wonderful Congregation. Those who participate on a regular basis, especially those who attend Shabbat services faithfully know that we have something special. When we walk into the building on Saturday morning we know that we are not just coming to see our CSI friends but our "CSI family" There is a certain warmth and level of commitment to the Congregation and each other that is evident every week. We are lucky to have such a beautiful building, such a great staff and especially great clergy. Everyone has their struggles, whether it be health or financial or something else. Yet as a Congregation we have each other and we look out for each other.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian The Blank Page

ave you ever had the discussion of, "What is purgatory like?" I am not speaking in a religious sense, of course. I normally take that question to mean, "What do you really hate?"

Well, if there is a purgatory for writers, it would have to consist of a blank page, a keyboard, and then ... nothing. Writer's block is awful. It comes in two forms: The first is when you have the blank page in front of you and you have no idea what you want to write about. The second is when you know what you want to write about but the words don't come.

There are many suggested ways to combat this pernicious condition when it falls upon you. In fact, there is a website that lists no less than 14 different ways to combat writer's block. Wow, 14 different ways.

Heaven, on the other hand, would be a well thought out idea that just transforms from my brain into the computer. I have had times when I can sit down with an idea in my head and before I know it, my 1,200 words have been written and I feel like I have accomplished, created even, something special.

Obviously, I got to thinking about writer's block because I have been suffering from a pretty bad case of it. Until I decided to write about it, that is. But it did get me thinking about what we can do when we are clueless, when we are presented with a situation and the page of ideas on how to approach the issue remains blank.

Sometimes choices in a situation come down to "right" or "wrong." When the choices are clear, that is a great start. I am not saying that we will always choose the right path, clearly frequently people don't, but it helps to at least know what right is.

How do you determine what is "right" and what is "wrong?" Well, there are a few ways. When a choice is illegal, immoral, or fattening, that is probably an indicator that this might not be the right way to go. *Torah*, *Halacha* and Jewish



thought can be added to the mix as a guide as well. Whereas something may be perfectly OK from a legal, moral and caloric perspective, there may be *Halachic* objections.

These guides can be very helpful.

But, does that mean that something that is legal, moral, non-fattening and in keeping with *Halacha* is always right? Of course not. That would depend on the particular situation. If a choice meets all "objective" criteria, we still have a judgement to make and that is based on what we feel the outcome of a choice might be. Something that can have a negative effect, be it on ourselves or others, may not be the right choice for that situation.

Then, of course, there is the toughest circumstance to endure: When there are no right or good choices. Life can be that way sometimes. Life can, and all too frequently does, present us with problems that have no good solution. No matter what we do, either we or someone we love will be hurt or some other negative effect will occur. This is the worst situation to be in. We can run all the religious, moral and legal tests we want and there will still be no objectively right course of action.

Our minds tend to reject that type of situation. What do you mean there is no right action? What do you mean that I cannot solve the problem? In our own minds we are frequently

arrogant enough to believe that we *should* be able to come up with a heretofore unthought of choice that will magically solve everything in the right way.

Unfortunately, that is not how it works. Sometimes, there just are no good choices.

So, what can we do when we have that "decider's block?"

I wish I had a hard and fast rule for you but I do have some suggestions:

First, make a three column document. You can do it on a piece of paper or on a computer. In the first column, list all your potential choices, regardless of how stupid or far-fetched they may seem. In the second column, try to list the pluses for every choice. Why is this a good choice? What benefit does it bring? What might your expectations be of taking this course of action? In the third column, write down all the potential negatives you can think of.

When you're done, put the paper away. If you can get a night's sleep before you look at it again, all the better, but it should be put away long enough to allow your mind to get away from the problem.

After a period of time, pick up the piece of paper (if it's a computer document, I recommend you print it out) and review it. Make any changes you feel you need to. When you're done, try to use the list to pick the best (or least bad) choice.

If you are not the only one involved in the decision, it might not be a bad idea for everyone to do this and then for the group to review what they came up with. At the end of the day, your choice will come from the combined list.

Now, here comes the hard part. Once you have made your choice, accept that things may not go

like you expect them to. Accept that you are going to make the best decision you can but you are not always in control of the consequences. Do not allow "doing the best I can" to become a source of guilt.

There is a story of the Chassidic master, Rabbi Zusha of Anipoli. When he was on his deathbed, his chassidim found him in tears and they could not comfort him. They said to him, "Why do you cry? You were as wise as Moses and as kind as Abraham." He responded, "Because G-d will not ask me why I wasn't as Moses or as Abraham. He will ask me why I was not as Zusha!"

We all have our gifts and G-d made each and every one of us as we are. He doesn't expect us to be perfect nor can we be. We are flawed and, no matter what we do, we will make choices that may not turn out as we would like them to. We will make mistakes and take wrong turns. Sometimes, our miscues are avoidable but frequently they're not. G-d only asks us to be the best we can be.

When you are presented with that blank decider's page, make the best choice you can and leave the rest to him. To put it bluntly, cut yourself some slack. Be kind to yourself. If we do our best, I truly believe that is what G-d would want us to do.

As exciting as it is to see our house from the street, and as much as it jogs our memory of the home in front of us, as long as we cannot enter into the home itself our sorrow remains mostly unresolved. The places where we stand in front of the Kotel were at one time a commercial boulevard bordering on the Temple, in and of themselves having no religious significance.

While we are blessed to be able to stand at the Kotel and pray for ourselves, our loved ones and the Jewish people, without access to the Temple mount itself the job of restoring our religious center is not yet done. Were we to enjoy the same rights of religious access to holy sites as we have granted to others, can we imagine the power of standing on the very sight of the Temple to pray, to receive blessing and to celebrate our nation and religion? Yes, Jerusalem is no longer devastated and disgraced, but as an inspiration for the Jewish people and a place of worship it remains devastated by its caretakers and its Jewish history disgraced by them as well.

As we progress to the end of two millennium of occupation of our holiest city and site, we look forward to the day when the ninth of Av is transformed, as the Talmud predicts, from a day of mourning to a day of celebration. May this be the will of G-d, amen.


