Then and Now

A s needed, we see patients from as early as 1 month until age 18. Once admitted to



the Clinic, we make a commitment to their care.

Here is one of our regular patients, Vivian Gastelum Ochoa. Above she is 1 year, 9 months. She was in our **Orthotics**



Department to be casted for ankle-foot orthoses (AFOs) to stabilize her ankles.

Today Vivian is age 8 and still wears AFOs. She lives in Nogales, Son.



We saw Luz Dyan Hernandez when she was 15 months old. Her mother had her bundled up from the cold as they waited their turn to enter the Clinic in February, 2004.

Today, Luz is 9 years old. She lives in Nogales, Son. She is a patient in the **Orthopedics Department.**

Luz has osteogenesis imperfecta, more commonly known as "brittle-bones" disease. Because her bones break easily, the doctors put rods in her long bones to stabilize them. She has had surgery at one of our Shriners Hospitals.

Luz was at our December, 2011 Clinic and received a teddy

bear as a gift from students at Sts. Peter & Paul Catholic School, Tucson.

She has been doing very well, and her prognosis is good.

As with all of our patients, Vivian and Luz have received their medical care free of



charge. Our funding comes from individual donors, corporations, religious groups, community groups, and foundations. The surgeries at Shriners Hospitals are free to us, but The Clinic must pay for transportation for our patient and one parent. With today's air prices and our need to fly on short notice depending on surgery schedules, 2 round-trip fares (Tucson to Spokane or Sacramento) can easily cost \$1,500.

Cleft Palate/Cleft Lip Update

e had an excellent Cleft Palate/Cleft Lip Mission at CIMA Hospital in Hermosillo, Son. in October, 2011. Photos of those patients will be posted on our web site next month.

Below is a photo of America Gamaz at 6 months. She had



just had cleft palate surgery. Some time later, she had cleft lip surgery, and her lovely smile below shows what a beautiful job the surgeon did.



America is now 6 yrs. old. She lives in Nogales, Son. She comes periodically to The Clinic to work with a speech therapist in our **Speech and Language Department**.

Emilio Hernandez has had both cleft palate/cleft lip surgeries at our annual Mission in Hermosillo, Son.

The photo below was taken before surgery in 2009 when Emilio was 2 years old. He was a little afraid.

Below, Emilio is shown in our **Speech and Language Therapy**



Department. Like America, Emilio will continue speech therapy as needed until he is 18 years old.

Today Emilio is 4 years old. He lives in Nogales, Son.



Thanks to our Cleft Palate/ Cleft Lip Mission both of these children will grow up without being stigmatized because of their looks.

Patients Need Different Services

Brandon Gastelum, age 9, is one of our epilepsy patients. He wears a helmet to protect his head when he has a seizure.



At the December Clinic, he was seen in the **Nutrition Department** for nutritional advice. Brandon lives in Nogales, Son.

María Fernanda Allela, age 7, is a patient in the **Orthopedics Department**. Because she is



severely spastic, she cannot feed herself. Her father, José Allela, feeds her while she waits to see her doctor.

Dario de Jesús Millanes Laguna, is 5 years old. She lives in Huatabampo, Son. Her town is in the southern part of the state, and transportation takes about 8 hours to The Clinic.

Casey Cootu of Hangar Prosthetics & Orthotics, Tucson, fits Dario with posterior braces for foot drop. Casey is a certified



prosthetist and a volunteer in our **Orthotics Department.**

Jesús Gonzales, age 7, wears a hearing aid. He is a patient in



our **Audiology Department** and lives in Magdalena, Son.

Bianey Madrid-Gil, age 11, has new glasses in the **Vision Department**. Patients can have one pair of glasses per year unless medically needed more often. Frames are donated to us so our cost is about \$30 for each pair of glasses.

Bianey's sister, Estefania, is also a Clinic patient. She has cerebral palsy.



Patients Need Different Services

Daniela Moreno, age 12, is being fitted into a new special wheel chair by one of



our therapists in the **Physical Therapy Department**.

Wheel chairs are child-size and custom fit depending on the child's needs. Cost of a specialized wheel chair can average \$2,000 or more.

Alessa Paulina Noriega Galaz (on the right) is 6 years old and lives in Hermosillo, Son. She is a patient in the **Orthopedics Department**.

Alessa has spina bifida and has no movement from her waist down. She wears ankle-foot orthoses (AFOs) to stabilize her feet and uses a wheel chair. The AFOs cost about \$750 for both feet and must be refitted as she grows.





Guadalupe Cortez, age 12, holds her prosthesis as she waits for the prosthetist to adjust it. She is a patient in the **Orthotics Department** and lives in Nogales, Son.

Dr. Glattke was instrumental in acquiring our Audiology Trailer

as a donation from the Sertoma Club of Tucson. The trailer is 40'x8' with 2 (6'x6') sound-proof testing rooms, central waiting/examining room, and restroom. It is equipped with a wheel chair lift, air conditioning, and furnace.

The trailer provides a quiet place to test and evaluate hear-

ing. Before the trailer, testing was done in one of the rooms of the Church where we have our clinic. With 200-250 patients each month, there was not a quiet place to be found.
