From the Desk of Rabbi Daniel Polish

"Let All Who are Hungry Come and Eat"

Dear Friends,

I am one of those people who wholeheartedly believes that Reform Judaism is the approach closest to the heart of what Jewish tradition has always been. I think the people who badly misunderstand Jewish tradition are the ones who imagine that Judaism has always been

static, and unchanging. In fact Judaism has always evolved, changed to reflect the times and places that the Jewish people found themselves. It is an organic thing: growing always in the process of becoming. The greatest proof of Jewish tradition's adaptability and responsiveness to changed realities is the Pesach Haggadah we will be using at our Seder tables this month.

The Haggadah has evolved over time. And more significantly it has been adapted to changing realities of the Jewish people's life. New prayers and readings have been added in every generation. In our own time, during the Shoah very dark Haggadot were written that related that awful time to the destructive oppression of Egypt, and the Pharaoh to our own oppressors. When Israel was born, new Haggadot were created that celebrated that miracle and connected that new deliverance to the redemption promised in the Haggadah. The Haggadah almost invites us to modify it and apply it to the realities of our situation.

After all the Seder is all about making the experience of the exodus our own. We read ourselves into history. As the Haggadah itself says, "in every generation every Jew should regard themselves as if they themselves went out of Egypt", and "it is because of what the Lord did for <u>me</u> when <u>L</u>went out of Egypt" What William Faulkner wrote is especially true for us: "the past is not dead, it is not even past". For us history is immediate, contemporary. What the Seder is about is this moment. Our ancient story is about right now.

So this year I want to note that there is a strange omission from the Haggadah. There is no mention whatever in the Seder ritual of the lesson that is taught most regularly in the Torah. What does the Torah learn from the Exodus? "A stranger you shall not oppress, because you know the heart of the stranger, seeing that you were strangers in the land of Egypt", repeated scores of times. For the Torah itself that is the great "takeaway" from the experience. In the Haggadah? Not a word. We would do well to set that omission right.

So this year I urge us all to help our Haggadah evolve. Find a reading—or better yet, more than one reading—that helps us meditate on the meaning of the exodus. Make it part of your Seder to remember that we were strangers. We were oppressed. We know the heart of all those who are oppressed, marginalized, all those who are strangers. Pesach is the time to remind ourselves that we stand with them, not against them. We invite them in ("let all who are hungry come and eat") not shut them out. Let us use our Sedarim to rededicate ourselves to the lesson of our history that the Torah teaches so emphatically.

May your Pesach be meaningful and joyous, your sedarim sweet. Chaq Sameach, Rabbi Daniel Polish

Notes from Cantor Gail Hirschenfang

BEYOND DAYENINU

One of my earliest memories of Passover was going down to the basement with my mom to retrieve the "Pessadick" dishes, both meat and dairy, to put on our newly cleaned kitchen. These dishes were kept in barrels. Every plate, pot, pan and piece of stemware was carefully wrapped in newspaper,

dated a year earlier. Each year we would go through this painstaking task and make sure every nook and cranny of our kitchen was clean enough to welcome the new Passover. We would gather all our chummatz and my dad would take us to the Roslyn duck pond where, for the most part, we fed the leavened bread products to the ducks. How we all laughed watching three ducks trying to fight over a bagel! The house was ready and the preparations for the seder were about to begin. As I go through a similar ritual each year in my own home, now I do a "chummatz hunt" with my grandchildren. They are quite meticulous about the search and we usually give away applicable leavened products to a local soup kitchen as no duck pond is nearby.

Anyone who has ever made a seder knows that it can virtually be a re-enactment of the slavery experience itself. There are many courses, and the dietary challenges of special recipes for Passover, or modifying existing ones, can be quite rigorous. However, I would like to challenge all of you this year to engage in MUSICAL PREPARATIONS for your seder. We all know and enjoying singing "Dayeninu" but there are so many more musical opportunities for everyone t join in, regardless of their level of Hebrew or familiarity with the seder. In today's world there are so many teaching tools for Jewish celebrations and the seder is no exception.

Statistical studies indicate that attendance at the Passover seder is one of the most actively engaged rituals for American Jews. Perhaps it is because it is a home ritual that involves family and tradition. Perhaps it is because the food is delicious or perhaps it is a compelling celebration of redemption from slavery to freedom. Whatever the real motivator, the seder is something special and, I'd like to suggest, we provide as much attention to its liturgy and music, as we do to the seating arrangements and menu. The liturgy of the seder (meaning, 'order') is essentially fixed but there are so many Haggadot available that you can fashion your seder in any way you deem to be appropriate for your family. There are Haggadot that shorten the seder, ones that are written with greater explanation for the seder novice, ones that have a particular philosophical leaning (such as feminism, universalism or Zionism), but the basic components of the seder are usually present. Much of what we sing for the seder are fixed texts that have been written expressly for this liturgical experience but many of the song texts come from psalms or other traditional sources. An entire section of the seder encompasses the Hallel, psalms of praise and thanksgiving. One of the most special of these psalms includes the text, "B'tzeit Yisraeil", "When Israel left Egypt", most appropriate to this night when we relive the exodus as if it happened to us. In fact, one of the very first things we sing at the seder, is in fact, the 'order' of the service: "Kadeish, Urchatz", which is a musical rendering of the 14 sections of the seder.

I would like to introduce you to some of the many musical resources for Jewish music. If you go to any of these sites you should be able to find more than ample materials for Passover. They contain in most cases, CDs for Passover, and in some cases, sheet music as well. One excellent resource is SEDER SONGS by Transcontinental Music. This is particularly helpful because the sheet music comes with 2 accompanying CDs- one with the music sung and one as a 'music minus one" CD if you become proficient. This is an excellent teaching tool and also includes several songs for children (and adults) that we have come to love (including the beloved Frog Song). 

by David Laskin

An Amazon Best Book of the Month, October 2013: Every writer, established or aspiring, has at one time or another looked around and decided, "My life would make a great book." Some of them are sadly mistaken. But journalist David Laskin's life--or rather that of his forbears, three generations of a Russian Jewish family originally named HaKoen--has made a fantastic book. Despite its name, *The Family* is not about the Mafia, or the Mansons, but really about one particular, ordinary/extraordinary twentieth century shtell clan. But you don't have to be Jewish to be fascinated by the six children of a Torah scribe on the western fringe of the Russian empire; they, like people everywhere, were buffeted by political and social and economic upheavals of their times. One branch of the family ended up in America as the prosperous founders of Maidenform lingerie; another repatriated to Israel; the third suffered the Holocaust. While I tended to favor the stories about the American branch (how can you not love a 4' 11" Russian revolutionary, who, with her husband Wolf, invented the brassiere in 1924 and got filthy rich in ladies underwear in the depression?), the other HaKoensturned-Cohens provided plenty of educational entertainment as well. You think you know about the Russian revolution? Try seeing it through Laskin's ancestors' eyes. Likewise, WWII and Zionism. This is a great, big-hearted book about how time and place modifies family, whatever or wherever its roots. --*Sara Nelson*
