First Reading: Ezekiel 34:11-12. 15-17

You, my flock, I judge between sheep and sheep.

The Lord says this: I am going to look after my flock myself and keep all of it in view. As a shepherd keeps all his flock in view when he stands up in the middle of his scattered sheep, so shall I keep my sheep in view. I shall rescue them from wherever they have been scattered during the mist and darkness. I myself will pasture my sheep, I myself will show them where to rest - it is the Lord who speaks. I shall look for the lost one, bring back the stray, bandage the wounded and make the weak strong. I shall watch over the fat and healthy. I shall be a true shepherd to them.

As for you, my sheep, the Lord says this: I will judge between sheep and sheep, between rams and he-goats.

The Word of the Lord

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 22:1-3, 5-6. R. v.1

R/ The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:20-26.28

He will hand over the kingdom to God the Father, so that God may be all in all.

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order: Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him. After that will come the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, having done away with every sovereignty, authority and power. For he must be king until he has put all his enemies under his feet and the last of the enemies to be destroyed is death. And when everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will be subject in his turn to the One who subjected all things to him, so that God may be all in all.

Gospel Acclamation: Mark 11:9.10

Alleluia, Alleluia! Blessings on him who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessings on the coming kingdom of our father David. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

He will take his seat on his throne of glory, and he will separate men one from another.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me." Next he will say to those on his left hand, "Go away from me, with your curse upon you, to the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you never gave me food; I was thirsty and you never gave me anything to drink; I was a stranger and you never made me welcome, naked and you never clothed me, sick and in prison and you never visited me." Then it will be their turn to ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help?" Then he will answer, 'I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me.' And they will go away to eternal punishment, and the virtuous to eternal life.'



Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, A 21st - 22nd November 2020

Whatsoever you Do the Least of my Brethren...

On this last Sunday of the Church's liturgical year, the Feast of Christ the King, we hear the Gospel about the Last Judgement. It is not just about a future event in history, but it is about the very core of being a disciple of Jesus Christ today. The Gospel challenges each one of us and our Catholic community to remember that Christian life is never self-centred. God is love and our Christian life must reflect that love. As Christians we cannot be indifferent about or uninterested in those around us, especially those who are marginalised.

We have to remember that the judgement is not about how we respond to rules and norms. Rather, it is primarily about how we respond in love to the God who is love. The judgment is about love. We will be judged by how we have loved, especially about how we have loved not just those who are dear to us but by how we have loved the most marginalised, the people with whom we would often not normally have any contact.

In the Gospel Jesus lists those who in his own time were the most marginalised: those who suffered hunger or thirst, the naked, the strangers, the sick and those in prison. The list is not much different from those marginalised in our times: we can think of those who hunger and are without nurture, physical or spiritual, or those who thirst for meaning and hope in the confusion of our world. We can think of those who are exposed with little cover and protection to the rough elements of our times, not just climatically but also economically, or emotionally.



We can think of those who are treated as strangers, when they do not fit into how we define the categories of respectability and being like ourselves. We can think of those who are physically in prisons and those who are trapped in the many prisons of human suffering or oppression or anguish or addiction.

These are the "least

brothers and sisters" with whom Christ identifies himself. When we reach out to them because of our love for God, we encounter Christ himself who is in them. On a deeper level, if we want to know who God is, we should not turn to the powerful but to the least of Christ's brothers and sisters. The poor and the marginalised reveal to us who God is.

Christ our King

Understanding today's Feast of Christ the King may be particularly challenging. While we may not have a direct experience of kings or royalty, we have some sense of what these mean. We know that royalty have sovereignty over their kingdom. We know that those who are subjects to royalty offer them allegiance and honour. Christ is King in a way that is different from traditional understandings of royalty. Christ's kingship extends to all places, all people, and all times. Christ manifests his kingship through his death on the Cross, in which he offers salvation to all.



Did you Know?

- The 'Son of Man' is a title that is often used of Jesus in the gospels. Scholars still debate the precise meaning of this title and whether Jesus used it of himself. The term, as used in the Book of Daniel, has messianic overtones; that is, it is used as a title for the Messiah.
- Service has always been at the heart of the church's work. Traditionally, the 'corporal works of mercy' are loosely based on Jesus' words in this gospel and include feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. See The Catechism of the Catholic Church, §2447.
- The church also identifies 'spiritual works of mercy' (see CCC, §2447) as 'instructing, advising, consoling, comforting, forgiving and bearing wrongs patiently.'
