MANHATTAN JEWELER REPORTS DISTRACTION THEFT

A retail antiques and estate jewelry dealer on the Upper West Side of Manhattan reported the following incident.

On Sunday, April 12th, 2015, at approximately 5:00 PM, a well-dressed Hispanic couple in their 40's or 50's entered the store with a 19-20 year old female whom they claimed was their daughter. The couple was wearing a lot of jewelry and started talking about using cash to make purchases before any items were even selected. They later asked about a "law-away" plan which seemed to contradict their statements about paying cash.

They asked to see numerous items in a locked wall-display case. When they left about 7 items were missing. Their method was simply to distract the sales associate and reach into the open case. Small pill boxes and large gold charms were among the items taken.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS - DISTRACTION THEFTS CAN BE PREVENTED

- 1. All staff should be trained to show only one item at a time
- 2. Showcases should be re-locked while showing an item
- 3. Odd behavior, such as offering to pay cash before any items have been selected, contradictory statements, or asking to see "the most expensive" watch or earrings that you have, should raise a red flag and cause your staff to be suspicious. Once the suspicion is triggered, the staff should immediately implement a stricter security protocol which includes, asking for more help on the sales floor and asking the customer to show ID before removing any items from the showcase.
