Thoughts on Insanity & Holiness

he recent shootings in El Paso, Texas and Dayton, Ohio, are a major concern for all thoughtful citizens of our nation. These acts of violence cast a long shadow, and all of us feel a sense of sadness, confusion, frustration, and loss over these seemingly senseless acts of evil.

The weekend after these shootings, the *Wall Street Journal* carried an extended article about the rise of White Supremacism as one of our nation's most significant terrorist threats. All of us have heard many words in many different places about racism — and everyone seems to blame everyone else

for fueling racist tension in our country. Though racism appears to have been a driving force in the El Paso shooting, there is another factor fueling hatred and anger that was mentioned in the article — a new word for my vocabulary — that word is "incel" — which can be defined as "involuntary celibates" — members of an online subculture who define themselves as unable to find a romantic or sexual partner despite desiring one. These young men who identify as incel feel justified in attacking women since they feel they have been mistreated or rejected by them.

This reference to incels caused me to think of another shooting which happened here in California in 2014 – and I wrote the following article in response to it – and I decided to share that article again today since the 'incel' movement seems to be a growing movement in the subculture of hate-groups.

On the night of May 23rd of 2014, Elliot Rodger went on a mass killing spree in Isla Vista near the University of California, Santa Barbara. The Alpha Phi sorority house was singled out in the attack. This got my attention since my mother and my sister, Leslie, were both members of the Alpha Phi chapter at UCSB many years ago. Elliot's rampage left six people dead and seven others injured. Only hours before he would open fire, Rodger posted a chilling manifesto titled "Retribution," that detailed his plans to attack and what drove him to such a violent act. The 22-year-old student ranted about how he would "punish" women for their mistreatment of him.

"College is the time when everyone experiences those things such as sex and fun and pleasure," Elliot said in his video. "But in those years I've had to rot in loneliness. It's not fair. You girls have never been attracted to me. I don't know why you girls aren't attracted to me. But I will punish you all for it."

Many reporters and analysts have labeled Elliot Rodger as insane. From what we can tell, he was intelligent, wealthy, and physically attractive. Yet there was something terribly wrong with this young man's mind and perhaps more importantly, his soul.

As I thought about the philosophy of life represented in Elliot Rodger's statements, it occurred to me that his views are at the opposite end of the spectrum from the views we seek to cultivate in the body of Christ.

Instead of seeking God, Rodger made an idol of pleasure. Instead of viewing sex as a gift from God to be experienced in the covenant of a loving marriage, Rodger saw sex as a 'right' that he deserved to receive from women without the need for love or commitment. Instead of protecting and preserving God's precious gift of life, Rodger took life away from others. Instead of giving thanks to God in worship, Rodger was consumed with covetousness. Instead of developing a personal relationship with God to bring guidance and comfort in life's struggles, Rodger played God himself and fell into lonely despair.

As I read about Rodger's ranting the verse that came to mind was Philippians 3:18-20:

"18 For many, of whom I have often told you and now tell you even with tears, walk as enemies of the cross of Christ. 19 Their end is destruction, their god is their belly, and they glory in their shame, with minds set on earthly things. 20 But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ." (ESV)

Though Rodger appeared to me to be insane, his insanity must be seen in its cultural context. Sadly, our culture nurtures the viewpoints taken to an extreme by Elliot Rodger. The modern entertainment industry in its myriad venues proclaims a clear value system — a value system that replaces God with humanity. One that replaces commitment with recreational sex. In

this value system, pleasure is placed high above holiness or righteousness. Entitlement is placed high above obligation. The result is that the entertainment industry nurtures covetousness and undermines gratitude. The message is that there is no God to serve and thank – instead there is just you – and everyone else has it better than you do.

Our goal in the body of Christ is to grow people into holiness. We call people out of darkness into the light. We call them to self-control, gratitude, worship, community, and especially love. We call people to draw near to Jesus Christ because apart from Him we are prone to idolatry, loneliness, despair, and hatred.

My word to Elliot Rodger: The goal of life is not the pursuit of pleasure – it is the pursuit of God. You are lonely because you have rejected God or perhaps your parents failed to teach you about God. Women are not here for your pleasure. They are here as God's gift for divinely ordered covenantal partnership. You have focused on what you think the universe owes you - this is called covetousness and it is a sin. Try giving thanks for what you have, and stop playing God yourself so you can get to know the real God who loves you and sent his Son to save you from your meaningless existence. Your god is your own appetite. You are starving your soul to death. Repent and come to Jesus and discover the true meaning of your life.

Most young people do not act out their despair in deeds of violence. But sadly, many of them live in the same warped value system that Paul the Apostle describes in Philippians 3:18-19, "as enemies of the cross of Christ ... whose god is the belly." Let us continue to bear witness to the light of Christ wherever we go, and may the good news of Jesus turn many people back from the path of destruction. Amen.

As we begin a new school year at Trinity Christian School (TCS) — I think of the mission and ministry of Trinity

s I sit here in my office, trying to put the Press together, I am reflecting on how God is always at work in this place.

As I work, Don Axe is cooking some amazing food for the small group leader dinner happening this evening. Tonight we kick off a new year of growing! Kirk Drummond, our Discipleship Elder, is passionate about bringing us into a deeper walk with God and each other. This passion runs deep in me as well. Most of you see the missions side of my heart, but seeing our church dig deeper into the Word, get to know more and more of who Jesus is, and bring that heart knowledge to our church family and the world around us, is what I pray

for on a daily basis. I love how God moves in small groups, as we learn to love each other, love God more, and move to show that love to the world around us.

Along with the wonderful smells from the kitchen, there is a small group of unique believers sitting out on the benches, eating their lunch. They are from Wycliffe Bible Translators (Trinity Church supports Mary Hopkins, who is also with Wycliffe).

This group is part of a brand new direction for Wycliffe. The majority of languages that have yet to have any translation of the Bible are spoken in areas of the world where it is forbidden to be a Christian, where war and conflict are constant, and where

there is deep distrust of foreigners.
All of these situations put the Wycliffe translation staff in grave danger, including the native speakers who are assisting in the translation work.

Most of these areas also have large numbers of refugees fleeing war or persecution. This flight is called Diaspora, and it is with these Diaspora people groups that Wycliffe now has a new vision. Believers, like those who met together here at Trinity Church this week, are working to use these Diaspora native speakers to help with the translation of the Scriptures into languages desperate for the Gospel. The work of translating can be done in a safer, more open environment.

We Celebrate 50 Years Serving God on the Hill

rinity Christian School (TCS) is starting its 50th year of outreach to the community!

Maintaining the facility and grounds is an important part of good stewardship. Over the summer, several facility upgrades were made including carpet replacement for several classrooms, middle school roof repairs, clearing overgrowth and weeds, leveling areas for the installation of security fencing, repairs of several doors, restrooms, and drinking fountains, and, most happily, installation of solar panels.

Each year, we host a welcome dessert night for the new families coming to Trinity Christian School. It will be held on Thursday, August 29th at 6:30 p.m. in Williams Hall. Staff and families have a chance to meet before the busy year begins. There is a general orientation and the opportunity to chat informally. In addition, our traditional Meet-and-Greet event will be held on Tuesday, September 3rd, following Labor Day. Families will arrive on campus around 5:00 p.m. to locate their children's classrooms

and deliver their student's supplies. The families then gather on the grass quad to enjoy a barbecue picnic. On September 4th, a mandatory schoolwide parent Back to School evening is held at 6:30 p.m. This event starts in Williams Hall with a general orientation followed by dismissing parents to attend classroom meetings with their student's teachers.
