n two days from this writing my wife and I will fly to Israel via Zürich. The

trip to Israel we have made many times, thank G-d, and as always there's a certain amount of preflight anxiety. I speak not of the anxiety of packing and being certain to remember contact lens solution, ear plugs in case my Airbnb has noisy

neighbors, and loading a book onto my tablet that I can read on the plane – these mundane matters create anxiety no matter where I'm going. Nor am I concerned about the safety of my flight. Rather I am anxious about Israel and Switzerland, although for different reasons.

I love visiting Israel. Along with our deep historical and religious connection, I always feel a sense of pride at any moment where Jews are comfortable about being Jews no matter what they're doing. Whether it's driving a taxi, selling spices in the *shuq* or flying a fighter jet, it is an endless source of pride for me when a Jew feels comfortable and secure about being openly Jewish. I look forward to saying *Shabbat Shalom* to my taxi driver on Friday afternoon as he drives me to the Kotel, of saying *Shabbat Shalom* to the spice merchant who delights in enhancing my Shabbat, and of saying *Shabbat Shalom* to every

soldier I see protecting my people.

those moments of intolerance and irresponsibility that seem to find me (of course, because that's what matters to me most - being tolerant and responsible). I fear the moment that in someone else's mind I am not holy enough for my

Shabbat Shalom to be answered (even though I have never encountered an Arab who would not reply to my greeting of sabach al cher, good morning). I fear those moments when those in control of state-sanctioned religion devalue the rights and contributions of Jews who do not believe "correctly enough". And while my faith in G-d and our IDF is strong, as I look to the west of Jerusalem or the north of the Galil or east from Tzefat I am unsettled by the proximity of madmen and their weapons.

Still and all, my time in Israel is always a joyous one. I revel in the modern miracle that is the revival of the Jewish nation, its strength and its diversity, and its democratic institutions.

There is a second fear, perhaps remote but still real. On our return flight we have the opportunity to spend a few hours in Zürich.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Congregation Shaarey Israel's Membership Campaign. While there is no formal meeting and no formal committee meeting I have just appointed each and every reader of this article as an official member of the membership committee. Being a member of this committee just as being a member of the synagogue is a commitment. My task to every member of the committee is to find one new member. Just think about it. If every person reading this article brought one new member we would have explosive growth. That growth comes with no expenditure of monies, no advertising, no mailings just the desire of each and every one of us to make our shul even greater and certainly larger than it is at present.

One thing we have is a great product. Another thing we have is the desire to be better. Take these two things and go out and sell. Question now you ask is "Why does someone want to join?" and here members, of the committee, are the talking points:

- 1. We are an active vibrant community of like-minded Jews (I know that like-minded Jews can be a difficult concept to grasp but hang with me for a minute).
- 2. When it's warm outside its nice and cool inside and when it's cold outside it's nice and warm inside (as long as no one plays with the air conditioning settings).
- 3. Daily minyanim. This is a critical selling point and one which we have to ensure among ourselves we continue to support. There is a time and place where each and every one of us needs and wants that minyan. Help each other out, show up for minyan and remind everyone that our shul is there for those that need to say Kaddish or just want the comfort of praying together.
- 4. Programming and that means monthly Friday night dinners (go find a kosher restaurant in the tri state area where you can get a three course meal with extras including wine for \$30 a person), Yom Tov events, weekly classes with clergy, Holiday programs and so much more.
- 5. A weekly Kiddush as well as a Kiddush club (the second is optional but lots of fun for those who want it).
 - 6. A very active Sisterhood and Men's Club.
- 7. The opportunity to worship in a beautiful shul I challenge you to find any shul in Rockland

- or the surrounding area with the aesthetic beauty of our building.
- 8. A truly inexpensive Congregation to join with no building fund, discounted membership in the first two years.
- 9. Most importantly, the opportunity to build long-term relationships that are good for the soul. When selling this, think about your own relationships with members of the shul and some of the wonderful bonds that have been created in the last ten years of this Congregation as well as in its predecessor congregations. Without being a part of this Kehillah these relationships would not have come to fruition.

For too long people use every excuse in the book not to join a shul. It is our job to sell them on the need to be part of a Jewish community. We can make the religious argument, we can make the social argument, we can make the financial argument. Whichever one or all you choose it is not a choice of self-interest but rather a choice of working together as part of this committee. The committee has no agenda other than looking to preserve our past, present and future. This is not an easy task and there is much work to be done. Yet as I stated at the beginning of this article just the idea of each of us bringing one person can lead to explosive growth. Yes we have an Executive Board, a Board of Trustees, a Long Term planning committee, various fund raising committees through branches like Sisterhood and Men's Club but this is the most important committee you can be on to make a difference for our shul. My belief is that if we all just give a moment or two of thought as to people we know, whether casually or quite well we can find someone to speak to about coming in for a service, a dinner, an event. The key thing is to get them in the building. We came into the building for services or events and we stayed so there must be something to the product. Each of us must market the product meaning the shul to which we have committed.

Now that we are all on this committee you may ask when we have our next meeting since r eading this is the first. Actually, we meet twice a day seven days a week. Try your best to be there but not to worry I won't take attendance.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian Spirituality

he air was clean and crisp. The sky was clear blue. The algorithms clear blue. The sky was brightening with the light of morning as I stood among mountains on a trail with no one around. My phone told me that sunrise was just a little bit ahead and I stood drinking in the wonder of Hashem's beauty. And I started reciting the Shacharit prayers. The Talmud teaches us that the best time to begin the *Amida*, the silent devotion, is at the precise moment of sunrise. I had hoped that precisely sunrise, I would see the sun peek over the mountains as I recited the Amida. It didn't work out quite that way. The mountains were too high and official sunrise happened behind the mountain, but I recited the Amida at the proper time in a beauty I have encountered seldom in my life.

It was during our vacation in Arizona. Chana and I did something we have rarely done before. We went on a trip without a secondary reason. It wasn't "a vacation for the kids," and it wasn't "we have a wedding," or "we're going to visit family." It was a trip for the two of us to say a temporary goodbye to a hectic lifestyle and enjoy each other's company. We got a lot more.

I had expected the beauty. Having been to Scottsdale/Phoenix on business, I had seen the mountains before. The clear skies and temperate weather had convinced me that it was a good place to revisit with some time to look around. Chana was intrigued by my descriptions and was enthusiastically looking forward to the trip. We had to reschedule it three times before we actually got to go so you can imagine just how much we were anticipating the adventure.

From the moment we touched down in Phoenix, the sheer majesty of the beauty was overwhelming. During out first day trip to Tombstone, the word we kept uttering, sometimes even exclaiming, was a simple "wow". The Desert has a majesty so magnificent that just driving through it was

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an experience in and of itself. By the time we had made the trek to and from Tombstone, we had thought we had truly experienced G-d's grandeur. But, as it turned out, we were only just beginning.



We were driving and, in the distance, we saw a mountain. On a lark, I asked Chana if she minded if I just drove in the direction of that mountain. She smiled and was up for a little adventure and we just drove. Now, here's the interesting part. Somewhere I made a turn. I do not even remember making the turn but I must have made it because, when we started our "adventure", I was on one street and somewhere along the line we wound up on another. In any event, we found ourselves on Fourth street and drove until we reached the end. It ended at the Fourth Street Trailhead, a park that led on a mountain trail. It was late in the afternoon, but we decided to take a hike on the trail. We finished our hike with about a half hour to go to sunset and I really wanted to see a sunset with those mountains, but we were exhausted from hours on the road. I promised myself, however, that I would return in the morning to see the sunrise.

Chana was not quite as adventurous the next morning and so, I found myself alone on that trail.

I believe that G-d does things for a reason. It was no accident that we found ourselves unexpectedly on that street that led to that trail. And, as a result, I was treated to what I can only describe as a spiritual experience. At that moment, when I was *davening* on that empty trail with only the beauty of nature around me, I felt a peacefulness that I have rarely encountered in my life. I felt the presence of *Hashem* all

around me and my words in my davening had a greater meaning on that day than they normally have.

Later that week, Chana and I visited with my nephew for *Shabbos*. On Friday night, he and I visited a shul for evening services. I was *davening* in a strange shul with the only familiar face belonging to my nephew. When we got to *L'Cha Dodi*, the congregation sung an unfamiliar tune. I kind of followed along until I got the tune and I sang along. Once again, in that moment, I felt a feeling of peace and connection like I had felt on the trail.

Those two experiences have gotten me thinking about the nature of "spirituality." What does it mean to have a "spiritual" experience? I was speaking with my nephew at the *Shabbos* table and I asked what the purpose of *Torah* and *Mitzvos* was and he responded, "to bring us closer to *Hashem*." But what does that mean? It sounds good, but what does it mean to actually be closer to *Hashem*? How does that translate in the real world?

These are questions that have been pondered by minds much greater than mine. I am not a philosopher so perhaps my realizations are too simplistic and maybe even wrong. Still, they are mine and perhaps they have value. experiences. On the trail, I felt one with the world and at peace with myself. At that Friday night services, as the shared song of the *L'Cha Dodi* washed over me, I felt one with the congregation and at peace with myself. Perhaps that is when we can feel *Hashem's* presence the most.

When we recite our prayers, we ask that *Hashem* bless his people with peace. In the world we live in, we know that peace is a hard commodity to find. Still, we can find it within ourselves, our families and our communities, of we only try. When we have that peace, when we can feel comfortable with ourselves, our community, our people and the world, then perhaps we can be open to feel the presence of Hashem, and gain the understanding that there is something larger than us. That, I think, is what being closer to *Hashem* means. If we can be cognizant that He exists, that there is a force larger than us in the world, how can we be arrogant? Perhaps the answer is that peace can bring a feeling of oneness with Hashem which, in turn, can only lead to greater peace. Can we ask for more?



A day trip to travel to Newport, Rhode Island to visit this museum would be a fascinating springtime outing. Tours are not available before mid-April. If you are interested in any of these trips let the office know as we shall check there first and talk to you about organizing tours to some of these venues. Let's explore and share some of these experiences together.

I'm sure the city is beautiful and the chocolate is delicious, yet it will be an instant reminder that the comfort and pride I felt and being overtly Jewish just a few hours earlier now must go undercover (literally, as I trade *kippah* for hat). No Jew can travel in Europe without giving thought to the problem of renewed anti-Semitism. It's almost like taking a trip through history in reverse, going from the safety and security of Israel to the lingering insecurity of Jewish life in Europe.

How are forbearers yearned to be able to leave behind the tragedies of Jewish history and the diaspora and, at great expense and risk undertake the arduous journey to Israel. Yocheved and I will relax in our safe and comfortable seats, eat our over-salted kosher meal and watch a movie or two before touching down in The Holy Land. We will brace ourselves against the fear and disillusionment and focus on how in our times we are incredibly blessed by G-d to be able to make the journey to Jerusalem door to door in less than a day. I'll don my baseball-style cap in Zurich as we enjoy a new place. And we will pray that neither we nor the Jewish people will forget that for all of our blessings and advances we still have so far to go to fulfill the dream, a dream whose birthplace was Israel, whose residence is Israel and whose future – as promised by G-d - is Israel. What's to worry about?

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BUDGET & FINANCE COMMITTEE by Al Bernstein

You likely put in place estate and financial plans to provide for you and your loved ones. These plans may include a will or living trust, IRA, pension plan, or insurance policy beneficiary designations.



Many of these instruments also can be used to secure the future of charitable organizations such as Congregation Shaarey Israel, while providing tax savings for your estate.

After first making gifts in your will to those you wish to receive a specific sum or certain property, you can then name charitable interests, such as our Shul, to receive all or a portion of what remains.

You may name the Shul's endowment as a beneficiary to receive all or a portion of the proceeds from a life insurance policy that you may no longer need.

Amounts remaining in retirement plans can be subject to heavy taxation when left to non-spousal individuals. Qualified charities (such as Congregation Shaarey Israel) can, however, receive these funds tax-free. Consider directing all or a portion of remaining amounts to Congregation Shaarey Israel's endowment and providing for loved ones from other sources.

You may name the Shul's endowment to receive all or a portion of what is left in a savings, brokerage, or other investment account.

You may also wish to consider charitable gift annuities, which present tax planning opportunities.

Congregant of the Month: Louisa De Paola "Renaissance Woman" by Julie Feldman

Be prepared to be astounded. We know Louisa DePaola as the Gift Shop Coordinator, Bingo Caller, an important member of Sisterhood as well as a major part of the local Seniors' Groups. We know that she is a fantastic crafter, making many wonderful items (some of which are on sale in the Gift Shop), and a woman with well formulated ideas. But there is so much more that you don't know about our gifted Louisa.

JF: Where did you grow up and what was your family like?

LDP: I grew up near Kingston, NY and went to Kingston High School and then eventually to New Paltz State University. I grew up with a half-brother who was ten years older than I and I had a brother and sister, the youngest of whom was 10 years younger than me, giving the children in the family a 20-year age-span. I married young and got my university degree in my thirties.

JF: What did you study and what made you decide to go into your field?

LDP: I got a degree in psychology and also studied business analysis and when we moved to New York City, I got a job on Wall Street as a business analyst with a brokerage. I worked for companies like PaineWebber, E.F. Hutton and Deutsche Bank. I eventually became an Assistant Vice President at Paine Webber. I did this for 25 years and then began to consult with major banks for another 10 to 15 years. During this period, as a form of relaxation, I began to design table cloths and opened a small store to sell them. I had someone at the store during the week and I would come in on the weekend while I was still working on Wall Street. I was in retail for 20 to 25 years before I retired in 2002. I moved to Staten Island then and opened a gift shop which I ran until 2006 when it was destroyed by a fire. A friend of mine owned a Bed & Breakfast down the street and she asked me to run it for her. I re-opened the gift shop in the B&B and did that until 2008 when I moved to Rockland to be closer to my daughter.

JF: What made you decide to join Congregation Shaarey Israel?

LDP: In Staten Island I belonged to a traditional

conservative synagogue much like CSI. When I moved to the Airmont area, the new building had not yet been built and the Monsey Jewish Center was still meeting at the Reuben Gittleman Hebrew School. One of my neighbors in Airmont Gardens was Phil Zelazo and he brought me to services there and I joined.

JF: What is your favorite song, book, movie, piece of music, piece of art, etc. and why? LDP: I love opera. My favorite is *Turandot*, and that was what was wonderful about living in New York City. I actually love all music, even a little rock 'n roll, especially Adele. Right now I've gotten into Pandora music on my smart home app.

JF: What is one thing about you that would surprise people?

LDP: Most people don't know how many things I've done in my life. I think I got that from my mother. After she got married, she learned to build houses. She would plan the building, obtain the materials, hire the workers, oversee the construction and then sell the house. Eighty years ago, it was unheard of for a woman to do that.

JF: What thoughts do you want to end this interview with?

LDP: My hope is that we can attract many young families. That will be the future of CSI. Several members of my own family have joined. We need more young men on the Bima and more young women in Sisterhood.
